Non-native invasive plants are quickly taking over the natural habitats of Chesapeake Marshlands National Wildlife Refuge Complex. The Complex includes Blackwater NWR and the Chesapeake Island Refuges (which includes Eastern Neck NWR). The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service needs your help to restore native species and prevent the spread of exotics throughout the Chesapeake Bay Ecosystem.
