SECTION 106 CONSULTATION

On April 6 and 9, 2007, respectively, the USFWS and BLM delegated regulatory responsibilities for complying with Section 106 of the NHPA to the Corps consistent with 36 CFR 800.2(a)2. Following the delegation of responsibility, the Corps is in the process of consulting with the Nevada SHPO. A mitigation plan has been drafted for the Corps to review and then submit to the SHPO. Prior to the publication of the Record of Decision for this EIS, the Section 106 consultation will have been completed.

In an effort to facilitate public consultation and complete federal project reviews in a more timely and the Coyote Springs Investment (CST) Planned Development Project, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) has agreed to delegate certain responsibilities under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act to the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACOE), who will serve as the lead federal agency as permitted in 36 CFR 800.2(a)2. As the lead agency, the USACOE will consider all project impacts upon cultural resources. The Service, however, will remain the lead federal agency for the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) and Habitat Conservation Plan being prepared for the CSI Planned Development Project. In addition, the Service will serve as a cooperating agency for purposes of review associated with the cultural resource process.

Project Background

On September 12, 2006, a Notice of Intent (NOI) was published in the Federal Register to conduct public scoping and prepare a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the proposed CSI Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan in southern Lincoln County, Nevada. The FEIS, prepared after addressing comments in the DEIS, shall serve as the NEPA compliance document for the Service as well as the USACOE. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is also serving as cooperating federal agency for the FEIS as portions of the development will occur on lands currently leased by CSI from the BLM. The Coyote Springs Development will consist of a new planned community that involves 22,174 acres of and 7,548 acres of leased land.




In an effort to **facilitate** public consultation and complete federal project reviews in a more timely and efficient manner for the Coyote Springs **Investment** Planned Development Project, the United States Bureau of Land **Management** (BLM) has agreed to **delegate** certain responsibilities under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act to the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACOE), who will serve as the lead federal **agency** as **permitted** under 36 CFR 800.2(a)2. TRIBAL CONSULTATION

An update on archeological surveys was distributed to the Moapa Band of Paiute on March 27, 2007 (example included here). The Corps has completed consultation with the Moapa Band of Paiute and other tribes with a potential interest in this project. Tribes with the potential for interest in the project include the Moapa Band of Paiute, Fort Mohave Indian Tribe, Ely Colony (or Ely Shoshone Council), Colorado River Indian Tribes, Duckwater Shoshone Tribe, Paiute Indian Tribe of Utah Tribal Council, Las Vegas Tribal Council, and Kaibab Paiute Tribal Council. The Corps has sent letters to these tribes to ascertain interest in the project and to formally request that Knight and Leavitt Associates act as the Corps' agent in tribal consultation. Knight and Leavitt Associates and the applicant (CSI) also invited interested tribes to the project area on December 13, 2007 and asked for written comments, which are included here from the Kaibab Paiute and Paiute Tribe of Utah.

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
A cultural resource survey of all the private land, and a small portion of the leased land, was conducted in 2006. A total of 31 cultural properties were recorded during the 2006 survey. These properties include prehistoric and historic archaeological sites discovered during field investigations. Twenty-seven (27) of the sites were prehistoric while four (4) sites were historic and have been recommended eligible to the National Register of Historic Places.
