Alligator River Van Tour

Reservation required. Join us for a trip around the refuge and learn about the wildlife and their habitats. Bring your binoculars and camera! Drinking water is also recommended. The program will occur except with lightning, heavy wind or rain, or impassable road conditions. Dress for the weather! Call 252-216-9464 for reservations. \$30 per person; \$20 for children 12 and under. 6 people maximum. For ages 6 and up. Meet at Creef Cut Wildlife Trail parking lot, Hwy 64 and Milltail Road, app. 6 miles west of Manns Harbor.

Pea Island Bird Walk

FREE. Pea Island is for the birds - actually! Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge has close to 400 species of birds that live here or pass through. Whether you're a beginner or an expert, you'll enjoy this casual stroll beside North Pond. Field guides, binoculars, sunscreen, and insect repellent are recommended. Some field guides and binoculars will be available for loan. Pea Island Bird Walks are held year-round except during the Wings Over Water Wildlife Festival in October and December. Meet at the Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center, located on NC Highway 12 approximately 4 miles south of Oregon Inlet and 9 miles north of Rodanthe.
