
# Dove and Pigeon Species in the Migratory Bird Hunter/Harvest Survey

### **Mourning Dove**



- --Slightly smaller than white-winged dove
- -- Dark wing spots (A)
- --Long, tapered tail that ends in a point (B)
- --After breeding season can be found in flocks, occasionally with white-winged doves and Eurasian collared-doves, especially in areas with abundant food such as agricultural and open fields.
- --Juvenile mourning doves can have buffy tipped wing feathers and look similar to white-winged doves. Mourning doves will not have white wing bars.

## White-winged Dove




- --Blue eye ring (A)
- --White bar on the wing (B)
- --Rounded tail (C)
- --Range expanding north and east from southwestern US and Florida
- --Generally seen in flocks during the fall

## European Collared-Dove



- --More common in urban and suburban than rural habitats
- --Black ring around most of neck (A)
- --Squared, white-tipped tail (B)
- --Black bill
- --Noticeably larger than other dove species

NOTE: Please do not report harvest of Eurasian collareddoves to USFWS. We do not monitor harvest of this nonnative bird species.



## Band-tailed Pigeon



- --Range restricted to southwestern US, Mexico, and Pacific Co
- --Found in coniferous forests, oak and pine woods
- -- Larger than all dove species
- --White neck band (A)
- --Broad tail with gray tips (B)
- --Yellow bill
- --Similar in appearance to common pigeons; distinguished by range and habitat
