This letter is in regards to residential housing unit rehabilitation projects which receive funding from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and serves as an update to our June 7, 2005, letter to you. As a Federal agency, HUD has responsibilities under Section 7(a)(2) of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA) (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 *et seq.*) to consult with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) regarding projects that may affect Federally-listed species or "critical habitat," and confer with the Service regarding projects that may affect Federally-proposed species or proposed "critical habitat."

We understand that HUD provides funding to multiple organizations for residential housing rehabilitation projects; the Service receives requests for information on the potential presence of, and potential for impacts to, Federally-listed or proposed species or currently designated or proposed "critical habitat" for many of these projects each month. We understand that many of these projects involve no site disturbance or increases in building footprints. We would like to try to streamline the consultation process for projects meeting that description.

Currently, we are only aware of one Federally-listed species with the potential to occur within existing residential housing units. The Indiana bat (*Myotis sodalis*), a Federally- and State-listed endangered species, has been observed using structures (*e.g.*, the attic of a church and cedar siding of a home) for roosting and maternity colony sites on an infrequent basis. However, we currently find the likelihood of adverse effects on Indiana bats due to housing rehabilitation projects to be extremely unlikely to occur, and thus, discountable.

The Service also anticipates no impacts to any other Federally-listed or proposed species. In addition, the only currently designated "critical habitat" in accordance with provisions of the ESA within New York occurs along a 17-mile reach of Lake Ontario. However, existing structures within the critical habitat area do not meet the definition of critical habitat; thus the designation has no impact on residential housing rehabilitation projects. 
In conclusion, no further ESA coordination or consultation with the Service is required for projects that result in no site disturbance or increase in building footprint. If additional information on listed or proposed species or critical habitat becomes available, this determination may be reconsidered. The most recent compilation of Federally-listed and proposed endangered and threatened species in New York* is available for your information. We recommend that you check our website every 90 days to ensure that this listed species presence/absence information, as it might impact HUD's housing rehabilitation funding program, is current. In addition, we recommend that you coordinate with us directly on an annual basis to discuss HUD projects and their potential to impact listed species on a programmatic level.

The above comments pertaining to endangered species under our jurisdiction are provided as technical assistance pursuant to the ESA. This response does not preclude additional Service comments under other legislation.
