General Introduction

Bald Knob National Wildlife Refuge, established in 1993, is one of 568 national wildlife refuges administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The primary objective of the refuge is to provide habitat for migratory waterfowl. The refuge is located in White County, Arkansas.

Hunting, fishing, wildlife observation and photography, environmental education, and interpretation are priority public uses of the National Wildlife Refuge System. These wildlife-dependent uses are carefully managed on Bald Knob National Wildlife Refuge to ensure they are compatible with refuge purposes and provide safe, high-quality, low-impact, recreational opportunities. Users of the refuge must obey all signs pertaining to visitation, access, and public use regulations. All public uses, including hunting and fishing, are conducted in accordance with state and federal regulations as supplemented by the following special refuge regulations.

Access and Vehicle Use

* **NOTE:** The entire refuge, including the Mingo Creek Unit, is CLOSED to all other entry and public use during the Quota Gun Deer Hunt Nov. 11-12. Only Quota Gun Deer permit holders are allowed to enter or use the refuge during this hunt and only for the purpose of quota gun deer hunting and the incidental take of beaver, muskrat, nutria, coyote, striped skunk, fox, bobcat, river otter, mink and feral hogs. **Exception:** If Flood Prone Region B is closed to deer hunting due to flooding during the refuge's Quota Gun Deer Hunt, then the refuge will be open to other public entry and use.

NOTE: The Mingo Creek, Bison, and Waterfowl Sanctuary Units will be closed to all other entry and public use during the Youth Quota Turkey Hunt (see AGFC regulations for Youth Turkey Dates). Only Youth Turkey Hunt permit holders are allowed to enter or use these refuge units during this hunt and only for the purpose of youth turkey hunting.

NOTE: Waterfowl sanctuaries, indicated on the refuge map, are closed to ALL entry and public use, including hunting and fishing, from Nov. 15 through Feb. 28 annually.

Conventional vehicles may only be used on the Bison, Waterfowl Core, and Sanctuary Units and ONLY from Mar. 1-Nov. 14. Conventional vehicles must meet all applicable federal and state requirements regulating the use of licensed motor vehicles. Vehicles equipped with oversize tractor lug type tires are prohibited. Use of conventional vehicles is prohibited on the Mingo Creek Unit year-round.

Speed limit for motor vehicles (including ATV/UTVs, ebikes, etc.) is 25 mph unless otherwise posted.

Recreational use of ATV/UTVs is not allowed. ATVs may ONLY be used Sep. 1 to Mar. 31 and ONLY to provide access for hunting. ATV/UTVs may be used after Mar. 31 ONLY for goose hunting during the State Conservation Order.

An ATV/UTV is defined as a vehicle with a maximum tire pressure of 15 psi, with tires having a maximum centerline lug depth of one inch. Only those vehicles originally designed by their manufacturer to be ATV/UTVs are allowed; mini-trucks or other modified off-road vehicles are prohibited.

Conventional vehicles, bicycles, ebikes, and ATV/UTVs are not allowed in fields and must stay on maintained roads, levee tops, or established parking areas at all times.

The Core Waterfowl Area will be closed from Nov. 15 -Feb. 28 annually to ALL public entry and use **after** 1 pm to reduce waterfowl disturbance and improve hunt quality (see map).

2023-2024 General Hunting Permit—Bald Knob NWR

This permit must be signed to be valid. It must be carried by the hunter at all times while on the refuge and in possession of hunting gear. An electronic signed copy of the permit may also be produced on a person's own cellular phone or other type of portable electronic device that clearly displays and accurately reproduces all of the information. This permit expires 06/30/2024.

NOTE: Quota Permits also required for Quota Gun Deer and Quota Youth Turkey Hunts. I have read and understand the refuge hunting regulations and agree to obey them and agree to allow USFWS and AGFC officers to inspect or search all my equipment used during my hunt.

During this period, Coal Chute Road, Granary West Road parking area and Frackin Road will remain open to vehicular access.

NOTE: This closure will NOT apply to all-day hunting for geese during the State Conservation Order.

Roads may be closed any time conditions or other administrative needs warrant. A locked gate or other barrier, road closed sign, or no vehicle sign means the road is closed to ALL vehicle travel, including bicycles and ebikes, but not to foot travel unless signed otherwise.

Bicycles and ebikes may only be operated on roads or trails designated for conventional vehicles and/or ATV/UTVs.

Parking of vehicles on roadsides that prevents the passage of extra-wide farm equipment is prohibited. Vehicles are subject to be towed at the owner's expense.

Personal watercraft (jet-ski, etc), hover craft, and airboats are prohibited.

Boats may not be left overnight on the refuge.

General Refuge Regulations

Public use of the refuge is permitted throughout the year. Permitted activities are hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, photography, environmental education, and interpretation.

NOTE: The refuge is open for public entry and use, including hunting and fishing, from 4 am to one hour after legal sunset, except for those engaged in raccoon/ opossum hunting at night and possessing the appropriate equipment and required hunting license. Hunters trailing or retrieving deer after hours should call the refuge office at 501/724 2458 and leave a message stating their name, phone number and the general area in which they are searching for or retrieving deer.

Prohibited activities include:

- Open alcohol containers on refuge roads, ATV trails, parking areas, boat ramps, fishing piers, or observation decks.
- Swimming.
- Camping.
- Building fires.
- Cutting or defacing trees, shrubs, or other plants.

- Littering (including, but not limited to, shotgun shell hulls and cigarette butts).
- Searching for or removal of artifacts.
- Use of horses or mules.
- Possession or use of fireworks.
- Commercial hunting/fishing/guiding.
- Driving on the Little Red River Protection Levee.
- Houseboat mooring to the refuge bank on the Little Red River.
- Off road vehicling, or driving conventional vehicles on wet/ muddy ungraveled roads.
- Taking or possessing turtles or mollusks
- Possession, use, or manufacturing of illegal drugs.
- Use of artificial lights to locate wildlife except as authorized for fishing, frogging, and raccoon/opossum hunting.
- Use of firearms and possession or use of archery equipment and crossbows except during refuge hunts that allow their use.
- Loaded hunting firearms or muzzleloaders in or on a vehicle, ATV, or boat under power. "Loaded" is defined as having shells in the firearm or an ignition device on/in the muzzleloader.
- Target practice or non-hunting discharge of firearms.
- Failure to remove all marking materials from the refuge following the hunt.
- Use of drones
- Tournament fishing

Sport Fishing Regulations

Sport fishing, frogging, and crawfishing, for personal use only, are permitted year-round in accordance with state seasons and state and refuge-specific regulations. The owner's Arkansas Game and Fish Commission license customer ID number must be permanently affixed to each crawfish trap.

Anglers (including those frogging, crawfishing, and bow fishing) may enter the refuge no earlier than 4:00 a.m. and must depart the refuge by 1 hour after legal sunset.

General Hunting Regulations

NOTE: A signed refuge hunting permit from the front of this brochure is required for all hunting activities.

Permits are non-transferable and must be signed by the hunter and carried at all times while on the refuge in possession of hunting gear. An electronic signed copy of the permit may also be produced on a person's own cellular phone or other type of portable electronic device that clearly displays and accurately reproduces all of the information. A permit is located on the front of this brochure or can be downloaded and printed from the refuge website at <http://www.fws.gov/baldknob>.

NOTE: Additional permits are required for the Quota Gun Deer and Quota Youth Turkey Hunts.

Hunter Orange or Chartreuse must be worn in accordance with Arkansas Game & Fish Commission regulations during Quota Gun and Muzzleloader Deer hunts.

Portable, pop-up blinds must have 144 square inches of blaze orange or chartreuse visible from all sides of the blind during firearm big-game seasons on the Refuge.

Bag limits for all species, except deer, are the same as state limits.

Dog training is allowed Sep. 1- Apr. 1.

Mobility-impaired hunters

Mobility-impaired hunters may apply for a refuge Special Use Permit allowing the specialized use of ATVs on existing roads and trails. For more information, please call the refuge at 501/724 2458

Prohibited hunting activities include:

- The use of dogs for deer hunting.
- We prohibit leaving any tree stand, ground blind, or game camera on the refuge without the owner's Arkansas Game and Fish Commission license customer ID number clearly written in a conspicuous location.
- Driving or screwing any metal object into a tree or hunting from a tree in which a metal object has been driven or screwed to support a hunter.

- Building or hunting from permanent blinds or stands.
- Hunting from a vehicle or use of a vehicle as a deer stand.
- Possession or distribution of bait or hunting over bait, salt, grain, or other feed that could serve as a lure or attraction for wildlife.
- Hunting from mowed or maintained roads or levees, except for waterfowl hunting.
- Possession or use of lead shot (exception: Quota Youth Turkey Hunt) or buckshot while hunting.
- Possession or use of alcoholic beverages while hunting.
- Use of natural scents or lures that contain natural deer and elk urine or other biofluids.

Hunter Education and Youth Hunter Supervision

All hunters age 11 and under who possess valid hunter education certification must remain within normal sight and voice contact with an adult age 18 or older who possesses a valid State hunting license. Hunters age 15 and under who have not completed hunter education must be under the direct supervision (within arm's reach) of an adult age 21 or older who possesses a valid State hunting license. One adult may supervise up to two youth hunters for migratory bird and upland game hunting, but may supervise only one youth during big game hunting.

Specific Hunting Regulations

*NOTE: The entire refuge, including the Mingo Creek Unit, is CLOSED to all other entry and public use during the Quota Gun Deer Hunt Nov. 11-12 Only Quota Gun Deer holders are allowed to enter or use the refuge during this hunt and only for the purpose of deer hunting and the incidental take of beaver, muskrat, nutria, coyote, striped skunk, fox, bobcat, river otter, mink, and feral hogs according to any applicable state seasons and regulations. **Exception:** If Flood Prone Region B is closed to deer hunting due to flooding during the refuge's Quota Gun Deer Hunt, then the refuge will be open to other public entry and use.

NOTE: The Mingo Creek, Bison, and Waterfowl Sanctuary Units will be closed to all other entry and public use during the Quota Youth Turkey Hunt (see AGFC regulations for Youth Turkey dates). Only Youth Turkey Hunt permit holders are allowed to enter or use these refuge units during this hunt and only for the purpose of youth turkey hunting.

Migratory Birds

Only non-toxic shot may be possessed or used for all migratory bird hunting.

Waterfowl (Duck, Coot, Merganser, and Geese)
State Seasons. Until 12 noon.*

Shotgun shell possession limit - 25 daily, except for goose hunting under the State Conservation Order.

Waterfowl hunters may enter the refuge no earlier than 4 am, except to park in the Huntsman/Granary West parking area accessed from Safety Road prior to 4 am. Waterfowl hunters are not allowed to travel past the gate from this parking area before 4 am.

Waterfowl hunters may not assemble, stage or line up for entry into the refuge prior to 12 am

during any part of the early or regular waterfowl seasons.

Hunting parties must stay at least 100 yards apart.

Morning (until 12 noon) hunting only throughout the entire season, except all day hunting permitted for geese during the State Conservation Order.

State bag limit(s) apply.

Hunters must pick up and remove their spent shell casings and boxes from the refuge.

Decoys, blinds, boats, and all other equipment must be removed daily by 1 pm.

It is unlawful to possess, or take or attempt to take waterfowl with the use of, any simulated wing movement decoy or any decoy other than an artificial decoy that imitates the appearance of waterfowl: no moving parts or electrical components; and is not subjected to any artificial means that makes it appear to move, splash or cause ripples from the first day of the first segment of regular duck season through the last day of the last segment of regular duck season, including teal and youth waterfowl season. Exception: Manually operated "jerk strings" may be used to simulate decoy movement.

Cutting of holes or other manipulation of vegetation (cutting bushes, mowing, weed-eating, etc.) or hunting from manipulated areas is prohibited.

Dogs permitted.

Dove: State seasons* Dogs permitted.

Snipe: State seasons* Dogs permitted.

Woodcock: State season.* Dogs permitted.

Crow: State Season.* Dogs permitted

Rail (Sora and Virginia): State seasons.* Dogs permitted.

Gallinule (Purple and Common): State seasons.* Dogs permitted.

Small Game

Only rifles and handguns chambered for rimfire cartridges, air rifles, archery tackle, or shotguns with non-toxic shot may be used for all small game hunting.

Squirrel: Sep. 1 - Feb. 28.* Dogs permitted.

Rabbit: State season.* Dogs permitted.

Quail: State season.* Dogs permitted.

Furbearer

Beaver, muskrat, nutria, coyote, striped skunk, fox, bobcat, river otter, and mink may be taken incidental to any refuge hunt by the use of the device appropriate for that hunt and according to any applicable state seasons and regulations.

Feral hogs

In cooperation with the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission's Feral Hog Control program, feral hogs may be taken on the refuge only during the quota gun, youth gun, and muzzleloader deer hunts and by archery deer hunters from Nov. 1-Dec. 31. Feral hogs are destructive, non-native animals that are incompatible with refuge management. Live hogs may not be possessed, transported, or released on the refuge.

Raccoon: Sep. 1 - Mar. 31.* Dogs are required for night hunting of raccoons. Waterfowl sanctuary is closed to all hunting from Nov. 15 - Feb. 28.

Opossum: Sep. 1 - Feb. 29.* Dogs are required for night hunting of opossum. Waterfowl sanctuary is closed to all hunting from Nov. 15 - Feb. 28.

Big Game

For all deer and turkey harvested on the Refuge, "Bald Knob NWR" must be used instead of a zone number for tagging and checking your game. All deer harvested during the Quota Gun Deer Hunt MUST be checked at the Refuge Headquarters. In addition, ALL deer and turkey harvested on the refuge ALSO must be checked according to state regulations.

Only portable stands may be used and the owner's Arkansas Game and Fish Commission license customer ID number must be permanently affixed to the stand. A portable hunting stand is any device or structure used for the purpose of hunting that can be carried in its entirety and erected by hand including but not limited to tripod stands, lean-to stands, lock-on stands, ladder stands and climbing stands. Stands may be erected 7 days prior to the refuge deer season and must be removed from the waterfowl sanctuary prior to Nov. 15 and from the rest of the refuge within 7 days of the closing of archery season.

Deer Limits and Refuge Legal Buck Definition

A legal buck on the refuge is defined as any male deer (no antler restriction). Deer harvested on the refuge are NOT bonus deer.

Four deer, no more than two bucks, which may include:

Deer (Archery/Crossbow) State season.* Either sex. State limit applies.

Deer (Muzzleloading) State season. Two deer limit. One buck and one doe.

Deer (Youth Gun) Nov. 4-5, Refuge-wide. Two deer limit. One buck and one doe or two does. Legal centerfire rifles are permitted on the Mingo Unit only. The remainder of the refuge is restricted to shotguns with slugs, muzzleloaders shooting a single projectile, and legal handguns and air rifles as defined by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission.

Deer (Quota gun): Nov. 11-12. Refuge-wide. Quota hunt permit required. Two deer limit. One buck and one doe. Legal centerfire rifles are permitted on the Mingo Unit only. The remainder of the refuge is restricted to shotguns with slugs, muzzleloaders shooting a single projectile, and legal handguns and air rifles as defined by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission.

NOTE: A Bald Knob NWR Quota Gun Deer Hunt permit does not entitle you to camp on State WMAs during the refuge Quota Gun Deer hunt.

To apply for a quota hunt permit
Hunt permits are \$12.50 and must be purchased from <https://baldknob.recaccess.com/>.

Quota permits issued beginning Aug. 1 on a first come, first served basis until the quota is reached, or until Oct. 31.

Permit requests will NOT be accepted in person.

NOTE: Permits are non-transferable and non-refundable, even in the event of refuge deer hunt closures due to flooding.

The refuge is located in AG&FC Flood Prone Region B.

The refuge will close to all deer hunting when the White River gauge at Augusta reaches 31 feet, as reported at <http://www.weather.gov/lmrfc/>. This restriction is lifted when the gauge at Augusta falls below 30 feet and the White River gauge at Georgetown falls to, or below, 19 feet.

Turkey (Youth Quota Gun) Quota hunt permit required. Mingo Creek, Bison, and Sanctuary Units Only. State Youth Turkey Season. Youth will be assigned an area to hunt. Hunt permits are free, but must be obtained from <https://baldknob.recaccess.com/> Mar. 1 through Mar 15. Contact the refuge office at 501/724-2458 for additional details.

Hunting Seasons

* NOTE: The entire refuge, including the Mingo Creek Unit, is CLOSED to all other entry and public use during the Quota Gun Deer Hunt Nov. 11-12. Only Quota Gun Deer Hunt permit holders are allowed to enter or use the refuge during this hunt and only for the purpose of deer hunting and the incidental take of beaver, muskrat, nutria, coyote, striped skunk, fox, bobcat, river otter, mink, and feral hogs by the use of the device appropriate for that hunt and according to any applicable state seasons and regulations.

*NOTE: The Mingo Creek, Bison, and Waterfowl Sanctuary Hunt Units also will be closed to all other entry and public use during the Youth Quota Turkey Hunt (see AGFC regulations for Youth Turkey Dates). Only Quota Youth Turkey Hunt permit holders are allowed to enter or use these refuge units during this hunt and only for the purpose of turkey hunting.
