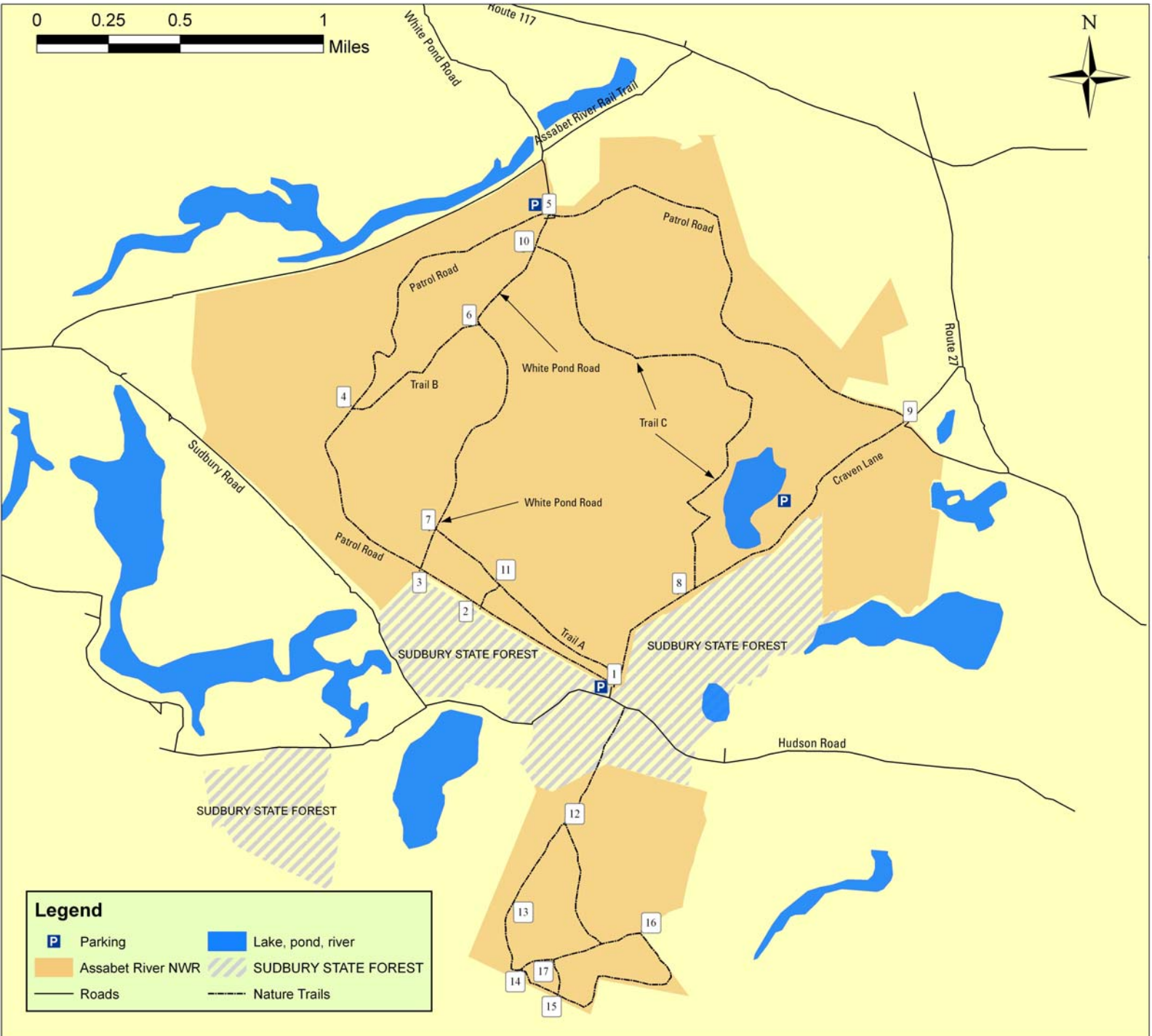

A Refuge to Call Your Own

Welcome to the Assabet River National Wildlife Refuge! We're glad you are here. The refuge encompasses 3.5 square miles located within the towns of Hudson, Maynard, Stow and Sudbury. While part of Fort Devens, this area was formerly known as the Sudbury Training Annex. The U.S. Army transferred 2,230 acres to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in the fall of 2000. Assabet River National Wildlife Refuge is open for wildlife dependent recreation. We ask that you help conserve this unique natural habitat by staying on designated trails.

A New Addition

Assabet River is one of eight refuges within the Eastern Massachusetts NWR Complex. The Refuge management and administration office is located at the Complex Headquarters at 73 Weir Hill Road, Sudbury, Massachusetts, 01776. Recreational Opportunities

The Refuge is open from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset. Wildlife dependent recreation opportunities, including wildlife observation, photography, interpretation, and environmental education, are permitted on designated trails shown above. Please be aware of vehicles that may be operating on the refuge roads and trails. Fishing and hunting are allowed subject to refuge regulations, State and Federal laws and permit restrictions. Parking is available off Hudson Road in Sudbury and White Pond Road in Stow.

Refuge lands are closed to horses, motorized vehicles, and bicycles. Dogs are not allowed. There are no picnic areas or campsites on the refuge. The large wetland complex and the contiguous forested areas found here today are important feeding and breeding areas for migratory birds. Help keep it that way by taking your trash with you upon departure.
