Comment Period Opens on Proposals Relating to Protections for the Gray Wolf and Mexican Wolf

The Service's proposal to remove the gray wolf (*Canis lupus*) from the Endangered Species Act's List of Endangered and Threatened Wildlife published today in the Federal Register, along with a second proposal to revise the existing nonessential experimental population designation of the Mexican wolf (*Canis lupus baileyi*). The publications trigger a 90-day public comment period for each proposed rule that will remain open until 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time on September 11, 2013.

Written comments and information concerning each proposed rule can be submitted by one of the following methods to the appropriate docket numbers:

The Service intends that any final action resulting from these proposed rules will be based on the best scientific and commercial data available, and be as accurate and as effective as possible. Comments and materials, as well as supporting documentation used in preparing the proposed rules, will be available for public inspection at www.regulations.gov under the above docket numbers. In addition, details on the kinds of information the Service is seeking are available in each proposed rule.

The Service will post all comments on www.regulations.gov. This generally means the agency will post any personal information provided through the process. The Service is not able to accept email or faxes.
