If the Service can convert marginal farmland into a rich wetland through buying land from willing sellers, I believe that is a good use of tax dollars. The map's emphasis on connecting existing conservation lands with the Refuge is logical. Connecting these conservation areas will provide more habitat for migratory birds and other animals. I support conserving rare black oak savannas and other habitats on the map that support threatened and endangered species. We must preserve these habitats and species for future generations. While private owners can certainly preserve habitat and steward land, I value publicly-owned land that is accessible to all. I encourage the Service to highlight on the map that land will only be bought from willing sellers, and that the public will have access to Refuge land. Also, as funds allow, I feel the Service should build and staff a Kankakee National Wildlife Refuge and Conservation Area Welcome Center so visitors can access restrooms and water. I encourage the Service to continue meeting with the local community that will be impacted by the Refuge. I believe that the Service and local communities can work together towards the goal of protecting both the environment and the community's interests. I encourage the Service to work with the community so that any eco-tourists are aware of locally-owned businesses that would welcome more customers.
