

White River National Wildlife Refuge 2010-2011



- Kansas Lake area closed to all firearm deer hunting after October 30.
- Cutting shooting lanes or other manipulation of vegetation or hunting in such areas.

- Possessing and/or using toxic shot by hunters using shotguns to hunt small game or waterfowl.

- All forms of man-deer drives.

- Firearm hunting from or across roadways, levees, and maintained utility rights-of-way.

Exception: Waterfowl may be hunted in these areas when flooded.

- Driving or screwing any object into a tree or to hunt from a tree in which an object has been driven or screwed.

- Leaving a hunt stand more than seven days before or after a hunt season.

- Target practice.

- Firearms, including state permitted concealed carry handguns are prohibited in all refuge offices and buildings.

- No person shall utilize the service of a guide, guide service, outfitter, club, organization or other person who provides equipment, services, or assistance on the refuge for compensation unless the guide, guide service, outfitter, club, organization or person has obtained a Special Use Permit from the refuge. It is your responsibility to verify that the guide, guide service, etc. has obtained the required Special Use Permit.

- Hunting, taking, possessing, or attempting to take wildlife with an unauthorized guide, guide service, outfitter, club or organization providing assistance, service or equipment is prohibited.

Guiding and Other Commercial Uses

No person, including but not limited to a guide, guide service, outfitter, club, or other organization shall provide assistance, services, or equipment on the refuge to any other person for compensation unless such guide, guide service, outfitter, club, or other organization has obtained a Special Use Permit from the refuge. For the purpose of this regulation, any fee paid or services rendered to a person for lodging, meals, club membership or similar

services will be considered compensation. A refuge Special Use Permit is also required for all other commercial activities (fishing, timber management, collecting acorns, etc.) on the refuge.

Camping

Camping is permitted year round on the North Unit (except the Kansas Lake Area and other areas listed) and on the South Unit at Jacks Bay, Moon Lake, Hudson's Landing, and the Floodgate campgrounds. All remaining campgrounds on the South Unit are open for camping from March 1 through December 15, except until December 31 for Prairie Lakes and Smokehouse Hill Campgrounds.

Camping is permitted only in designated campgrounds on the entire South Unit, on that portion of the North Unit located south of the Noram Gas Pipeline(see map) and on that portion of the North Unit south of U.S. Highway 79 between Roc Roe Bayou and the White River. Camping also permitted anywhere on the remainder of the North Unit.

Down wood may be gathered for use at campsites. Campers are required to remove all of their trash from the refuge. Campers must stay within the area blazed with white paint in designated camping areas.

Sport Fishing and Frogging Regulations

Fishing is permitted year round in LaGrue, Essex, Prairie, Scrubgrass & Brooks Bayous, Big Island Chute, Moon and Belknap Lakes next to Arkansas Highway 1, Indian Bay, the Arkansas Post Canal and adjacent drainage ditches, those borrow ditches located adjacent to the west bank of that portion of the White River Levee north of the Arkansas Power and Light Company powerline right-of-way, and all refuge owned waters located north of Arkansas Highway 1. All other refuge waters are open to sport fishing from March 1 through November 30 unless posted otherwise.

Frogging is permitted on all refuge owned waters open for sport fishing as follows: South Unit, frogging is permitted from the beginning of the state season through November 30; North Unit, frogging is permitted for the entire state season.

Mobility-impaired users

Mobility-impaired users may apply for a permit allowing the use of ATV's in accordance with special use permit guidelines. Issuance of the permit is restricted to persons with severe mobility impairments as verified by a Physician's Verification of Disability form. For more

75th Anniversary

President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed an Executive Order on September 4, 1935 establishing White River Migratory Waterfowl Refuge as a refuge and breeding ground for migratory birds and other wildlife. As we celebrate the refuge's 75th anniversary this year, the immense natural resource value of this treasured area is recognized world-wide. Recognition as a "Wetland of International Importance" under the RAMSAR Convention puts it on par with other wetlands in the USA such as the Okefenokee Swamp, Chesapeake Bay, and Everglades. This largest remaining bottomland hardwood forest has been called North America's Rainforest and a River of Trees for the rich diversity of flora and fauna and way the river's floodwaters flow throughout the forest. The lower White River area is noted for being the most important wintering area for mallard ducks in North America. About 2/3 of the bird species found in all of Arkansas use the refuge, with many being migrants wintering in South America. Native black bears survived here and today represent the largest native black bear population in the lower Mississippi River valley. The refuge now includes some 160,000 acres making it the 3rd largest National Wildlife Refuge east of the Rocky Mountains. As you experience the refuge's many natural resource treasures, please join us in celebrating the refuge's 75th anniversary.

White River National Wildlife Refuge

White River National Wildlife Refuge, established in 1935, contains nearly 160,000 acres of prime bottomland hardwood habitat located within the floodplain of the lower White River. For management purposes, most of the lands within the refuge have been divided into a North Unit and a South Unit which are separated by Arkansas Highway 1. Refuge out-lying tracts are not depicted on the accompanying maps, but are open for hunting in accordance with state seasons and bag limits. All users are permitted on the refuge in accordance with State and Federal regulations as supplemented by the following special refuge regulations.

Access and Vehicle Use

The maximum speed for any land vehicle is 25 mph, unless posted otherwise. Refuge roads on the South Unit are open to vehicular traffic March 1 through December 15. All other refuge roads are open all year. A locked gate, road closed sign, or other barrier (i.e. mounded dirt) means the road is closed to all vehicle travel but not to foot travel unless signed otherwise.

All licensed vehicles must stay on gravel roads. On both the North and South Units, ATV's must remain on yellow marked trails. We only allowed ATV's for wildlife dependent hunting and fishing activities. The trails are marked with high visibility yellow ink on trees.

The use of ATV's on gravel roads is prohibited anywhere on the refuge unless signed otherwise.

An ATV is defined as a vehicle with a maximum tire pressure of 15 psi, a maximum dry weight of 1550 lbs., and with tires having a centerline lug depth of one inch or less. Only those vehicles originally designed by their manufacturer to be ATVs are allowed; mini-trucks or other modified off-road vehicles are prohibited. Personal watercraft (jet-ski, sea-do, wet bike) are prohibited on the refuge.

Boats, other than flat-bottomed johnboats 16 feet or less in length, may not be left overnight on the refuge during the period from November 1 through February 28.

Boats, ATV's, and portable tree stands left unattended on the refuge must have the owner's name and address affixed in a conspicuous manner. No other personal items (i.e. trail cameras, blinds, etc.) may be left unattended.

General Hunt Regulations

State bag limits apply for all hunts unless indicated otherwise in this brochure.

Beaver, nutria, coyote, muskrat and feral hogs may be taken incident to any daytime refuge hunt with weapons legal for that hunt until the daily limit of game is taken.

A hunter born after 1968 must carry a valid Hunter Education Card. Hunters under 16 years old do not need to have a card if they are under the direct supervision (within arms reach) of a holder of a valid hunting license of at least 21 years of age. Youth hunters under the age of 16 who have a valid Hunter Education Card must also be supervised by an adult not less than 21 years old but must only remain in sight and normal voice contact with the adult. An adult may supervise only one youth for big game hunting and up to two youths for waterfowl and small game. Home state Hunter Education Cards will be honored.

Weapons

Persons may only use (discharge) firearms during authorized hunting seasons while attempting to take game species. All hunting weapons used on the refuge must comply with state regulations for each game species.

Permits

This permit must be in possession and signed by ALL refuge users. However, quota hunt permits are also required to participate in the first three days of the modern gun and muzzleloader hunts on the north and south units. All Non-quota hunting closed during quota deer hunts.

Flood Zone Closure Regulations

North Unit

The refuge will close to all deer hunting when the White River gauge at St. Charles reaches 23 feet as reported by the following website:

Season will reopen when the gauge reading reaches 21 feet as reported by the same website.

South Unit

The refuge will close to all deer hunting when the White River gauge at St. Charles reaches 23 feet and the tail-water gauge reading at Norrel Lock and Dam #1 reaches 145 simultaneously as reported by the following website:

Season will reopen when the gauge reading reaches 21 and 143 feet respectively as reported by the same website.

Check Stations

During the gun quota hunts, refuge staff will collect biological data. Collection of this information is needed for deer management decisions.

For all deer and turkey harvested on the refuge, the hunter will immediately (prior to moving the animal) complete the hunting license kill information. **All big game taken on the South Unit must be recorded as zone 660 and all big game taken on the North Unit must be recorded as zone 661.** Out-lying tracts are the same zone number of the surrounding state zone. Archery Deer

North Unit: October 1, 2010 - January 31, 2011

Either sex for deer. State bag limit applies for deer. No antler restrictions for deer.

South Unit: October 1, 2010 - December 31, 2010

Either sex for deer. State bag limit applies for deer. No antler restrictions for deer.

Muzzleloader Deer

North & South Unit: October 16-18, 2010

Quota permit required. Limit one deer either sex. No antler restrictions for deer.

North Unit Only: October 19-22, 2010

Limit one deer buck only. See bag limit section. Only user permit required. No antler restrictions for deer.

Quota permits are nontransferable and nonrefundable.

Modern Gun Deer

Modern Gun Youth Deer Hunt

North and South Units: November 6-7, 2010

Refuge hunt brochure/permit required.

Limit one (either sex)

North and South Units: November 13-15, 2010

Quota permit required. Limit one deer either sex. No antler restrictions for deer.

North Unit Only: November 16-17, 2010

Limit one deer buck only. See bag limit section. Only user permit required. No antler restrictions for deer.

December 4-5, 2010

Mobility Impaired Modern Gun Hunt at Cooks Lake

December 10-12, 2010

Deer bag limit

One deer limit refuge wide during the muzzleloaders season (October 16-22).

One deer limit refuge wide during the modern gun season (November 13-15).

Waterfowl

Duck hunting is permitted until noon. Retriever dogs are permitted. Only portable blinds are permitted. Waterfowl hunters may enter the refuge no earlier than 4 am. Blinds, blind material, and decoys must be removed from the refuge by 1 pm each day.

North Unit: Statewide duck season, and youth hunt day(s). Coot, geese and woodcock may be taken if in season.

South Unit: Every Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday of the statewide duck season.

Coot, geese and woodcock may be taken if in season. Designated area only (see map).

Furbearer -

North Unit: 12 noon, Nov. 20, 2010 - 12 noon, Jan. 31, 2011.

Dogs and horses permitted from sunset to sunrise only. ATV rules apply.

South Unit: 12 noon, Dec. 1, 2010 - 12 noon, Dec. 15, 2010.

Dogs and horses permitted from sunset to sunrise only.

Rabbit and Squirrel

North Unit: September 1, 2010 - February 28, 2011

Dogs allowed December 15, 2010 - February 28, 2011

Closed to Spring Squirrel Season.

South Unit: September 1 - November 30, 2010

No dogs allowed. Closed to spring squirrel season.

Turkey - Spring

North and South Units: Same as state 2011 season for surrounding zones. Statewide limit applies. Toxic shot allowed.

Trapping

North Unit: November 20, 2010 - January 31, 2011

State regulations apply. **Special Use Permit Required.** For information, contact Refuge Headquarters at 870/282 8200.

South Unit: Closed.

Bear season closed on all refuge lands including cooperatively managed tracts.

Prohibited Acts

General

■ Cutting, painting or defacing trees.

■ Unleashed dogs if not actively hunting.

■ Fires outside campsites.

■ Littering (including, but not limited to shotgun shell hulls and cigarette butts).

■ Operating a motor vehicle without a license (driver or vehicle).

■ During waterfowl season, boating in south unit waterfowl hunt area, except from 4 am to 1 pm on hunt days.

■ Operating a vehicle in violation of State law.

Camping

■ Camping in Kansas Lake Area.

■ Loud noise in campgrounds after 10 pm, including generators.

■ Campsites must be occupied daily and removed after 14 consecutive days.

■ Leaving fires unattended.

Hunting

■ All non-quota hunting closed during quota deer hunts.

■ Hunting with the aid of bait, salt or ingestible attractant.

■ Use of dogs and/or horses other than specified in brochure.

■ Marking trails with materials other than bio-degradable paper flagging or reflective tape/tacks.

■ Use and/or possession of alcoholic beverages while hunting.

■ Consumption of alcohol or possession of opened alcoholic beverage container on roadways and in parking area.

■ Waterfowl hunting on Kansas Lake Area.
