Birds of Guam National Wildlife Refuge

Guam National Wildlife Refuge (GNWR), located at the Northern tip of the island, is a home to many endangered and threatened species that make Guam truly unique. The refuge is designated as a critical habitat for the well-known birds such as Guam Micronesian kingfisher and Mariana crow, as well as, a mammal, the Mariana fruit bat.

Several species of birds are routinely observed within the refuge, although most of the forest bird population has been decimated by brown tree snake predation and pesticide use up until the 1970's.
