Trail Description: Accessed via the parking lot at the main trail head, the Mountain View Trail is named for the view of Mt. Hood you can see on a clear day. The trail sits high on top of the west levee, which provides flood protection for the Port and neighboring residents while allowing Gibbons Creek to flow more naturally into the floodplain below. From it you might see raptors, and swallows soaring by and ducks and geese in the wetlands. The trail also serves as a road occasionally used for maintenance.

Trail Description:

Along the Gibbons Creek Wildlife Art Trail you will not find signs to read, but art to discover as you explore. Look for quotes hidden among the stone benches, unique sculptures, and wildlife cutouts to lock your bikes on. We hope this art will inspire you to wonder about the nature it represents.

Accessed from the Refuge River Trail, it wraps around Redtail Lake and over two bridges before reconnecting again with the Refuge River Trail. Look for turtles basking on sunny days at the lake as well as Great blue herons.

Trail Description: The Refuge River Trail is the only multi-use trail on the Refuge allowing visitors the unique opportunity to experience the Refuge with a bicycle, horse, or leashed dog. The trail parallels the Columbia River and then meanders further into the Refuge. It is accessed from the western boundary of the Refuge near Index Street (~1 mile to reach Redtail Lake), or from the Mountain View Trail (open to pedestrians only). The trail then continues 2.5 miles crossing channels that connect the Refuge and the River.
