**Introduction**

This report summarizes initial outreach activities and public comments gathered for the preparation of a Comprehensive Conservation Plan (CCP) and associated National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) document for the Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge (SNWR or the Refuge). The purposes of scoping are to notify the affected public of the opportunity to participate in the preparation of the CCP and encourage them to: comment on preliminary refuge vision and goals; help identify potential issues, management actions and concerns, significant problems or impacts; and opportunities or alternatives to resolve them (602 FW 3, 3.4(2b)). While public scoping will continue as we prepare a draft CCP/NEPA document, the outreach and public comments in this report represent initial CCP public scoping that ended on June 30, 2008.

After public scoping the planning team reviewed and evaluated all potential issues, management concerns, and problems and the opportunities to resolve them that the planning team, other Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS or the Service) personnel, partners, and the public have identified in order to determine significant issues. The Service defines an issue as: “Any unsettled matter that requires a management decision, e.g., an initiative, opportunity, resource management problem, threat to the resources of the unit, conflict in uses, public concern, or the presence of an undesirable resource condition (602 FW 1 1.6 K).” Significant issues typically are those that are: within our jurisdiction, suggest different actions or alternatives, and will influence our decision (602 FW 3 sec. 3.4(3b)). The final section of this scoping report documents the selection and rationale for issues to be addressed in the CCP and those considered to be outside the scope of the CCP.

**Outreach Efforts**

**Federal Register Notice of Intent to Prepare a CCP – published May 12, 2008**

The Federal Register Notice included background information on the Refuge and preliminary issues with request for scoping comments.

**Planning Update #1**

The May 2008 Planning Update #1 was made available to FWS staff and the general public throughout the scoping period. 450 of 500 hardcopies were distributed to Refuge office visitors and partners, scoping meeting attendees, and 66 individuals and 35 organizations on the mailing list. An electronic copy of the Planning Update was available for visitors to the FWS website (accessed at: <http://www.fws.gov/pacific/planning/main/docs/NV/docssheldon.htm>) and the website address was also included in a Dear Interested Party notification e-mail to 2,722 interested parties and FWS

staff nationwide. The Planning Update included background information on the Refuge in addition to the preliminary goals and issues to be considered in the CCP. Information about the CCP process, an invitation to attend four public open house meetings, and a solicitation for comments was also included.

## **Media Outreach & Press Coverage**

A news release, entitled “Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge Kicks Off Comprehensive Conservation Planning with Four Public Open House Meetings,” was released on May 5, 2008. The release was sent to a list serve of 45 media contacts and it was also posted on the Service’s Region 1 website (accessed at: <http://www.fws.gov/pacific/news/2008/SheldonCCPNR.pdf>). The news release and associated planning activities resulted in various subsequent media articles.

## **Scoping Meetings**

The scoping meetings began with a PowerPoint presentation giving an overview of the Refuge and the importance and logistics of the CCP process. Following the power point presentation there were four informational tables set up with Refuge employees available to receive public questions. The informational tables each featured different topics; they were Wildlife and Habitat Management, Public Use and Facilities, Feral Horses and Burros, and the Planning Process. ## **Summary of Comments**

### **Camping**

#### **Dispersed Primitive Camping**

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
4756	Do not restrict camping to just a few select areas. Hunters are individualistic and despise crowded campgrounds.

#### **General Camping**

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
31	The CCP should include a no-fee camping option so that low-income people can enjoy the Refuge, experience wilderness and learn about nature firsthand, and develop a better understanding of ecosystem interactions.
1802	Camping and recreational facilities need to be improved. For example, the campground at the head of Hell Creek (previously removed) should be re-established as an improved camping area.
1802	The Devany campground should be improved to provide level spots to pitch tents and latrines should be added. The Rock Springs (commenter did not specify east or west) camping area is also in a similarly poor condition for camping.
1802	The RV camping should be improved at Big Springs to prevent degradation of the lakeside and water. Since camping is limited to designated sites, these camp sites as a whole need to be improved and increased in quantity.
3818	Recreation impacts will require varying levels of mitigation.
4833	The USFWS should clearly identify in the CCP recreational and mining activities which are compatible with the wildlife mandate of the Refuge and those which require more regulation or elimination.
4833	The CCP should include a number of additional semi-primitive campgrounds which can be added as demand increases.
4833	Campground hosts should be secured each year during the high use seasons to help maintain order and public safety.

## Mgmt/Facilities of Semi-primitive Campgrounds

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Provide water for campers at designated campgrounds. (4768, 4786)
129	User fees should be set high enough to pay for piping water to camps that have been moved away from riparian areas, doing clean-ups, and enforcement patrols.
829	Current controls on campsites and vehicular traffic are adequate.
904	I suggest clearly marking the existing camping area at Catnip Reservoir to limit capacity and clear guidance for overflow camping locations.
959	Limited access by vehicles on existing roads, and possibly some expanded camping facilities, should support a trail system for foot or horseback access to the majority of the Refuge.
3816	Because of its remoteness, Refuge camping should be allowed and designed to assist visitors seeking high quality wildlife-dependent recreation, with priority given to the six activities identified in the 1997 amendments to Refuge law.
3822	I appreciate the primitive character of campgrounds and in general do not wish to see more campgrounds developed.
3822	In order to protect water resources, the Service should make construction and management of outhouses a priority. The pack-it-out policy encourages a leave-it-as-you-found-it ethic while allowing access to the Refuge.
3824	Address humans camping too close to water sources.
4684	I 'd like to see a more developed camp sites a Catnip Reservoir. At certain times of the year I have observed people camping in places that I believe are harmful to the lake and the shoreline.
4819	Improve trash collection by providing a dumpster at the Dufferrena Campground.
4824	NDOW does not support restrictive actions affecting camp sites and limiting the public to 100 people maximum on the Complex.
4871	Recreational activities should also be managed to restore and maintain a healthy sagebrush ecosystem on the Refuge.

### Relocation of Semi-primitive Campgrounds

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Many commenters agree that camping areas close to riparian, wetlands, and/or springs, should be moved to locations that will minimize potential impacts to those resources. (129, 3789, 3816, 4123, 4688, 4707, 4716, 4824, 4833)
959	The wetlands should be preserved as part of the greater ecosystem and not necessarily as recreation sites. Fishing, boating, and camping on or near these critical areas may need to be limited to preserve habitat for native species first. Camping sites may need to be moved away from wetlands.
4123	Campsites should be primitive in nature and located far enough away from water areas to minimize possible contamination.
4707	Although expensive, I believe it is necessary to move most designated camping areas some distance away from springs. Some spring water should be piped to the new camp areas, or if not feasible, others could be designated as "dry" (no water camping areas). In no instance should a campground be on or near Sheldon's few aspen groves.
4833	Any semi-primitive campground that is negatively impacting the ecosystem should be relocated.

### Virgin Valley Campground

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Some commenters suggest a host at the Virgin Valley campground during peak usage periods will help maintain order and public safety. (142, 4833)
M	Some commenters agreed that discrete, designated camping sites at the Virgin Valley campground and enforcement of their use is necessary to curtail camping sprawl. They also agreed that a length of stay limitation be enforced. (142, 3822)
3822	The Virgin Valley campground is a dusty open area that is treated more like a parking lot. Consider sites defined by rocks to allow people to realize it is a campground.
4833	The Virgin Valley campground should be improved. The USFWS should charge a camping fee to fund the improvements.

### Wildlife-related Camping Information Needs

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
4833	Interpretive programs should be offered to acquaint visitors with the purposes and goals of the Refuge.

## **Cultural Resources**

### General Cultural Resources

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	A few commenters agreed that historic and prehistoric resources need to be identified and protected and that treaty rights and privileges are addressed appropriately. (4706, 4833, 4875)
32	We have enough peletonological and prehistoric resources. They do not need to be a Refuge priority. There are more important things on which to spend our tax dollars.
3815	The CCP should take into consideration the cultural heritage and enjoyment of visitors that want to view the wild horses and burros and consider them a natural part of the ecosystem.
4707	Besides springs, I have found that aspen areas were much favored by native peoples for camp grounds. Both areas should be protected from grazers and humans. Even after 120 years of disturbance around springs, arrowheads and other artifacts still become exposed from grazing, wind and water erosion. Fencing (native wood preferred) should be placed especially around aspen groves.
4724	The commenter requests information about restoration work at the Last Chance Ranch and general information about other architecturally significant structures in the refuge.
4756	The theme of the refuge should be "Western Culture" in nature. Do not allow vendors to set up shop anywhere on the refuge.

### Interpretation

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
3816	Mining should not continue on the Refuge. Refuge interpretive programs can convey information and describe the role mining played in the history of the local region.
3816	The prehistory, history and resulting cultural elements of the Refuge and adjacent areas, as integrally related to the wildlife and habitats, represent important hallmarks of our Nation's history and of the evolution of America's commitment to conservation of fish, wildlife and plants within a land system devoted to those demanding special needs.
4833	The CCP should provide opportunities for the public to enjoy the Refuge's cultural resources.

Preserve Historic Structures

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
20	The Service should allocate money to repair and maintain the historic Virgin Valley Ranch homestead as a piece of history.
3816	Mining should not continue on the Refuge. The existing patented mines within the Refuge can be used to convey the historic and contemporary values and human interest of the early mining era of western America.
4756	Maintain the stage stop located west of the Thousand Creek Ranch. Maintain all other historical buildings within the refuge boundary, especially the IXL in Guano Valley and all CCC improvements located on the refuge.
4833	The CCP should address ways to protect the historic and prehistoric cultural resources.

## Development of Alternatives

### General Development of Alternatives

ID	Comment
M	The alternatives should include special emphasis on nurturing the natural processes that still exist on the refuge and restoring them where possible. (4656, 4666)
M	Commenters, for various reasons, expressed the desire for alternatives that include provisions for adding land to the Refuge including lands to link the pronghorn migration corridor between the Sheldon and Hart Mountain NWRs. (3816, 4833, 4861)
M	Alternatives should include a plan to acquire in-holdings within the refuge. (4656, 4833)
M	Some commenters expressed concern that alternatives be developed that comply with the "benefit to wildlife first" concept and not based on human recreation demands. (13, 22, 1021)
M	Some commenters requested that Congress designate all qualifying lands on the refuge as wilderness including the existing wilderness designation recommendations and any portions of the refuge that may have been previously overlooked. (3821, 4656)
M	Some commenters feel the Service should be proactive in developing management alternatives that account for climate change in management strategies and objectives. They also suggest incorporating this information into visitor information and programs. (3810, 3811)
32	Protect the habitat of the Refuge but don't go over the top by changing the entire environment. Some changes come naturally.
135	The cost of gathering horses is reportedly near \$2,000 each. The entire population of horses could be removed from the Refuge for less than \$4 million. I have heard that the cost of fencing the remainder of the Refuge would require another \$1 million. So for roughly \$5 million, most (not all) of your \$1 million annual management expense would be eliminated for the remainder of the 15 year plan.
141	Develop the alternatives to be analyzed based on truth and not on the notion that "that will never happen."
3789	Do not reduce the size of the Refuge.
3801	Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate establishing an ethical oversight committee made up of credible individuals and groups to work with Sheldon NWR staff.
3801	Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate gathers conducted on horseback with specific focus on maintaining natural, intact herd structure.

- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate adoption policies that only allow horses between the ages of 8 months and 3 years to be available for adoption to individuals and gelding all colts.
- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate managing remaining populations with birth control techniques such as PZP.
- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate a target of 600 horses and 100 burros and a long-term management plan to manage herds of 150 each for the 4 distinctly identifiable herds: Catnip Herd, Fish Creek Herd, Badger Mountain Herd, Big Springs Herd.
- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate the release of compromised horses and those 15 years and over onto their range after being given a 3-year PZP immunocontraceptive or permanent sterilization.
- 3808 Please consider establishment of the Refuge as a true sanctuary closed to hunting and trapping.
- 3808 Please consider adopting a management policy stipulating that in instances where wildlife, including wild horses/burros, appears to be a threat to property, facilities, human safety, habitat, or special status species, that humane, non-lethal management techniques will be employed first, prior to any consideration of lethal methods.
- 3808 Please consider restriction or prohibition of the use of moist soil management and water manipulation practices and lethal predator control in favor of re-establishing natural conditions and ecological relationships.
- 3809 Adopt alternatives that include hunting for predator species, such as coyote, as a means of managing the predator populations.
- 3813 Until potential wilderness areas have been designated, the Service has the responsibility to keep those lands in suitable condition for designation as wilderness.
- 3817 For comparison purposes, I would like the Service to include reasonable estimates for wildlife species exclusively within the Refuge as well as estimated reductions in these same species if the Service offered an alternative that included management plans for a range of wild horse numbers between 400-800 and 80-150 burros.
- 3821 Alternatives considered should include looking at the existing wilderness recommendations and providing a restoration component if any of these lands have had their wilderness values compromised in the intervening years.
- 3821 Alternatives considered should include looking at the adjustments that could be made to directly link travel management with wilderness management.
- 4529 The CCP should clearly identify areas needing restoration (i.e. fence or development removal, weed removal, restoring damage from off road vehicles, etc). A priority list of these areas should be developed so that limited staff and funds can be focused most effectively.
- 4656 We request that the Preferred Alternative state that no vehicle travel be allowed off of designated routes.

- 4666 Areas needing restoration should be identified as part of the planning process (i.e. fence or development removal, weed removal, restoring damage from off road vehicles, etc).
- 4754 If the refuge adopted option B1 which is how the refuge guidelines are set up you would accomplish all the refuge's goals.
- 4833 The USFWS should clearly identify in the CCP recreational and mining activities which are compatible with the wildlife mandate of the Refuge and those which require more regulation or elimination.
- 4833 Please include an alternative which zeroes out all wild horses and burros on the Sheldon and introduces a future management plan which will keep wild horses and burros at negligible levels at minimal costs.
- 4833 Please identify lands with critical wildlife values outside the refuge and their acquisition opportunities.
- 4875 Alternatives should evaluate the effects of livestock grazing on special status species, water and soil quality, and the potential for the colonization of noxious weeds.
- 4875 If silviculture activities will be conducted in the project area, the EIS should discuss habitat and wildlife impacts, access issues, retention of a healthy ecosystem during and after disturbance activities, and reduction of potential for invasive species colonization as discussed in EO 13112.
- 4875 The EPA recommends that the project include a monitoring program designed to assess both impacts from the project and the effectiveness of measures utilized to mitigate impacts.

## Feral Horse and Burro Management

### Adoption & Other Off-refuge Treatments

ID	Comment
M	Many commenters support complete removal of the feral horses and burros from the refuge. (4761, 4769, 4778, 4779, 4781, 4783, 4786, 4787, 4790, 4791, 4792, 4793, 4800, 4804, 4807, 4810, 4812)
M	Only the most humane techniques should be used during gathering, transport, and resettlement. (6, 781, 782, 1009, 3801, 3950)

904	If horses are impacting the environment as negatively as you say, get rid of them. You could feed the homeless with them as far as I'm concerned. I agree that they ARE inspirational in some deep way, very cute and lovable and all that, but they DON'T BELONG THERE!
1750	Try to work with rescues to relocate these animals.
2303	With generations of wild breeding, the horses will not be easily broken.
2721	Please continue to manage herd size with small adoptions.

- 3801 A small number of horses should be adopted from the Refuge.
- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate adoption policies that only allow horses between the ages of 8 months and 3 years to be available for adoption to individuals and gelding all colts.
- 3813 Humane removal with adoption programs should be considered for horses and burros.
- 3818 The horses on the Refuge are helping to glut the adoption and holding system used by other federal land managers.
- 3820 Horse and burro management may include a variety of tools such as adopting to Amish and Mennonite groups, Native American tribes, commercial rodeos or zoos, ranchers, and relocation to other states.
- 4072 Provide better incentives for adoption such as cheaper adoption fees and vouchers for tack, trailers, and feed.
- 4742 I oppose killing wild horses and burros. Adoption would be fine as long as they go to good owners and shelters and not to rodeos.
- 4828 I advocate the removal of horses from the Sheldon to a maximum population not exceeding 125 as has been the policy for the last 20 or so years.
- 4872 Bring the wild horse population down to a level compatible with protection of wildlife habitat by using humane removal and adoption measures.

47	There is room for all the wild animals on the Refuge: wild horses, burros, bison, sheep, etc. We need them all and maintaining a natural predator/prey balance will ensure their place.
714	The wild horses don't damage the plants. They only eat some plants and those plants grow back in a balanced ecosystem. Our current problem for the environment are masses of cows grazing on wide spaces of land leaving little vegetation left over.
787	Nature has adjusted to horses being there, so why can't you.
823	Do not disturb horse habitat.
874	We must trust nature to let species and ecosystems thrive and take their natural course.
967	We do not have a right to alter the balance of nature regarding horses.
1035	Another concerns their natural ability to spread their grazing pressure over a very large area and their tendency not to concentrate at riparian sites, as European evolved cattle tend to do.

- 3808 The wild horses/burros possess an existence value. While some may wish to control or eradicate the wild horse/burro populations due to alleged environmental/ecological impacts, there are many others who enjoy the aesthetic, spiritual, cultural, historic, iconic, ecological and inherent value of wild horses/burros on the landscape.
- 3812 European equines are one of the main taxonomic groups considered as plausible taxonomic and ecological proxies for extinct North American equine species. Modern horses and burros may serve as a substitute for large grazers such as the American bison, which fill a similar niche.
- 3812 Regarding the attempt to argue that horses and burros are competing with other ungulate species, it is incorrect that they compete for food resources. Niche partitioning is typical of systems where multiple ungulate species exist in the same habitat (consider the cohabitation of wildebeests, antelope, and zebras in the African savannah).
- 3823 The CCP needs to address any benefits horses may provide and how their numbers and impact can be managed in a cost effective timely manner.
- 4141 They help control plant overgrowth and are themselves a food source for large predators.
- 4159 Wild horses and burros trample vegetation into mulch, which protects and holds moisture in the soil.
- 4858 There should be scientific data on all wild horses and burros so that they can remain in the wild without being disturbed by people and civilization.

- 740 While killing and culling may be easy, it flies in the face of the protection and stewardship that we Americans hold dear. If there are those that must be euthanized, do it with trained and certified staff in the least disruptive and least traumatizing manner.
- 791 I strongly urge that you live up to your mission and **NOT REMOVE THESE WONDROUS MAJESTIC WILD EQUINES FROM THEIR HOME!**
- 795 Please rethink taking so many horses during a round-up or removing all of them. It is very important to so many people that you leave them be.
- 830 Please prevent action against the horses on the Refuge. A sensible, kind, and well thought through policy should be in place for these animals. Make up for past cruelties.

- 855 No more suffering or pain should come to any life that we most certainly can prevent.
- 903 Do not endanger foals.
- 914 Humans are in the process of wiping out all natural beauty and wild animals. Please do NOT contribute to the abolition of this magnificent natural world.
- 991 Society is already overloaded with rescues due to the increasing cost for feed and board. The fate of the horses would not be promising [if they were rounded up].
- 1027 Only the most humane gathering techniques should be used (excluding helicopters) and only experienced contractors must be employed after clearing thorough criminal background checks.
- 1035 It would be such a shame to reduce this herd to a tiny level, to thwart its natural tendency to fit in here, such an injustice!
- 1674 It is a tragedy that the wild horse and burro herds are being treated as they are in these round ups.
- 1727 Before commencing roundups, there should be unequivocal evidence that the horses and burrows are indeed having a demonstrable negative effect on the populations of native species.
- 1799 The "hunt" for horses is inhumane and should not be done during the foaling season.
- 1922 Preservation of other resources are not a reason to impart suffering on another species.
- 2303 Only do a round-up once a year.
- 2721 Please verify that the wild horse and burro herds are creating a problem for water and food sources before any herd management is completed.
- 3112 The USFWS manages human activities in order to have the least impact on the land and animals, the same should be done with the horses and burros without resorting to removal.
- 3648 The wild horse herd should be reduced to remain in balance with the other species.
- 3741 Round-ups separate families (bands) of horses, which can cause psychological damage to the horses. This can often result in death, as a horse tries to return to its family.
- 3789 Please keep a manageable herd of wild horses.
- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate gathers conducted on horseback with specific focus on maintaining natural, intact herd structure.
- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate the release of compromised horses and those 15 years and over onto their range after being given a 3-year PZP immunocontraceptive or permanent sterilization.

- 3801 Gatherings should be monitored by oversight groups as witnesses (and perhaps as volunteer assistants in support roles). That would help to hone the gather techniques and provide confidence to a skeptical public.

- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology. The analysis should include information/data documenting the historic presence/absence, population abundance, and population characteristics of wild horses/burros inhabiting the Refuge and surrounding state, federal, and private lands.
- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology. The analysis should include information/data documenting the biology and ecology of wild horses/burros on the Refuge based on studies conducted on the Refuge or involving horses/burros occupying habitats/conditions similar to those found at Sheldon (any claims by the Service regarding wild horse/burro impacts must be substantiated by credible scientific data documentation).
- 3815 The earlier EA references a convicted criminal, Dave Cattoor, as an expert. This glaring disregard for the use of public funds to hire and reference a criminal contractor convicted for violating federal law discredits the EA report. It was simply a violation and betrayal of the public trust.
- 3820 Management tools to reduce the impact of horses may include working jointly with the BLM to conduct emergency and scheduled horse and burro gathers so that horse and burro populations do not suffer from lack of food supplies due to overpopulation on the public lands comprising range areas in Humboldt County.
- 3820 Only in the most extreme circumstances should euthanizing wild horses and burros be employed as a remedy of last resort for the protection and preservation of the antelope population at your Refuge in accordance with your mission and stewardship responsibilities to protect antelope.
- 3991 Do not take action on the wild horses until the CCP is finalized.

- 3999 Population control should be used.
- 4014 The wild horses should be monitored and other alternatives for management should be scientifically researched, other than contraception.
- 4039 We must maintain the wild horse herds.
- 4068 The animals should be left to the natural predator/prey balance.
- 4072 Geld the males leaving one or two stallions to reproduce, allowing for a lower birthrate and better population control.
- 4114 The FWS should be held accountable for its management practices that protect game species for hunters and destroy the natural balance of our ecosystems.
- 4179 Consider the connectedness between humanity and all life on the planet to determine the management program.
- 4235 The management program for the wild horses and burros should be what is best for the entire herd.
- 4309 I do not believe roundups are necessary and believe evidence should be provided to the public to justify roundups.
- 4437 Evaluate all non-relocation alternatives. Humane round-ups should only be considered as a last resort, after other non-removal options have been explored.
- 4480 Please give the horses a good life.
- 4563 I do not support unreasonable roundups.
- 4610 I am against rounding up wild horses. There is no need for a round up on land that can sustain them. Herds self-regulate with the seasons.
- 4610 Please count the horses at Sheldon rather than relying on computer models. Please assign accountability for the number of horses gathered.
- 4640 If the CCP were to include roundup of horses and burros, an expert in herd dynamics should be involved to ensure the integrity of the herd social structure and to ensure the stability of the family units.
- 4681 I urge that there be an immediate and extensive reduction in the wild horse population on the Sheldon by whatever means necessary, including euthanasia.
- 4705 Sheldon's gather operations have had and will continue to have a public relations effect on the ability of the BLM and USFS to continue to gather the horses and burros necessary to comply with the law. This effect can have significant impacts on our citizens who graze federal range that is within Herd Management Areas.
- 4705 The Refuge should coordinate its gather operations with BLM and USFS and utilize the years of expertise existing in these agencies to minimize fall out from gathering these animals.

- 4715 Horse catch results could be improved by allowing a year-long gathering season with some exceptions, that being during foaling season. In addition, gathering quotas can be increased from previous quota restrictions.
- 4719 Please respond as to whether the July 16, 2008 helicopter we observed was a round-up and if successful how many horses were you able to remove from the Refuge.
- 4722 Please halt all roundups to conduct more research on the horses and how other species in their environment are affected to see if future roundups are necessary.
- 4728 I commend your well documented horse/burro plan. I support possible sterilization of older horses. If that is doable, why not target a few younger mares and studs to keep the population from growing and even setting a lower target population each year until the critters are eliminated.
- 4730 The commenter asks if the refuge is planning on killing burros and horses as a means to control them.
- 4736 Find a way to sterilize the mares.
- 4741 Please provide the annual estimated number of horses and burros scheduled to be remove or killed between 2008 to 2012. Please provide annual numbers.
- 4754 If the total number of horses and burros are not trimmed to the objective levels then the entire northwest corner of Nevada is going to be overrun with feral animals.
- 4757 Topics that need to be addressed in the CCP include too many wild horses.
- 4819 I strongly suggest a program to place salt off Highway 140 to help keep wild burros & horses from harm/accidents.
- 4820 Measures should be accomplished to avoid undue damage to natural resources and allow herd numbers to exceed future funding to resolve conflicts in the foreseeable future.
- 4823 I would hope you would keep the management plan as originally intended.
- 4823 I had the chance to speak with personnel involved in a round-up being completed on horseback. This round-up was not successful; however, the in following year, helicopters were used much more successfully.
- 4833 Please include an alternative which zeroes out all wild horses and burros on the Sheldon and introduces a future management plan which will keep wild horses and burros at negligible levels at minimal costs.
- 4833 The Toiyabe Chapter no longer believe that the USFWS is capable of managing the wild horse and burro populations at the optimum 75-125 level without unacceptable impacts to wildlife, the Refuge budget, and the Refuge mandates.
- 4858 Wild horses and burros should be managed as wildlife, not feral animals of domestic animals.
- 4874 Evaluate different forms of population control, if population control is necessary.

- 4876 Humane population management should occur for all wildlife populations.
- 4876 Wild horses and burros should be sterilized and marked in a humane manner before release.

- 135 The cost of gathering horses is reportedly near \$2,000 each. The entire population of horses could be removed from the Refuge for less than \$4 million. I have heard that the cost of fencing the remainder of the Refuge would require another \$1 million. So for roughly \$5 million, most (not all) of your \$1 million annual management expense would be eliminated for the remainder of the 15 year plan.
- 605 It costs little to allow horses and burros to remain compared to the unquantifiable value of having them.
- 694 The horse and burro situation would be a wonderful opportunity for population control studies.
- 810 Nurture the natural predators of horses so that populations can be controlled.
- 853 Humans should not manage horse and burro populations because they can not even manage themselves.
- 866 The West once supported 2 million horses and burros, the current population of horses and burros will not overgraze the range.
- 900 If people want the horses left unmanaged tell them they can haul hay out and feed them or take them home.
- 1629 Removing the horses to protect the water resources and to increase the populations of pronghorn antelope and sage grouse narrowly reflects the needs of the hunting population only.
- 1708 Ranching experience in New Mexico shows it is possible to maintain viable populations of antelope while raising herds of cattle and horses on the same range.
- 1738 Please do not eliminate the community of varied species, including antelope, sage hens, and wild horses living together.
- 1864 Wild horse and burro herds maintain a sustainable population based on available resources.
- 2002 Feral horses and burros are consuming a large part of Sheldon's operating budget.
- 3292 I do not understand why there is no money to protect the wild horses when the United States has the last few herds in the entire world.
- 3801 The Refuge has based decisions for herd numbers on management numbers from BLM (i.e., BLM manages for 1200 acres per horse and with current Sheldon numbers; there are approximately 750 acres per horse [800 horses on 600,000 acres]). We would urge caution in comparing numbers such as these. Range or Herd Area herd numbers must be evaluated through unbiased studies per area - varying climate, habitat types, precipitation patterns, vegetation, land use objectives, and other wildlife are all considerations in determining appropriate numbers per area.

- 3801 I am pleased that the Refuge will establish an enclosure study to document current impacts to upland and riparian sites by horses and burros. Empirical data collected at the Refuge can assist in developing appropriate horse population numbers.
- 3801 Target management numbers for Sheldon NWR of 75-125 horses and 30-60 burros were developed when cattle grazed the refuge. Because cattle have been removed and horses presently on-site seem in healthy condition, it is appropriate to change the original target levels for horses and burros on the refuge. Gus Cothran's work implies that herds of 150 individuals are genetically viable populations. Therefore, the Refuge should manage for 600 horses: 150 in each of the 4 herds on the Refuge.
- 3801 Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate a target of 600 horses and 100 burros and a long-term management plan to manage herds of 150 each for the 4 distinctly identifiable herds: Catnip Herd, Fish Creek Herd, Badger Mountain Herd, Big Springs Herd.
- 3804 "Wherever man has left his footprint

- 3807 What would one gain by removing these animals? Why not let them be? Loyalty and the love of our country is what brings so many people to protest and complain about these obscure announcements and decisions to round up wild horses. What message is being sent when we treat these icons and mascots inhumanely and/or euthanize them?
- 3808 The Service must disclose and analyze the history of domestic livestock use of the Refuge including historic impact of such use on Refuge range conditions, vegetation, and ecosystem function and management or restoration actions taken since livestock use of the Refuge was terminated. Considering the often long-term impacts of domestic livestock management practices on arid ecosystems, many of the impacts that are frequently attributed to wild horses/burros may have begun with and/or been caused by historic livestock grazing practices.
- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology. The analysis should include a comprehensive review of the history of wild horses and burros in N. America and on the Refuge, including examination of archaeological and fossil records and historic records to document the circumstances that led to the establishment of wild horses/burros on the Refuge.
- 3812 Based upon the clear lack of financial resources, it behooves the Refuge to revise its quarter-century old horse and burro management goals to reflect the current financial and biological state of the Refuge.
- 3814 Wild horses require in-depth study to ensure their well-being.

- 3815 The bighorn sheep are reintroduced and are deemed critical to the Refuge, particularly by hunters, and are not considered exotic species. How can the CCP allow that bighorn sheep are more native than the wild horse. Patricia Fazio, PhD and Jay Kirkpatrick, PhD published an exhibit that concludes the horse is indeed native wildlife.
- 3815 As recently as 2006 the Refuge referred to the horse as "wild" on their website. That acceptance of them as an inherent part of the ecosystem and wildlife appears to be deliberately slanted by CCP scoping documents that reference horses as feral. The use of the term feral discredits the wild horse's natural and entitled existence.
- 3815 The CCP Update has a biased approach to the wild horses. It notes the horses and burros pose a public safety risk on roads, citing traffic accident data. The report does not list traffic accidents with other wildlife, what is it? How does it compare to horses and burros?
- 3817 While NDOW or Nevada Bighorns Unlimited or any other big game/wildlife group may at first balk at the idea of looking for ways to help "finance" wild horse management, may I remind everyone that they are ALREADY picking up the tab without reimbursement. This would solve funding issues for both wild horses and burros and provide funding for legitimate habitat improvements and those with interest in big game and other wildlife preservation efforts.
- 4006 It is important for population control to keep a balance of predators and prey as well as grazers and plants.
- 4529 Horse populations should be proactively managed to ensure that they do not reach excessive or harmful levels in the future.
- 4603 Allowing wild horse and burro populations on the Sheldon negate the purposes for which livestock were removed.
- 4604 The USFWS must recognize the Sheldon horses as wild horses and a native wildlife species and protect them as such based on the evidence provided in the attached article ("Wild Horses as Native North American Wildlife").
- 4605 Consider digging a solar-powered well to produce water for the horses in areas with viable food sources and away from the highway. This will help move the horses away from a present source of water, although I feel that they have just as much right to the water as the other animals or plants.
- 4605 More aggressive signage would help reduce vehicle collisions with horses and burros.
- 4715 Feral horses must be controlled not only in numbers but the areas in which they are allowed to access. For example, riparian areas (especially springs) must be fenced off to protect the areas of concern.
- 4719 On my recent visit to Sheldon, I was shocked by the number of feral horses I observed. They appeared to be in every valley, on every hillside and table, and at every water source.
- 4719 Please estimate the totals you believe occupy the Refuge of the following; deer, antelope, sheep, and horses.

- 4721 Please continue to support the bill that protects and saves the mustangs.
- 4723 If the wild horses are going to be part of the makeup of our state, the management and control of their population must be kept in check.
- 4735 Wild horses are a native species.
- 4737 I firmly believe in the conservation of antelope and other native wildlife forms but I question how selling horses helps.
- 4739 I object to the FONSI status of the revised plan for managing feral horses and burros at Sheldon.
- 4744 Thank you for your reply and explanation for handling the horses and burros.
- 4746 Protect native wildlife and its habitat and eliminate feral animal management programs.
- 4747 I very much appreciate the update you provided and feel hopeful for the animals and their future.
- 4751 I would like to know if you have a timetable for any action and specifically regarding burros. Could you tell me what the numbers are.
- 4756 Install pipelines and run water from springs downhill approximately one-quarter mile or more for horses.
- 4796 Wild horses and burros are expensive to manage.
- 4820 The FONSI will create an unmanageable situation with wild horse and burro numbers.
- 4820 The Nevada Department of Wildlife finds significant threat from ingress of BLM horses to the Sheldon.
- 4823 I observed very high horse numbers in the area around Catnip Reservoir.
- 4828 It is irresponsible and negligent to continue to manage the wild horse population in the current manner.
- 4874 Do not repeat the wild horse management mistakes of the BLM and Wild Horse Association.

M	Horses, in reasonable numbers, have no adverse affects on other animals of the Refuge. (1603, 1629)
M	There are many horse management areas in Nevada. The Refuge should be an area protected from horses and the damage they inflict on other species and their habitats. (141, 3818, 3821, 3823)
35	The number one objective of the Refuge will be met if there is a reduction in the number of feral horses and burros.
133	I have nothing against horses but there are reasons for controlling all wildlife, including horses. One reason is to maintain habitat for all that live in the area.
135	The science showing horses' detrimental effect on habitat is well known, the Refuge staff should not be swayed by emotion of the issue. Knowing that government is often blind to science and attentive to emotion, it is my sincere hope that you will address the budgetary perspective and tip the scales in favor of a zero-horse plan.
138	Our wild horse population represents an uncontrolled feral problem animal. Wild horses provide a reservoir for disease and increase the risk for disease spreading to domestic horses.
138	I consider allowing horses to have free range as irresponsible and cruel to a wonderful animal population. Uncontrolled horse populations represent an undeniable threat to our habitat, native wild animals, and domestic animals. The Refuge is an example of a fragile ecosystem that should not be stressed or compromised by free ranging wild horses.
711	What damage is being done? The only reason you are rounding up these horses is because of the ranchers. They want everything for their cattle and they seem to get their way. I have seen land that cattle have overgrazed, and it is just bare land. The horses do not damage the range any way near the way cattle do.
790	Use horse and burro management techniques that consider all aspects of the ecosystem.

- 893 I recommend that the horses be removed from the Refuge or be kept at the recommended levels (75-125). The Refuge has been turned into a BLM holding corral for horses to the detriment of the wildlife that the Refuge is supposed to be managing.
- 908 Humans are in the process of wiping out all natural beauty and wild animals. Please do NOT contribute to the abolition of this magnificent natural world.
- 993 Horses and burros should be removed. They are not native.
- 1603 Horses are not predators.
- 1802 If the springs and water sources are protected from horses and burros, the vegetation and riparian habitat will also be protected.
- 2013 The horses may have reduced the antelope population.
- 3789 The Sheldon Refuge should preserve some horses in order to study the effects of horse grazing on the desert environment.
- 3801 If horses have degraded riparian systems, the 2004 photo at Big Creek vs. the 2005 photo would seem to show remarkable recovery for a degraded system. Severely degraded systems take many, many years to recover. All animals use the ecosystem, why is horse damage different than damage done by badger, pronghorn, deer, or other wildlife?
- 3801 The EA states that horses exclude other wildlife from visiting riparian zones. Data for this does not seem to be statistically significant. It would be unusual for horses to posture or become aggressive to other types of wildlife at a drinking hole. In fact, it has been observed that pronghorn will follow groups of horses, associating with them presumably for protection from predators. The National Park Service removed horses from Anza Borrego, CA and noticed a drop in pronghorn numbers due to cougar predation after the horses were removed.
- 3801 Many variables should be considered when applying other habitat studies to the Refuge. Those variables include: amount of precipitation, horse density in the study area, presence of cattle, years of monitoring, years of grazing or overgrazing, and habitat condition.
- 3801 It is noted that the Refuge will establish an enclosure study to document current impacts to upland and riparian sites by horses and burros. I am pleased by this. While I do not believe that horses cause no damage, I do believe that empirical data collected at Sheldon can assist in developing appropriate population numbers for horses at Sheldon.
- 3801 There is mention, in the EA, of horses destroying woody vegetation near riparian zones and songbirds being displaced because of this. Because cattle ranged this land - in far greater number - and did significant amounts of damage, the horses have, in effect, inherited a less-than-pristine ecosystem. Further, cattle are known to damage woody vegetation, horses are not known for this.

- 3801 Many of the fences are in disrepair and the troughs are not functioning. Perhaps some of the more-sensitive riparian habitats could be fenced off and the troughs repaired in an effort to stabilize these zones and allow wildlife, including horses, to drink from these sources without impacting streamside vegetation.
- 3803 If cattle were causing habitat damage during a 5-6 month grazing presence and were removed, I do not understand why horses are allowed to cause damage year-round.
- 3806 The Refuge must remain mustang and burro free to provide wildlife habitat that is protected from non-native disturbance.
- 3811 Our primary concerns include achieving control of non-native, invasive horses and burros that are having undeniable and devastating ecological consequences and the management of them is siphoning off a majority of the operations and maintenance budget of the refuge.
- 3816 Invasive species, whether plant or animal, must be given priority in management actions. Some of the species will require long-term control efforts and carefully planned, systematic endeavor to eliminate or control the intruders. The discussion of horse and burro management might best be placed within the discussion of Goal statements.
- 3817 I would like the Service to provide a reasonable assessment of current and potential carrying capacity for wildlife species through both citations of forage production, number of all available water sources, and measured flow rates during both abundant conditions, drought conditions, and harsh winter conditions to help project an average of availability as well as target population objectives within the CCP for all major big game species and significant other wildlife species, such as sage grouse. For comparison purposes, I would like the Service to include reasonable estimates for wildlife species exclusively within the Refuge as well as estimated reductions in these same species if the Service offered an alternative that included management plans for a range of wild horses between 400-800 and 80-150 burros.
- 3818 Many of the historical enclosures, designed to protect resources from livestock and cattle, have been compromised and the integrity of those projects has been lost by feral horse use.
- 3818 Remove all the horses and burros from the Refuge and manage to maintain a zero population. They cannot be justified if no grazing is allowed.
- 3818 I cannot figure out the rationale as to why the Hart Mountain Refuge is a horse free wildlife refuge and the Sheldon Refuge continues to develop plans to incorporate these feral ungulates into the management equation. The horse management program has cost countless dollars that should be emphasized on native wildlife species and habitat related research to deal with the myriad of species across their respective ranges. This is a wildlife refuge, not a horse/burro sanctuary.
- 3818 How do you control utilization and season of use with feral horses and burros, considering that no grazing is allowed on the Refuge?
- 3818 The huge expenditure directed to the horse/burro program on the Refuge is unjustified. If we amortize the horse budget into the future at its current rate, we will be seriously compromising the wildlife needs and values on the Sheldon.

- 3819 The removal of all wild horses should be accelerated to ensure wildlife food and cover plus watershed protection.
- 3820 Please manage Refuge habitat to reduce the negative impact of wild horse and burro overgrazing at the expense of range food for antelope.
- 3821 The research on the refuge is clear and consistent that wild horses are damaging the riparian and upland habitats. There are plenty of places throughout Nevada where our wild horses can roam free. There are few if any large blocks of land in Nevada that are truly free of both livestock grazing and wild horses. This would be a unique opportunity for scientific studies where both of these activities are absent.
- 3822 Wild horses can have significant negative impacts on native plants and habitat for native wildlife. At one level, they must be viewed as essentially invasive species, which can have a growth rate of up to 20% per year leading to rapid overpopulation.
- 3823 Because of the disturbance horses cause on the land and the distances they travel, they are vehicles for weed dispersal. Horse advocates may be unaware of the impact of horses. The literature on horses virtually never discusses horse food consumption impacts on desert plants. Popular literature glorifies man's association with horses. However, most popular literature fails to address the impact of horses, cows and sheep on natural resources. It is tucked away in technical papers.
- 3823 Cheat grass, the nemesis of the West, covers millions of acres, partly as a result of livestock grazing. The same scenario could occur in the Refuge. Therefore the plan needs to address any benefits horses may provide and how their numbers and impact can be managed in a cost effective timely manner.
- 3824 The Wild Horse and Burro Act does not apply to the National Refuge System. The Refuge has the potential to be the largest un-grazed study plot in the Great Basin. Clearly the highest public value will be achieved by protecting the Refuge's scientific value for both wildlife and vegetation.
- 4123 The unique habitat native to the Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge is the last remaining vestige of the Great Basin and needs to be protected against invasive species, including feral horses and burros.
- 4335 Cattle, not horses, cause problems with overgrazing.
- 4704 I am in favor of zero tolerance for wild horses/burros. They are too destructive for the area.
- 4712 Wild horses have over-run and ruined critical wildlife habitat on the Sheldon and Northwest Nevada. They should be totally eliminated, or at the very least, drastically reduced in numbers.
- 4713 The Nevada Wilderness Project supports the reduction of feral horse and burro populations on the Sheldon Refuge. The Refuge has a mandate to provide valuable habitat for native species, and that non-native equids have drastically reduced the value of the Refuge to species such as sage grouse, American pronghorn, and bighorn sheep.

- 4713 The Sheldon Refuge should continue its history of management to restore and maintain habitats for sagebrush obligate species. Displacement of important native species and subsequent degradation of sagebrush habitats by feral horses and burros should no be allowed on the Refuge.
- 4746 I oppose spending taxpayer money to protect feral horses at the detriment of habitat for native species.
- 4756 Fence off springs and other riparian zones to keep horses from trampling the areas.
- 4766 Wild (feral) horses are the greatest threat to the fragile habitat. Please zero them out.
- 4776 Wild horses and burros negatively affect the antelope.
- 4785 Please protect the streams and other water bodies from non-native species.
- 4805 Please prepare a wild horse and burro management plan to control their impacts to the habitat.
- 4813 Wild horses and burros spread noxious weeds.
- 4822 Wild horses and burros do a great deal of damage when they are allowed to exceed approved animal management levels (AML).
- 4822 I know that at least some of the wild horse advocates do not fully appreciate the damage that wild horses and burros can do.
- 4824 The Refuge has direct impacts from Wild Horses and Burros without the influence of livestock, a situation that does not exist on other federal lands.
- 4827 The managed cattle were not as hard on the habitat as the thousand or more unmanaged feral horses that are over grazing these fragile environmentally sensitive lands.
- 4871 Wild horses and burros should not be allowed to displace native wildlife and damage the sagebrush ecosystem on the Refuge.

## Horses Are Not Wildlife

134	I strongly suggest that the feral horse and burro population on the Refuge be curtailed. A zero population goal is best to preserve the beauty of the area and to help maintain native wildlife species.
136	Like cattle, horses are not wildlife and should be removed from the Refuge.
138	Horses on the Refuge were introduced by European explorers. Findings of prehistoric horse precursors is a weak argument to try and prove horses are natives of North America.
932	Feral horses are not "wildlife" and should be removed or drastically reduced at the Refuge
4740	Horses and burros are invasive exotic wildlife that should be eliminated.

146	The rules that the Refuge follows are sometimes very destructive regarding horse and burro impacts. We have allowed the opposition to control the outcome by creating delays with years of research, politicizing the topic, and diverting funds. This has frustrated those that understand the impacts of horses and burros and prevented the steps that would fix it.
568	Do not let the cattle industry influence horse and burros policy.
866	Increase fees for ranchers who use our public lands and implement heavy fines on those who shoot horses and burros to provide funding for their protection.
900	Horse populations have not been maintained because regular round ups are not occurring.
901	Policies should reflect the greater good and public wishes.
931	Consider how money from the sale of animals will be used.
2402	Please take action through our elected officials to help these animals.
4775	Wild horse and burro management should be secondary to predator management.

- 4820 We encourage the USFWS to revisit the regulatory authorities governing the Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge and implement actions to achieve the management levels of the past decisions.
- 4823 Places like the Sheldon are too beautiful and unique to be altered by a change in management direction.

4713	The Sheldon Refuge should continue its history of management to restore and maintain habitats for sagebrush obligate species. Displacement of important native species and subsequent degradation of sagebrush habitats by feral horses and burros should not be allowed on the Refuge.

- 440 Let's keep the Wild West Wild! Please let the wild horses be. Some of the policies of the US Fish and Wildlife are turning the United States into a pale, uninteresting, vanilla landscape.
- 447 Please manage the horses and burros at the Refuge with respect, keeping them healthy. Keep the legacy of wilderness and wildlife in tact for future generations.
- 501 I realize these are not really wild animals but so many generations of being feral that the herds should be preserved.
- 534 Please let the wild horses of Nevada continue to live unbothered.
- 539 Please leave the horses and burros on this land, they are a remnant of our history.
- 580 I would like to see horses and burros preserved for those who might survive our uncertain future.
- 617 Please let them stay there and roam free as they should and have always done.
- 686 Please do not remove the horses, they are so precious.
- 695 Please preserve the wild horses. We need places where nature and wild animals can remain as oases from our mechanized, urban, concrete, jungle world.
- 719 Please let the wild horses and burros live free and wild at the Refuge. A wildlife refuge should actually BE a wildlife refuge!
- 818 I oppose any actions which would affect the viability of wild equine herds in the region because these free-ranging animals are an integral part of the high desert's history, ecology, diversity, and beauty.
- 842 Keep the horses and burros on the Refuge. They need a safe place and rely on the Service to protect them from those that do not understand their contribution to our country.
- 855 This was once a place where its native people lived free from government rule, where people came in pursuit of happiness, but more importantly where horses roamed wild, free, and happy! They are the only ones left that live the true American Dream!
- 881 Wild horses and burros belong in the Refuge. People value the wild horses as much as other wildlife.
- 892 These animals should be allowed to roam free. It is their right.
- 895 Populations of wild horses and burros should be allowed to live free and wild at the Refuge.
- 933 Our country was founded on the image of the magnificent wild horses and is used in many commercial ventures still. How can anyone think of killing and not protecting them? I am very much against any plan to kill the wild horses or burros!
- 934 Please let the horses roam free on the refuge. These wild animals make this land so awesome!

- 965 The wild horses should live free. Do not destroy everything. Leave them be.
- 983 They are already sharing the Refuge with antelope, sheep and other wildlife. Americans love wild horses and the iconic image they represent.
- 1439 Horses are an integral part of our world and are all needed.
- 1673 There is something special about knowing wild horses are still roaming free in our country.
- 1876 The horses are an integral part of nature and we should not hinder the natural process of these animals roaming free at this location or any other.
- 3303 The horses and burros are an historical part of this American landscape.
- 3815 I want to ensure that the historic wild horses and burros are retained on the Refuge. They are living monuments to our western heritage. The 1977 Plan notes that Service personnel would return mustang-like horses to the range to maintain a population similar to those originally introduced to the American West by early Spanish explorers. The horses on the Refuge go back to the Spanish horses brought by the conquistadores.
- 3817 The Service has been "managing" the wild equids at the Refuge for over 70 years. These same wild horses are believed to be direct descendants of the original Spanish mustangs, have well documented histories of being interbred by local ranchers dating back for over 100 years for utilization as Calvary re-mounts, were once protected under the Wild Free-Roaming Horse and Burro Act, and were also referenced on the Refuge website as Wild Horses and Burros. Recent changes in management began a marketing campaign to "re-brand" them as merely feral, non-native, invasive, exotic unwelcome members of the Refuge wildlife community that must be totally eradicated. The Service needs to keep their former promises to protect and preserve the Refuge equids, as the Service itself once identified them as a "unique and distinct population" and has options available through the National Wildlife Refuge System to allow them to continue to be preserved at Sheldon that must be exercised to prevent a betrayal of the public trust.
- 4136 The DNA analysis of fossil remains can be used to show that the "modern" horse is genetically identical to the horse species found in North America 1.7 million years ago. Therefore, the wild horse is a native species. It was reintroduced.
- 4431 The horses are important for Nevada tourism.
- 4722 Wild horses are a reintroduced native species. They served many purposes in the early development of our country.

## Fishing

### Maintenance/Management of Reservoirs and Ponds

4647	The warm water fishery in Dufferrena ponds should be maintained.
4684	I'd like to see more sport fishing opportunities provided. Please open some of the closed waters.
4824	Big Springs and Catnip Reservoir require the maintenance and management of impoundments created for historic agriculture.
4824	Magee Pond will retain its management for Senior and Junior anglers.
4824	Changes in the Big Springs, Virgin Camp and Catnip Reservoir areas could include additional fences and spaces.
4824	NDOW supports the maintenance of Alkali Reservoir to regulate flows affecting Virgin Creek.
4824	Dufferrena Ponds 19 and 20 will be maintained as recreational fishing for present species.
4824	Pond 13 would be better managed for wetland habitats. Hard stem bulrush and willow objectives should enhance water quality in the lower Virgin Creek drainage.
4824	Virgin Creek presents an outstanding opportunity to protect and better manage for strains of Alvord cutthroat trout.
4833	A policy regarding manmade reservoirs and the many small "scoops" which provide water to animals should be established.
4833	The Catnip Reservoir should have a management plan that includes the restoration of the dam, which is currently leaking.
4875	Evaluate effects on fish as related to habitat and water quality impacts caused by roads, land use, and management activities, and human activities.

### Restoration of Native Species

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	The Refuge should not stock non-native fish. Recovery of native fish species populations and habitats should be a higher priority. (3816, 3822, 4123)
4824	We encourage the CCP to support sport fisheries with NDOW's objectives for Lahontan cutthroat trout with concurrent limits and seasons.
4875	The EPA is concerned about water quality as related to the ESA listed salmonids.

### Stocking Reservoirs and Ponds

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Only native fish should be stocked on the Refuge. Priority efforts and budgets for stocking fish should be aimed at native species and not non-native game fish. (904, 3816, 3822, 4123, 4707)
865	Angler interest will be seriously reduced if the Refuge only stocks native Lahontan cutthroats at waters in the Refuge, such as Big Springs Reservoir. If you are managing for users, it does not make sense to put in only cutthroats. The seasonal creek out of Big Springs does not allow fish passage to other waters where interbreeding with native stocks would be a concern.
865	Rainbow trout would be an excellent sport fish for Big Springs Reservoir, which is isolated from native stocks in other water bodies.
904	I am for stocking only native species, although it would be OK with me to punt fish stocking entirely. I thought Wildlife Refuges were for the wildlife, not for the recreation opportunities.
3816	The Refuge should not stock non-native fish.
3816	If the non-native species can be confined to a single reservoir site and kept from invading/competing/degrading native fish habitats, the limited continuation of stocking may be acceptable.
3818	Sport fishing areas will require varying levels of mitigation. I would hope the No Action option is not considered simply to alleviate the dynamic and constant demands associated with these issues. I feel strongly that the wildlife needs of the Sheldon can be managed in association with the relatively small footprint of this activity.
4684	Please stock game fish in those waters that are not currently stocked.

## **Horseback Riding**

### Provide Trailhead and Campground Accommodations

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
959	Limited access by vehicles on existing roads, and possibly some expanded camping facilities, should support a trail system for foot or horseback access to the majority of the Refuge.

## **Hunting**

### Access

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
3806	We urge you to establish a policy limiting open roads to a maximum density of 4 miles between open vehicle routes. Such a density provides opportunity for hunting and wildlife viewing away from the noise and dust of arid country roads, without making motor access or game retrieval unduly difficult.
4603	We oppose allowing game retrieval with machines.

### Anti-hunting

M	Opposed to all hunting and trapping on the Refuge. (7, 33, 3808, 4755)

3808	Consider the costs, risks, negative impacts, and overwhelming opposition to hunting on the Refuge.

877	Where have the giant bucks gone? Are they getting eaten or is there no feed?
3815	More Americans visit the Refuge to view and visit the wild horses than ever view and/or shoot a bighorn sheep.
3815	The Nevada Department of Wildlife and Nevada Bighorns Unlimited are notoriously opposed to wild horses. These organizations actively campaign and pressure public officials for removal in favor of hunting interest. This is a glaring conflict of interest.
4603	Refuge sponsored training showing simple boning of deer and antelope for backpacking would benefit hunters and hunting.
4786	Make mountain lions a "hunnable" native species and issue hunting tags.

## Hunt Management

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Hunting for predators such as coyote and mountain lion should be allowed. (132, 141, 416, 3809)
31	Animals for which hunting is allowed should not be given management preference over horses.
140	The Refuge is considered a "trophy" area for hunters and I would hate to see the quality of hunting be diminished by predation. The Refuge is one of the best areas to visit and view wildlife, and I would like to see that continue.
141	Hunting for mountain lions should be allowed because every other big game species can be hunted, especially because mountain lions are predators.
142	Continue to allow non-residents to hunt sage-grouse (by encouraging NDOW/Wildlife Commission) and allow hunting of chukar, quail, and cottontail rabbits. In this way, a family can enjoy the experience of hunting. Not all hunters draw a big game tag. Some families may not go hunting because the hunting options are limited to big game.
3806	Refuge sponsored training showing simple boning of deer and antelope for backpacking would benefit hunters and hunting on all public lands by decreasing the need for off-road access. Please do not relent to the pressure for game retrieval with machines.
3808	We believe that an evaluation of the full costs and risks associated with hunting and trapping is necessary. Such evaluation should include, but not be limited to, the costs of population monitoring for game species and the cost of effective law enforcement rigorously compared to the perceived benefit of allowing consumptive wildlife uses on the Refuge. Human safety risks and threats to non-target species associated with hunting and trapping should also be evaluated.
3817	The Service should consider special rates for hunting tags sold on the Refuge. If the Refuge and/or NDOW increased hunting fees within Hunt Units occurring in the Refuge only, these funds could be used to offset or cover the costs of NDOWs involvement or other big game special interest groups currently disgruntled over expenditures for wild horse and burro management.
4114	The FWS should be held accountable for its management practices that protect game species for hunters and destroy the natural balance of our ecosystems.
4793	Reduce the number of deer tags issued.
4824	Chukar, cottontail rabbits, waterfowl, doves and valley quail seasons proposed in the CCP have no significant threat to public uses on the Refuge.
4824	Mountain lion harvest can be incorporated into NDOW-managed Hunt seasons and regulations.
4824	Antelope harvest programs will respect and manage to meet Refuge goals.

### Pro-hunting

4603	Sheldon should be an example of providing traditional, quality, hunting and wildlife viewing opportunity free of machine intrusion.
4756	Continue to allow hunting on the refuge for a variety of game such as, but not limited to, sage grouse, chukars, doves, antelope, bighorn sheep and mule deer.
4768	Need to control population of mountain lions by issuing hunting tags.
4807	Allow trapping.

### **Land Acquisition and In-holding Management**

#### Access to In-holdings and Mining Claims

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
29	Is it a formal nationwide policy to deny mines the right to electricity? The County Commissioners do not want economic growth limited without a solid reason.
29	The Refuge is ethically responsible for any fatality/injury resulting from poorly signed road closures and/or poorly maintained roads.
29	The secondary Virgin Valley road is well-maintained by individuals, is the electric company access, and an alternate egress after a thunderstorm. These roads were originally closed "temporarily" three years ago. More recently, I am informed that the closures are permanent. These closures are a great inconvenience and now require an 8-mile (1/2 hour) detour. In addition, these closures eliminate our only fire escape route.
30	I strongly feel that our valley neighborhood has been cut in half. There are access issues apart from view/sightseeing issues.
31	I have been trying for three years to have a telephone land-line installed with no success. In the case of medical emergencies, we have no way to call for emergency help.

## General Land Acquisition & In-holding Mgmt

M	The CCP should include a process to acquire any and all in-holdings from willing sellers. (1009, 1016, 3648, 3813, 3818, 3821, 3826, 4529, 4656, 4666, 4861, 4872)
890	Stop the encroachments, stop the developers.
3789	Do not reduce the size of the Refuge.
3810	The CCP should examine acquisition possibilities. Adding lands to the Refuge may be important to migrations, wintering, and pronghorn population integrity.
3816	In light of global warming, future land acquisition possibilities should be kept available to resolve anticipated and emerging challenges. With a 20 mile gap between the Sheldon and Hart Mountain Refuges, and known area within that gap important to migrations, wintering, and pronghorn population integrity, it defies logic not to have an active and continuing land acquisition program.
4833	The CCP should develop a plan to link the Hart and Sheldon Refuges which includes options for: facilitating migration; acquiring additional lands; purchasing conservation easements; and coordinating with local landowners, state agencies, and non-profits to secure pronghorn migration corridors.
4833	Please identify lands with critical wildlife values outside the refuge and their acquisition opportunities.
4861	It's time to re-study the Refuge boundaries and incorporate land identified for potential Refuge use 30 years ago.

## In-holdings Management

3648	We also encourage the eventual troth of private holdings over to the refuge if the land leaves the current family holdings.
3648	Private land ownership helps to maintain the ecosystem but should not be allowed to turn over to corporate holdings that will eventually subdivide.
3810	The CCP should outline the challenges and management requirements associated with all in-holdings.
3816	We encourage the acquisition of land between the Sheldon and Hart Mountains to provide habitat connectivity for climate change-impacted species.
4833	Please develop a priority list of in-holdings acquisitions to avoid these problems serious impacts on wildlife and wildlife habitat caused from in-holding development.
4833	The Toiyabe Chapter would like the CCP to include a list (and map) of private land in-holdings.
4871	In-holdings should also be managed to restore and maintain a healthy sagebrush ecosystem on the Refuge.

## Livestock Grazing

### General Grazing

ID	Comment
M	Cattle do more damage to riparian corridors than do horses. (641, 3801)
M	The CCP should analyze the current, proposed, and past grazing activities, impacts resulting from those activities, and measures to reduce those impacts. (3808, 4706)
12	Are there any livestock grazing permits within the Refuge? Are there any trespass livestock within the Refuge boundaries?
986	Enough lands have been ruined by ranching and development. Please help preserve the Refuge.
3803	If cattle were causing habitat damage during a 5-6 month grazing presence and were removed, I do not understand why horses are allowed to cause damage year-round.
3807	Cattle and sheep can be seen grazing on miles of open land along the four major Nevada highways. These animals graze the same vegetation as the wild horses, yet the cattle/sheep are not starving. How can the horses be starving while foraging on the same vegetation that fattens the cattle and sheep? Why do the ranchers need their livestock to graze the free land when the same vegetation grows on their private land?
3813	The vegetation in Sheldon has suffered from many years of abuse by livestock grazing and wild horses. It would be a mistake if cattle grazing, terminated 15 years ago, were replaced by the grazing pressure of wild horses.
3813	Livestock grazing was terminated in 1994, so the fences, roads, water developments and other installations that supported grazing are now obsolete and could be removed.
3823	The CCP should focus on "on call" grazing. There may be an occasion when grazing is appropriate to protect a species i.e. sage grouse or reduce weeds. The Service should have the flexibility to bring in weed-free livestock for a specific area and a specific limited time.
4603	Please study the benefits of protecting native wildlife habitat from livestock grazing.
4706	The EIS should also disclose efforts towards restoration of native habitat disrupted by the colonization and establishment of noxious weeds from grazing and other activities that may occur as a result of the proposed project.
4706	The alternatives in the EIS should evaluate the extent and risks associated with continued grazing on listed, threatened, endangered or sensitive species, water and soil quality and the indirect effects of grazing through the colonization and establishment of noxious weeds.
4872	Wildlife habitat has been damaged by overgrazing from livestock and wild horses.

4876 The Cattleman's Association should pay without corruption for grazing rights on public lands.

### Prohibit All Livestock Grazing

M	Livestock grazing should be prohibited on the Refuge. (641, 3789, 3817, 4833)
3819	Until effective adaptive management strategies are tested with vegetation condition and trend restoration practices to increase pronghorn population to original goal levels, livestock (permitted, trespass, or feral) should not be allowed on the Refuge in order to test the original pronghorn population objective.
3819	Feral livestock are primary and secondary competitors to pronghorn--thereby depressing pronghorn numbers. Consequently, it is recommended that all non-native ungulates be removed from the Refuge until forage and drinking water conditions improve to support non-native ungulates.

### **Mining and Energy**

#### Claim Access

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
29	The gate that was installed to keep terrorists from the corrals also blocks access to our mining claim near Dead Horse Canyon.

## General Mining

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Many claim owners are directly affected by Refuge management decisions. Claim owners should be consulted before mineral-related decisions are finalized. (29, 31)
29	The Refuge DOES NOT have the right to use the opalized sandstone for free and without permission from the claimholder. There are withdrawn quarry pits nearby with material the Refuge can use. In addition, my nice, flat loading area has been left badly rutted after the Refuge removed material to repair a fishing pond - it was nearly unusable to me.
29	Is there strong, defensible research that supports the conclusion that mining is an increased burden on the Refuge? Refuge policy has ignored mining law.
3802	The small areas of the Refuge that are open to mining are manageable and offer those that recreate in this way a place to do so.
3818	The No Action alternative should not be considered simply to alleviate the dynamic and constant demands associated with recreation and mining issues.
3818	Mining impacts will require varying levels of mitigation.
4824	The pending CCP presents an opportunity to assess risks and future foreseeable impacts from year-round occupation and reclamation practices for mining in the Virgin Valley that are contrary with the Refuge's mission.
4833	If the USFWS cannot prevent mining operations before closure can be secured, we highly recommend procedures to avoid, minimize, and mitigate adverse impacts of mining be established in the CCP. Measures could include a bond commensurate with the amount of disturbances a mine would cause.
4833	The Toiyabe Chapter recommends the Refuge be closed to oil and gas leasing.
4871	Mines and utility corridors should also be managed to restore and maintain a healthy sagebrush ecosystem on the Refuge.

## Mining and Energy Exploration

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
3816	Mining should not continue on the Refuge.
3819	The important historic travel corridor used by pronghorn between the Hart Mountain Refuge and the Sheldon Refuge may someday be jeopardized by energy development, mining, or other exploitative practices on public lands because it is not protected from such land development practices. Consequently, it is recommended that this travel corridor be permanently protected for the perpetuity of pronghorn, sage grouse and other native wildlife of the shrub steppe Great Basin rangelands.

### Mining Withdrawal

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
10	Please disallow the sale and/or privatization of any of the Refuge's resources.
3810	It is important to note the incompatibility of mining and associated activities on a wildlife Refuge. The Refuge should seriously consider withdrawal of those lands and integration fully into normal refuge and habitat protections.
3816	Maintaining such a large generally incompatible and non-conforming designation for mining within the heart of the refuge with the numerous demands that places on Refuge budgets and staff commitments deserves full disclosure and analysis. This non-conforming usage demands staff and funds far outside the wildlife conservation orientation of traditional refuge management.
3816	Important historic mining sites within the Refuge that qualify under the laws governing those features should be protected and reasonably made available to those interested in seeing them. That does not require that 65,000 acres continue to be available for mining location and development under the mining law.
3821	Wilderness designation will remove the threat of mining and other lands actions.
4833	The USFWS should clearly identify in the CCP recreational and mining activities which are compatible with the wildlife mandate of the Refuge and those which require more regulation or elimination.
4833	The Toiyabe Chapter strongly urges the CCP to consider seeking mineral closure for the entire Refuge.

### Utility Rights-of-Way

29	Is it a formal nationwide policy to deny mines the right to electricity? The County Commissioners do not want economic growth limited without a solid reason.
3818	Renewable energy structures, utility corridors, and or oil-gas-geothermal development are not compatible uses on this area.
4833	The Refuge should be closed to utility corridors as an incompatible use.
4871	Mines and utility corridors should also be managed to restore and maintain a healthy sagebrush ecosystem on the Refuge.

## Off-refuge Issues

30	Bureau of Land Management should make an Off Road Vehicle play area somewhere between the Refuge and the Owyhee.

853	Humans should stop eating and using animal products.
862	Please co-sponsor the American Horse Slaughter Prevention Act (H.R. 503/S.311) to end the slaughter of American horses for human consumption and to prohibit their export for slaughter to foreign countries.
866	Increase fees for ranchers who use our public lands and implement heavy fines on those who shoot horses and burros to provide funding for their protection.
3807	I believe that the ranchers who want BLM land to graze their cattle and sheep are not entitled to use free land. These ranchers want to use the free land to raise livestock for slaughter and to put money in their own pockets. They should use some of that money to buy their own grazing land. It is their money that somehow makes a difference between allowing cattle grazing versus wild horse grazing.
3819	The important historic travel corridor used by pronghorn between the Hart Mountain Refuge and the Sheldon Refuge may someday be jeopardized by energy development, mining, or other exploitative practices on public lands because it is not protected from such land development practices. Consequently, it is recommended that this travel corridor be permanently protected for the perpetuity of pronghorn, sage grouse and other native wildlife of the shrub steppe Great Basin rangelands.
3823	There are 117 wild horse herd management areas where horses dominate and are impacting plant communities if they are not removed in a timely manner.
4234	Comment unrelated to the refuge regarding human rights related to the subjugation of women.
4754	Spill over from the refuge is damaging other public lands.

- 4756 The refuge is big enough as it is. I do not favor, and stand against, expansion of the refuge.
- 4833 Please identify lands with critical wildlife values outside the refuge and their acquisition opportunities.
- 4875 Identify and evaluate potential impacts outside the project area boundaries.

M	The Service must disclose and analyze the history of domestic livestock use of the Refuge including historic impact of such use on refuge range conditions, vegetation, and ecosystem function and management or restoration actions taken since livestock use of the Refuge was terminated. Considering the often long-term impacts of domestic livestock management practices on arid ecosystems, many of the impacts that are frequently attributed to wild horses/burros may have begun with and/or been caused by historic livestock grazing practices. (3808, 4706)
M	areas needing restoration should be identified in the planning process (i.e. fence or development removal, weed eradication, off-road vehicle damage, etc.) (952, 1009, 1016)
30	Are mining districts exempt from planning?
31	A more timely written notice of the upcoming meeting and its purpose would have been appreciated. I would like at least a 1-month notice to review and respond to the plan. Individuals directly affected by the CCP should have been consulted before the plan was developed.

151	We should get involved and find out where the anti-hunting sentiments are coming from and then go forward.
451	Fish and Game could certainly devise a plan to protect, rather than destroy, horses and burros.
475	I would like to invite you to be a guest on my national TV show which is entitled "In The Company Of Horses."
563	The world would be a much better place for all living species if humans would stop trying to micromanage the environment.

- 844 Take the public's comments into consideration.
- 967 Humans are too impulsive and quick to make decisions without regard to the future.
- 994 A better management plan needs to be devised and implemented than the one currently proposed.
- 1011 The CCP does not address stray horses.
- 1031 I support the position of Friends of Nevada Wilderness.
- 1033 Please do not take any action on the CCP.
- 3302 Good luck with the CCP
- 3648 Natural evolution and species balance should not only be allowed but that philosophy should be the mission guide for the conservation plan.
- 3806 The most effective OHV travel management is in the Charles M. Russell Refuge in MT. We suggest you contact them if you are not already aware of their techniques and success.
- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology including information/data documenting the biology and ecology of wild horses/burros on the Refuge based on studies conducted on the Refuge or involving horses/burros occupying habitats/conditions similar to those found at Sheldon (any claims by the Service regarding wild horse/burro impacts must be substantiated by credible scientific data documentation).
- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology including methodologies used to sample wild horse/burro populations on the Refuge and adjacent lands (the Service should designate the methodology or technique that it believes is most credible and accurate and which it intends to use to assess the size of the wild horse/burro population in the future).
- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology including a complete analysis of past/present management actions taken to reduce, control, and/or attempt to eliminate wild horses/burros from the Refuge including a full discussion of potential non-lethal management options available to reduce or eliminate the need to engage in repeated horse/burro capture operations.
- 3808 Provide full disclosure and analysis of the relevant statutes, regulations, and policies that guide management of the Refuge System and Sheldon. A detailed discussion of the Services' interpretation of these standards is particularly important.

- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology including information/data documenting the historic presence/absence, population abundance, and population characteristics of wild horses/burros inhabiting the Refuge and surrounding state, federal, and private lands.
- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of the historic and modern-day condition of the habitat found on the Refuge and how those conditions have changed over time. The analysis should include a complete inventory of the status of the vegetation communities, soil structure and stability, climate data, an objective measure of the condition of the range, evidence of the presence and spread of invasive species, and documentation of the prevalence of erosive conditions on the Refuge. There should also be a discussion of how changes in habitat conditions affect the ecology and wildlife of the refuge including the wild horses/burros inhabiting the Refuge.
- 3808 Until a biological assessment and inventory of flora and fauna has been completed, it is inappropriate to attempt to determine compatible wildlife-dependent recreational activities for the Refuge. This is especially true with regard to the consideration of hunting and trapping programs, as these uses directly impact wildlife species. Thresholds of public use (type and intensity) need to be determined to avoid adverse effects to wildlife populations. Thresholds for different types of activities can be used to make compatibility determinations that balance wildlife and human use needs.
- 3808 Disclose all relevant information pertaining to historic and modern-day status, abundance, and health of all wildlife species known to inhabit the Refuge, particularly and federally- or state-listed special status species, that may be subject to or affected by management actions on the Refuge or adjacent lands. The biological and ecological characteristics, threats to, habitat status of, and prey base status of each species should be discussed.
- 3808 Disclose and discuss historic and current patterns of human recreational use of the refuge. Describe all recreational uses permitted and the level of such uses on the Refuge. Examine the environmental impacts of all such recreational uses.
- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of all aspects of wild horse and burro management history, biology, and ecology including a comprehensive review of the history of wild horses and burros in North America and on the Refuge including examination of archaeological and fossil records and historic records to document the circumstances that led to the establishment of wild horses/burros on the Refuge.
- 3808 We hope that the Service will use the National Wildlife Refuge System Improvement Act to significantly improve their management of our nation's NWRs and restore this public land to its original purpose of providing an inviolate sanctuary for wildlife.
- 3808 Provide a detailed history of the Refuge including pre-Refuge establishment land-use and management practices. In addition, reasons for Refuge establishment should be discussed and all statutes, Presidential orders, and such included in the appendices.

- 3808 Disclose and discuss all information or data compiled regarding public safety associated with the Refuge management and use. Records maintained by the Refuge regarding public injuries, fatalities, or criminal activities on the Refuge involving members of the public, Refuge officials/staff, other agency officials and any contractors or agents working for the Service on Refuge projects. All records of public road incidents such as vehicle/wildlife collisions and all mitigation or management measures taken by the Refuge or other agencies to reduce the threat and severity of such incidents should be discussed.
- 3808 Disclose and discuss the economics of refuge management including the estimated cost of implementing the proposed action, the cost of implementing any alternatives to the proposed action, the allocation of federal funds and the availability of non-federal funds used for management of the Refuge, and all direct and indirect economic impacts associated with public use of the Refuge. The Service must be able to document that it has the funding to implement any and all management prescriptions that it proposes for the Refuge. Disclose past funding allocations for the Refuge management and explain how Refuge officials will ensure adequate annual funding is available for the 15-year duration of the CCP.
- 3808 A proper evaluation of the full range of economic impacts should include indirect economic impacts such as existence values. Existence values are the indirect value of a species on the landscape including its role in the ecosystem, its value as prey, and the value it represents from an aesthetic, scientific, ecological, or cultural perspective for those members of the public who either enjoy observing the species or simply knowing it exists on the Refuge. A well-developed and implemented survey instrument can help to identify the true existence value of particular species.
- 3808 The Service should disclose any documented historic or modern-day threats to range/habitat, how the threats have changed over time, how they have altered range/habitat conditions, and what management actions/tools have been or continue to be used by the Service to combat such threats.
- 3810 We request that the Service identify and analyze in the CCP all non-wildlife dependent activities on the Refuge.
- 3810 The CCP should examine water exportation and other water-related issues, such as the use of water tanks and how peer reviewed science is used in determining their benefits and values.
- 3811 The CCP should discuss and consider the impacts of climate change on the local ecosystem and explore opportunities for inclusion of such information in the refuge's visitor programs. The FWS should develop brochures, interpretive panels, websites, and educational programs that address the vulnerabilities of refuge resources to climate change, and what the FWS is doing to help plants and wildlife adapt to global environmental changes.
- 3811 Helping wildlife adapt to a rapidly changing climate, which the Refuge System is well positioned to do with its wildlife-first mandate, will necessarily involve working and thinking beyond refuge boundaries. As such, it is imperative that the Sheldon CCP coordinate with surrounding landowners, such as the Bureau of Land Management, and the Nevada and Oregon state wildlife action plans to consider conservation priority areas and implementation strategies identified in those plans.

- 3811 The CCP should outline a plan to research and monitor the ongoing and emerging ecosystem changes induced by climate change. Through careful and thorough monitoring the Refuge System can be prepared to detect changes and respond using the principles of adaptive management.
- 3815 The Preliminary Issue to be Considered in the Refuge's CCP lists Feral Horse and Burros. The title feral is biased and attempts to adversely affect public comments. I am also dismayed by Paul Steblien's biased comments against the wild horses in the Nevada Appeal. It is an effort to persuade public opinion against the horses during the comment period. I would assume that Sheldon officials would refrain from personal opinions to avoid conflict of interest in seeking public comments.
- 3815 To avoid suspicion about the horse and burro census numbers, the Refuge should seek assistance from wild horse advocacy groups.
- 3816 We generally agree with the display of Preliminary Goals outlined in the Sheldon CCP Update; however, the interrelationships of management activities and the Goals would be better demonstrated by realignment and slight wording refinement.
- 3816 We urge the Service to integrate planning for Hart Mountain and Sheldon Refuges. It is very disappointing that the Service has launched the current CCP/EIS project for the Sheldon Refuge alone. Not only do the biological and ecological components intermesh, but the cultural resources, geology, history and pre-history are also interrelated. The Service would ultimately save money and improve the planning product for both areas if they were to combine the CCP/EIS effort into a single, integrated planning endeavor. The interested public would also be saved the time and expense of needing to participate in two separate planning efforts, when an integrated one would actually be preferable.
- 3816 The obligatory relationship of controlling horses and burros to achieving habitat restoration and diverse, abundant and healthy wildlife populations is best understood when the issues are described in context. Separating the feral horse and burro management from restoring and protecting the fish, wildlife, and plant populations and habitats discussions requires the general public to draw connections by inferences. The refuge staff and planners should assist the public understanding of this vital issue by proper juxtaposition in the planning documents and resulting CCP/EIS.
- 3817 Please continue to uphold the prior commitments and promises made by former Service policies and managers to the American public regarding the preservation of equids on the Refuge.
- 3817 I encourage the Service to apply its authority as public stewards of American resources and global species in true fairness and with objectivity for all "animal special interest groups". Do not single out and targeting wild horse advocates with inflammatory and denigrating statements while simultaneously supporting groups that finance projects on the Refuge to "paraphrase the facts" with no similar accusations or demands for accountability.

- 3819 All or most of the resource plans are or have been out-of-date for a decade or longer. No management plans were noted regarding on-going objectives for wildlife management--the primary reason why the Refuge was established. Therefore, the Service is urged to develop and implement wildlife management plans on an early agenda.
- 3821 We would be happy to help in any way possible during this planning process to help with the wilderness review portion of the plan.
- 3824 It would be proactive to have Refuge staff attend a Carhardt Wilderness Management workshop prior to completion of the CCP. This would help to achieve a realistic vision of what is possible and establish a positive attitude related to the scope of management possibilities within wilderness. The workshop provides the opportunity to keep alive traditional skills. All on-ground staff should have training if necessary.
- 4094 Please see the comments from the Northern Nevada Chapter of Safari Club International.
- 4457 Stop mailing me your wildlife management plans, which I have to sign for at the post office. Without personal comments attached, I feel you have not read my comments. Please respond personally (preferably by email) to indicate you have read my comments. Please include the web address of any revised management plans.
- 4706 The EIS should evaluate effects on fish and wildlife from habitat removal and alteration, aquatic and terrestrial habitat fragmentation caused by roads, land use, and management activities, and human activity. The EIS should also evaluate the impacts the project may have on plant species and their habitats.
- 4706 The EIS should identify and evaluate potential consequences of the proposed project outside the project area boundaries.
- 4706 If silviculture activities will be conducted in the project area, we recommend that the EIS discuss the logging related issues.
- 4706 The EIS must evaluate impacts on water quality and disclose which water bodies may be impacted by the project, the nature of the potential impacts, and the specific pollutants likely to impact those waters.
- 4706 We recommend that the project include a monitoring program designed to assess both impacts from the project and the effectiveness of measures utilized to mitigate such impacts. The EIS should describe such a monitoring program and how it will be used as an effective feedback mechanism for the proposed project.
- 4706 The EIS needs to identify historic resources, and assure that treaty rights and privileges are addressed appropriately. If the proposed project will have impacts on Native Americans, the development of the EIS should be conducted in consultation with all affected tribal governments, consistent with Executive Order (EO) 13175.
- 4706 The EIS should include a description of how roads in the watershed impact resources.
- 4706 The impacts from recreation and access (including off road vehicle activity) should be analyzed and reported in the EIS. EIS should describe what actions will be taken to manage recreational an accessibility opportunities in the project area.

- 4706 The EIS should identify all drinking water sources, any potential contamination of these sources that may result from the proposed project, and measures that will be taken to protect these sources.
- 4706 The EIS needs to discuss the direct, indirect and cumulative impacts on all threatened and endangered species and their habitat. Of particular concern are water quality standard requirements for ESA listed salmonids that may be impacted by the proposed project such as temperature, dissolved oxygen, and sediments.
- 4706 If prescribed fires will be used in the project area, the EIS should provide an overview of the smoke management program that will be followed to avoid public health impacts and potential ambient air quality exceedances.
- 4706 The EIS should describe impacts related to prescribed burning and how they will be mitigated. In addition, the EIS should describe the measures that will be taken to assure that water and air quality standards will be met.
- 4706 The EIS should disclose efforts towards restoration of native habitat disrupted by the colonization and establishment of noxious weeds from grazing and other activities that may occur as a result of the proposed project.
- 4706 The EIS should describe how roads will be closed. If the project includes administrative road closures, the EIS should describe what enforcement measures will be utilized and the monitoring program that will be implemented to ensure the are effective.
- 4706 The EIS should evaluate impacts related to burning treated wood and describe what actions will be taken to assure that the release of toxins from treated fuel is minimized.
- 4706 If pesticides and herbicides will be used in any of the projected activities, the EIS needs to address any toxic issues related to those activities.
- 4706 If the project will result in the closure of roads, then the EIS should describe the criteria used to select which roads to close, and the goals the project intends to meet by closing these roads.
- 4706 The EIS should disclose if existing roads will be reconstructed and the current impacts or risks they present to the resources of concern. The EIS should evaluate and discuss, in terms of impacts to the environment, the advantages and disadvantages to the reconstructing of roads or constructing new roads.
- 4706 The alternatives in the EIS should evaluate the extent and risks associated with continued grazing on listed, threatened, endangered or sensitive species, water and soil quality and the indirect effects of grazing through the colonization and establishment of noxious weeds.
- 4706 The EIS should describe the current quality and potential capacity of habitat, its use by fish and wildlife on and near the proposed project area, and identify known fish and wildlife corridors, migration routes, and areas of seasonal fish and wildlife congregation.
- 4709 The commenter forwarded a request by the Coalition for Nevada's Wildlife for its members to comment on the CCP process.

- 4710 The commenter forwarded a telegram that was sent to the US President in 1975 supporting the USFWS as sole manager of Sheldon.
- 4718 Commenter asks if Sheldon will continue to accept sportsmen comments, particularly, regarding the management of wild horses and burros after the close of the comment period.
- 4754 If the refuge adopted option B1 which is how the refuge guidelines are set up you would accomplish all the refuge's goals.
- 4755 Please extend time to comment.
- 4820 Our agency will continue to participate in future planning and assist the Service in resolution of this ongoing issue and problem.
- 4828 I hope the decisions made by your agency are those that improve the Sheldon's vegetative and wildlife resources rather than decisions made by succumbing to the emotions of those who may have other agendas.
- 4833 Priorities for the Refuge budget should be discussed in the CCP, so that the public will know how budget shortfalls will affect Refuge programs.
- 4875 The EPA strongly urges the USFWS to consider inviting affected Tribal governments to participate in the EIS development process as cooperating agencies.
- 4875 The purpose and need statement and alternatives analysis should discuss how project activities may adversely affect ecosystem recovery.
- 4875 The EPA evaluates the cumulative impact assessment using five key areas, which can be found in the EPA's guidance available on EPA's Office of Federal Activities home page at: <http://www.epa.gov/compliance/resources/nepa.html>.
- 4875 The EPA recommends that the project include a monitoring program designed to assess both impacts from the project and the effectiveness of measures utilized to mitigate impacts.
- 4875 If the proposed project will have impacts on Native Americans, the development of the EIS should be conducted in consultation with all affected tribal governments, consistent with EO 13175, and consultation documentation should be provided in the EIS.

	Please prepare a predator management program. (132, 2002, 3802, 4650, 4712, 4756, 4757, 4759, 4761, 4762, 4763, 4764, 4767, 4768, 4771, 4775, 4778, 4779, 4780, 4781, 4782, 4783, 4784, 4787, 4788, 4790, 4791, 4793, 4794, 4795, 4796, 4797, 4798, 4801, 4802, 4804, 4805, 4807, 4808, 4811)
M	Predator management can be implemented to augment and enhance the populations of native species within the complex. The Refuge manager should be able to act when predator management is necessary to accomplish the goals of the Refuge. (141, 416)
28	Predator populations should be controlled. They have increased greatly while the prey populations have decreased.
132	Hunting should be allowed for predators because hunting for other game species is allowed. If predators are left unmanaged the antelope and deer will disappear. The Refuge is a beautiful, unique place and we have to do everything possible to maintain it.
140	The Refuge is considered a "trophy" area for hunters and I would hate to see the quality of hunting be diminished by predation. The Refuge is one of the best areas to visit and view wildlife, and I would like to see that continue.
808	I failed to see predator management discussed for the proposed CCP. Please consider a necessary program to benefit all wildlife on the Refuge: antelope/coyote to sage grouse/raven. The Refuge is a unique place and should be maintained as such.
810	Nurture the natural predators of horses so that populations can be controlled.
829	Coyotes and predators in general may be affecting antelope kid production and survival. The protection of predators on the Refuge should be relaxed. The lion population may also be increasing and may also impact sheep and other wildlife.
877	There should be a predator project for mountain lions, which probably impact the antelope deer ratio. There are not large bucks like there used to be.
900	Predators (coyotes and lions) on the Refuge are over abundant compared to off-Refuge. How can you manage the prey but not the predators?
993	Predators should be controlled for the management of native species.
3803	The total protection of predators as well as any other wildlife, has only led to the predator population thriving, while the antelope, deer, chukar, sage hen, cottontail, and pygmy rabbit populations diminish on a grand scale. The last 30 years of so-called studies should have proven that there is a predator problem.
3803	Protections associated with designating wilderness will create a predator problem on the Refuge.

- 3819 The recent study regarding the influence of predation on pronghorn neonates indicates that predator control practices may be advocated for the Refuge, but that they should be carefully evaluated to ensure that adequate science information on the Refuge is available to justify such manipulative practices. It is recommended that this be identified with appropriate management strategies for the CCP.
- 3821 Predators are a natural part of the ecosystem and should not be artificially controlled.
- 4491 Predators should be managed on the refuge to protect antelope.
- 4508 To maintain healthy populations of antelope, deer, and big horn sheep which are susceptible to the negative effects of drought and over grazing, aggressive predator control is needed so as not to further reduce wildlife populations during times of increased stress.
- 4705 It is essential for the CCP to provide for the ability to aggressively control predators. Our citizens have continually commented on the apparent toll predators are having on the Refuge's pronghorn population. In addition there also appears to be significant impacts on Sage Grouse numbers from ravens and other predators.
- 4756 Allow aerial shooting of coyotes and cougars, or allow sportsmen to hunt coyotes and cougars, or allow a government trapper to reduce and control coyotes and cougars, or allow a combination of the above.
- 4824 NDOW suggests the Refuge adjust regulations to allow state authorities to lead the predator control projects.
- 4824 Mountain lion harvest can be incorporated into NDOW-managed Hunt seasons and regulations.
- 4833 Efforts to eliminate predator populations are incompatible with Refuge mandates and with ecosystem health and process; therefore, the CCP should include predators as necessary members of the ecosystem.
- 4833 If a "predator management plan or sub-plan" is developed for the Refuge, it should be subject to Refuge purposes and to a full USFWS public review process.

## Public Access, Roads, and Transportation

### Access Designations (Open/Closed)

29	The Refuge is ethically responsible for any fatality/injury resulting from poorly signed road closures and/or poorly maintained roads.
31	Some of the roads illustrated on Refuge/Service maps indicate they are open for use but are in fact closed or impassable. Some of these roads offer emergency egress for the Virgin Valley area and options for avoiding the congested campground area(s). Local help could easily restore these mapped roads at reasonable expense.
416	Managers can close roads and accomplish other functions of wilderness on a case by case basis by using professional judgment and public involvement rather than designating wilderness.
3813	The relatively flat topography of the Refuge is vulnerable to fragmentation by too many roads. The CCP should designate a system of public travel routes that keeps most of the land in large roadless blocks of wildlife habitat. Only those routes that are necessary for visitors to see wildlife should be kept open. (Other routes necessary for occasional management activities can be kept closed to public travel with gates and barriers.) The Refuge should not become a general recreation area. Millions of acres of BLM public lands surrounding Sheldon fulfill that function.
3821	It is critical for overall management of the refuge to have a clear, well defined travel management system. All existing routes need to be evaluated to determine if they should remain open for public use, open only for administrative use by the refuge, or closed and rehabilitated.
3823	The CCP should focus on a policy of roads closed unless posted open. Fragmentation of habitat, spread of weeds, and opportunities for poaching are increased with roads. The Service cannot provide continuous oversight. I assume the CCP will include a proposal on which roads will remain open and which will be closed.

- 3824 I believe any transportation plan should begin with the route system in place at the time of the last Conservation Plan. Assess which of those original routes still provide useful motor access, which need to be eliminated and/or re-routed if causing resource damage or are redundant, and which, if any, new routes should be added to the historic system. Existing routes deemed unnecessary to the system should be rehabilitated on a priority basis and until then should have a serious steel sign or physical block designating the closure.
- As off-route travel in the refuge is illegal, no unauthorized user-created routes should be designated as part of a final transportation plan. Renegade routes are not created with health of the resources in mind; in addition, it sends the wrong message to the public if illegal, unethical off-route travel is validated by designation.
- 3826 We request that an effective travel plan be developed as part of the CCP. No vehicle travel should be allowed off of designated routes. Designated routes should be those minimally necessary for public use and enjoyment, while at the same time offering maximum protection to the Refuge and its resources. There should be no duplicative routes, and no off-highway vehicle use should be allowed.
- 4123 Large vehicle access to the area should be limited to the furthest points, with access to the more sensitive areas being foot and horse access only.
- 4529 I support development of a final travel management plan that clearly indicates what roads are open to the public as well as has good maps so visitors know which roads to use.
- 4581 A road inventory should be conducted, and open roads need to be mapped and signed. Random ORV activity has had a deleterious effect on the watersheds and other values.
- 4603 Do not legitimize any “renegade” or unauthorized routes. These routes were created in violation of law and land ethic.
- 4681 I am opposed to any further public access restrictions being imposed on the Sheldon Antelope Refuge.
- 4706 If the project will result in the closure of roads, then the EIS should describe the criteria used to select which roads to close, and the goals the project intends to meet by closing these roads.
- 4716 I support reclaiming the roads that are currently closed.
- 4755 I oppose new roads in this area.
- 4824 NDOW does not support restrictive actions affecting travel to limit the public to 100 people maximum on the Complex.
- 4824 NDOW supports the designation of roads and ways in the pending CCP.
- 4828 Some of the roads I have noted as closed in past visits had a lack of signage this year and sustained obvious vehicle use.

- 4828 I am concerned with the lack of road closure enforcement.
- 4833 The USFWS should enforce the “open/closed” designations and should enforce the designations.
- 4833 Access to the Refuge should be allowed for street legal vehicles only.
- 4861 Only roads essential for that purpose should be open to public travel.
- 4871 Roads should be managed to restore and maintain a healthy sagebrush ecosystem on the Refuge.
- 4872 Restrict the public road system to routes that will not harm wildlife habitat.
- 4872 No roads should be provided solely for recreational purposes, because the refuge's essential mission is wildlife conservation.
- 4875 Describe the criteria used to identify road closures, how the roads will be closed (i.e., signage or barricading, obliterating, revegetating), and how the closures will be enforced.
- 4875 Only roads that comply with the Refuge’s purpose and mission should remain open.

## General Access Issues

M	A sightseeing route with turnouts would be good. (29, 30)
29	Does/has the Service use(d) traffic counters to quantify traffic flows in the Virgin Valley before closing various roads?
33	I oppose all new road development on the Refuge.
877	Wilderness limits wildlife viewing for handicapped citizens.
986	Public roads should not significantly affect wildlife movements or destroy significant fragile habitat.
3803	Leave access to the Refuge the way it was 40-50 years ago. There has been more damage done by trying to "SAVE IT" than was ever done before travel management policies were started.
3808	Disclose and discuss all information or data compiled regarding public safety associated with the Refuge management and use. Records maintained by the Refuge regarding public injuries, fatalities, or criminal activities on the Refuge involving members of the public, Refuge officials/staff, other agency officials and any contractors or agents working for the Service on Refuge projects. All records of public road incidents such as vehicle/wildlife collisions and all mitigation or management measures taken by the Refuge or other agencies to reduce the threat and severity of such incidents should be discussed.
3808	Disclose and discuss historic and current patterns of human recreational use of the refuge. Describe all recreational uses permitted and the level of such uses on the Refuge. Examine the environmental impacts of all such recreational uses.
3815	The CCP Update has a biased approach to the wild horses. It notes the horses and burros pose a public safety risk on roads, citing traffic accident data. The report does not list traffic accidents with other wildlife.
3816	The motorist safety elements provide additional rationale for giving the feral horse and burro management a priority.
3824	Three types of landscape fragmentation analysis should be part of the travel plan process: route density analysis, buffer analysis, and core area analysis.

- 4123 Large vehicle access to the area should be limited to the furthest points, with access to the more sensitive areas being foot and horse access only.
- 4706 The impacts from recreation and access (including off road vehicle activity) should be analyzed and reported in the EIS. EIS should describe what actions will be taken to manage recreational an accessibility opportunities in the project area.
- 4706 The EIS should describe how roads will be closed. If the project includes administrative road closures, the EIS should describe what enforcement measures will be utilized and the monitoring program that will be implemented to ensure the are effective.
- 4711 Roads should be open to public traffic only where necessary and appropriate for wildlife-watching. Recreational traffic unrelated to wildlife values should be steered to BLM public lands and national forests outside the refuge.
- 4756 Keep as many roads open as possible for dispersed recreation provided that such roads do not disturb native wildlife populations.
- 4756 Maintain roads for use by SUVs and pickups. Keep the area in a primitive state yet passable for most vehicle traffic. Pavement and/or oiling should be restricted to the complex headquarters only for dust control.
- 4875 The USFWS should map all official and unofficial roadways to determine road miles, road density, and potential roadway impacts.
- 4875 Access should be managed in order to minimize environmental impacts.
- 4875 Identify roads to be reconstructed and the reconstruction's environmental effects.
- 4875 If silviculture activities will be conducted in the project area, the EIS should discuss access issues.

Off-road Vehicle Use

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	ORV and ATV use should not be allowed on the Refuge. (959, 4707, 4760, 4772, 4790, 4792, 4833)
M	ORV and ATV use should be limited to open public roads on the Refuge. (129, 865, 4711, 4712, 4714, 4861, 4872)
952	Areas needing restoration, especially from off-road vehicle damage, should be identified as part of the planning process.
3648	The roads need to be clearly marked and consequences enforced to keep off-road vehicles on marked off-road pathways and out of the fragile desert.
3806	The Refuge should provide hunting and wildlife viewing opportunity free of machine intrusion. Do not legitimize any unauthorized routes.
3810	ORV use on the refuge will degrade habitat, trails and impact wildlife, as well as cause noise pollution that will impair visitor experience.
3813	No off-road vehicles should be allowed to travel off public roads because that would damage the wildlife habitat. Many members of the Howard County Bird Club own off-road vehicles and use them to visit birding areas, which are often accessible only by rough roads. We rely on the Service and other land-managing agencies to advise us which routes are not suitable for off-road vehicles because of potential damage to the land and wildlife habitat. We want the agencies to place protection of the habitat as the highest priority.
3821	It should be very clear that no vehicles should be allowed to travel off open public roads, because that would damage the wildlife habitat. Protecting the habitat is the primary driving force for travel management.
3821	Alternatives considered should include looking at the lands with wilderness values that may have been overlooked. Such alternatives must have a direct link with your travel management alternatives.
3822	I urge the FWS to work closely with responsible ATV organizations and hunters' groups in order to enlist their efforts to create a culture of responsible riding and respect for the land throughout the refuge.
3822	Although off-road travel is prohibited on the refuge, I urge the refuge to consider proactive management to prepare for an increase in the popularity and use of ATVs, dirt bikes, and other off-road vehicles. The refuge is large and remote, and I have not yet observed any major problems related to them on the refuge – yet I fear these problems are coming if they aren't here already. I urge the FWS to consider all possible measures to discourage, limit, monitor, and regulate the use of ATVs on the refuge in ways that will minimize their enormous potential for undercutting the management priorities of habitat and wildlife.
3824	My greatest concern is the number of user-created routes established in the refuge since the completion of the last Conservation Plan. In those intervening years, use of ATVs has exploded. Route density is a concern for many reasons: impacts on wildlife, vegetation, cultural resources, spread of weeds, traditional hunting opportunities, opportunity for solitude, and integrity of potential wilderness areas.

- 3824 As off-route travel in the refuge is illegal, no unauthorized user-created routes should be designated as part of a final transportation plan. Renegade routes are not created with health of the resources in mind; in addition, it sends the wrong message to the public if illegal, unethical off-route travel is validated by designation.
- 3826 We request that an effective travel plan be developed as part of the Conservation Plan. No vehicle travel should be allowed off of designated routes. Designated routes should be those minimally necessary for public use and enjoyment, while at the same time offering maximum protection to the Refuge and its resources. There should be no duplicative routes, and no off-highway vehicle use should be allowed.
- 4603 We oppose allowing game retrieval with machines.
- 4656 We request that the Preferred Alternative state that no vehicle travel be allowed off of designated routes.
- 4656 We request that an effective travel plan be developed. We request that the Preferred Alternative state that no vehicle travel be allowed off of designated routes. Designated routes should be those minimally necessary for public use and enjoyment, while at the same time offering maximal protection to the Refuge and its resources.
- 4688 ATV and 4-wheeler use and impacts need to be better monitored by adding law enforcement and biological staffing. Absolutely no expansion of legal usage should be allowed and, wherever possible, ATV usage should be reduced to benefit wildlife.
- 4833 Off-road vehicles, including ATVs, should be prohibited from the Refuge.
- 4833 The USFWS should map all unofficial roadways and put a stop to the ORV trail blazing mentality.
- 4872 ORVs damage wildlife habitat.
- 4875 Off-road vehicle use can destroy habitat, increase sedimentation to water bodies, and contribute to noise and air pollution.
- 4875 Off-road vehicles can increase the potential for wildfires.

**Road Condition Designation (2WD v 4WD)**

31	Is there an alternative roadbed material that can be used in place of the large, sharp-edged obsidian rocks? The obsidian rocks cause many flat tires and tire repair is not reliably available in Virgin Valley. Many people don't carry enough spare tires with them.

4833	We would like to strongly urge the USFWS not to "pave" the roads in the Sheldon nor "improve" them beyond the needs of public safety and maintenance ease.

904	I suggest signage or a perimeter marker at Catnip Reservoir to tell visitors where cars are and are not permitted.
3112	Signs warning park visitors of the potential for wildlife to be on or near the roadway should be posted to help decrease the accident rate.
3112	Speed limits should be reduced and signs posted on public roads and highways outside of the park.
3789	Provide good road signs; they are always appreciated.
3789	Provide detailed refuge roadmaps.
3822	Clear and numerous signs showing open routes and their classification should all be part of the pro-active approach to prevent inappropriate public access.
3823	Please consider posting the entire refuge closed unless a sign says "road open."
3824	Existing routes deemed unnecessary to the system should be rehabilitated on a priority basis and until then should have a serious steel sign or physical block designating closed.
3826	Designated routes should be clearly marked with signs. Clear maps with roads and wilderness boundaries should be made available to the public.
4656	Designated vehicle routes should be clearly marked with signs (as should potential wilderness boundaries) and clear maps with roads and wilderness boundaries should be made available to the public soon after the finalization of the Plan.

## Refuge Administration

31	Management of the Refuge resources should not be left to those who hope to profit from that management, whether it be socially, financially, or politically. There should be no conflicting interests allowed when the public's right to experience our world is at stake.
32	I do not want the Service to "manage" the Refuge. When the Service uses the word "manage," they really mean "kill." I do not condone nor tolerate killing the animals as a form of management and think it is a scam to imply anything different.

3808	The Service has strayed from its policy that "wildlife comes first in the National Wildlife Refuge System." The Refuge should serve as a sanctuary for wildlife and as a native ecosystem preserve. Management should emphasize wildlife and habitat protection over public recreational uses.
3808	There is an inappropriate emphasis placed on management for particular species/interest groups.
3811	We fully support the Refuge's current policy in implementing the various directives guiding its management.
3816	We urge the Service to increase the outreach to other agencies, research institutions, universities and, where needed, private research firms to design and initiate a range of research to assist refuge management to find answers and ease the transitions to the future.
3817	The Refuge could use increased funding to support studies on the diverse species, make habitat improvements, manage wildlife and wild horse populations, conduct more extensive cultural surveys, etc.
3823	The CCP should focus on fees. Fees are appropriate for non-wildlife related use now and maybe eventually for wildlife related use. After all, the Service budget needs to be focused on wildlife and not people management.
3823	I highly recommend tours and shared discussions by all interested parties to resolve issues on the Refuge.
4827	I appreciate the management job your staff is doing and understand you have budget and legal issues.

4828 Those who had the foresight to aid in the establishment of the Refuge/Range are to be commended.

31	Hire on-site staff who are knowledgeable about the area and able to communicate effectively.
129	Staffing should be increased in biological, law enforcement, and maintenance areas.
3801	Horse and burro management alternatives should incorporate establishing an ethical oversight committee made up of credible individuals and groups to work with Sheldon NWR staff.
3801	Gatherings should be monitored by oversight groups as witnesses (and perhaps as volunteer assistants in support roles). That would help to hone the gather techniques and provide confidence to a skeptical public.
3816	Alternative campsite management programs can reduce Refuge staff demands, requiring oversight and less direct management.
3816	Lack of staffing and funding has caused most of the problems and challenges currently identified in the preliminary planning document. Support for the Refuge and its proper staffing and funding should grow as a result of developing the CCP.
3816	Because of the costly and extensive demands on Refuge resources and staff, Refuge management should carefully and fully evaluate all available opportunities to decrease the impacts from recreation on Refuge staff and other resources.
3819	Since the Service is a component of the natural resource government agency complex of Nevada, the participation of Refuge personnel at conservation organization and scientific and educational meetings is encouraged. Such cooperation in past years has been minimal. Such participation would be advantageous to professional staff seeking continued education in their profession. It would likewise provide knowledge of wildlife to interested wildlife and conservation organizations.
4688	Most refuges are at skeletal staff levels. More biological monitoring, more law enforcement and more maintenance personnel should be added.

## Threats to Refuge Resources

### Climate Change

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	The Service should be proactive in determining how climate change will potentially affect Refuge resources and incorporate this information into the CCP and visitor programs. (3810, 3811, 4833)
30	Climate change policy should be based on observation rather than speculation.
3808	The Service must provide a detailed analysis of the historic and modern-day condition of the habitat found on the Refuge and how those conditions have changed over time. The analysis should include a complete inventory of the status of the vegetation communities, soil structure and stability, climate data, an objective measure of the condition of the range, evidence of the presence and spread of invasive species, and documentation of the prevalence of erosive conditions on the Refuge. There should also be a discussion of how changes in habitat conditions affect the ecology and wildlife of the refuge including the wild horses/burros inhabiting the Refuge.
3810	A key first step of climate change management is this identification of major potential threats to the refuge. Climate change could prevent the refuge from meeting its specific purpose within its existing boundaries.
3810	The Service should be proactive in developing management alternatives that account for climate change in management strategies and objectives.
3811	The CCP should outline a plan to research and monitor the ongoing and emerging ecosystem changes induced by climate change. Through careful and thorough monitoring the Refuge System can be prepared to detect changes and respond using the principles of adaptive management.
3811	Our primary concerns include a rapidly changing climate, with associated temporal and spatial alterations in precipitation, species distributions and composition, and suitable habitat, that is affecting the plants and wildlife held in the public trust on Sheldon NWR. The Service should consider foreseeable impacts on the Refuge's resources and work to help wildlife successfully adapt to these changes.
3811	Helping wildlife adapt to a rapidly changing climate, which the Refuge System is well positioned to do with its wildlife-first mandate, will necessarily involve working and thinking beyond refuge boundaries. As such, it is imperative that the Sheldon CCP coordinate with surrounding landowners, such as the Bureau of Land Management, and the Nevada and Oregon state wildlife action plans to consider conservation priority areas and implementation strategies identified in those plans.
3816	Global warming and resulting population and species shifts, disturbances, and stresses to the delicately balanced sagebrush-steppe ecosystem deserve greater attention in the planning phases of this CCP. The Service should take this opportunity to consider what is known and the outcomes most likely to be experienced.

- 3816 We urge the Service to seek discussions with agencies such as EPA, NSF, NOAA, and others involved in compiling information, designing large databases, creating and testing models, and initiating new research efforts on the impacts of climate change.
- 3823 The CCP should focus on the impact rising temperatures have on plant associations. Cheat grass is of special concern because it moves into disturbed lands, appears to be adapting to colder climates, and seems to be increasing in the Sheldon. Are changes occurring in native plant composition as temperatures rise? What are the impacts on wildlife?
- 4828 The management of the refuge should take into account historic climate cycles.

**General Threats to Refuge Resources**

3808	The Service should disclose any documented historic or modern-day threats to range/habitat, how the threats have changed over time, how they have altered range/habitat conditions, and what management actions/tools have been or continue to be used by the Service to combat such threats.
3818	Renewable energy structures, utility corridors, and or oil-gas-geothermal development are not compatible uses on this area.
4833	The Toiyabe Chapter believes that any potential threats to protecting the uniqueness of the sagebrush complex must be addressed in the CCP and eliminated or mitigated
4875	Identify chemicals used on treated wood and prepare a plan to ensure the release of toxins will be minimized.
4875	Identify water bodies potentially listed on the State's current 303(d) list, determine if a water quality restoration plan is established, and include measures so no net degradation to the listed water bodies occurs if no restoration plan exists.
4875	Identify any pesticides and herbicides that may be used for land management practices and identify any effects they would cause on wildlife and terrestrial and aquatic habitats.
4875	The CCP should identify any water bodies and specify any pollutants anticipated to be released into the water (i.e., sedimentation, pesticides, etc.).

## Human Disturbance to Wildlife

4123	Human impact needs to be limited to the furthest extent possible.
4713	Human activities on the Refuge, including recreation, roads development, mines, and utility corridors, should all be managed to restore and maintain a healthy and productive landscape of sagebrush habitats for the important native species.
4787	Close the refuge in non-hunting season to allow the animals to survive without human interaction.
4833	Human activities should be managed so that habitat and wildlife restoration and protection can occur.
4875	Roads contribute more sediment to streams than any other management activity and interrupt the subsurface flow of water, particularly where roads cut into steep slopes.
4875	The use of roadways can contribute to habitat fragmentation, wildlife disturbance, and introduction or exacerbation of noxious weeds, and increase fire danger from off-road vehicles.
4875	Recreational activities should be managed to minimize disturbance to wildlife and habitats within the Refuge.

3811	The CCP should discuss and consider the impacts of climate change on the local ecosystem and explore opportunities for inclusion of such information in the refuge's visitor programs. The FWS should develop brochures, interpretive panels, websites, and educational programs that address the vulnerabilities of refuge resources to climate change, and what the FWS is doing to help plants and wildlife adapt to global environmental changes.
3816	Refuge interpretive programs can convey information and describe the role mining played in the history of the local region.
3819	The public needs and wants to know how the Service is sustaining wildlife and maintaining or enhancing wildlife habitats.
3823	E. R. Sans deserves credit for establishing the Refuge. He devoted his energies to create a safe place for antelope, such as seasonal hunting (versus year round hunting). Through his efforts, the Nevada State Legislature authorized the Governor to set aside lands for wildlife.
3823	The CCP should focus on information and education. We cannot expect the public to know the boundaries, the impacts people have on plants and wildlife, or their possibly being carriers of weeds (such as bur buttercup). Informational materials provided by staff and possibly a friends group can help with this initiative.
3823	Visitor fees might cover and include informational material and signs. Maybe Humboldt County would partner on some educational materials at the Refuge.
3823	Posting the exterior boundary would be helpful to the public.
3826	Potential wilderness boundaries should be clearly marked with signs. Clear maps with wilderness boundaries should be made available to the public.

## Wilderness Management

### Access into Area

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	I strongly disagree with the closure of ANY existing access within the Refuge. People should have access so they can enjoy wildlife viewing in this unique habitat. (27, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57)
416	Managers can close roads and accomplish other functions of wilderness on a case by case basis by using professional judgment and public involvement rather than designating wilderness.
877	Wilderness limits access for fire management.
877	Wilderness limits wildlife viewing for handicapped citizens.
969	I am against wilderness designation on the Refuge. Additional wilderness designation would conflict with other CCP goals, such as mechanical access to suppress wildfires, improve habitat, and maintain water sources.
3803	Leave access to the Refuge the way it was 40-50 years ago. There has been more damage done by trying to "SAVE IT" than was ever done before these policies were started.
3803	Wilderness designation will block access. If you cannot enter it with any mechanized equipment in emergencies, such as fire, how long until it is all destroyed?
3810	The CCP should evaluate and report on motorized access in wilderness to determine if there is increased mechanical activity, stresses to the resources from such access, and management remedies.
4693	The wilderness study areas need to be re-examined. Many of these locations have had trails and roads that have provided controlled access for over 50 years.
4787	Close the refuge in non-hunting season to allow the animals to survive without human interaction.

## General Wilderness Mgmt

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Until the potential wilderness areas have been designated, the Service should manage those areas to retain their wilderness character. (3813, 4529, 4656)
13	Protect the few wild places that are left from motorized vehicles and big business.
877	Wilderness limits water development projects.
1011	Wilderness designation does not address stray horses.
2744	Please manage the land before it is destroyed.
3648	Those water rights need to be purchased to protect and supplement the refuge.
3806	There are many misperceptions of the management that is permissible in Wilderness. In addition there is a tendency to look only at the special requirements of Wilderness as impediments without considering the very considerable benefits Wilderness can contribute to balanced refuge management. We urge you to consult in detail with wilderness management experts and with Congressional Delegation representatives before assuming existing developments, needed restoration work, or managed fire, automatically disqualify lands for Wilderness designation.
3809	An unnecessary wilderness designation could hinder the Refuge's efforts to achieve its conservation and habitat management objectives.
3810	The CCP should evaluate and report on conservation of the land, particularly with regards to invasive species and weed control as it relates to wilderness areas.
3813	Mechanical crushing of vegetation should not be allowed in the areas initially recommended for wilderness, nor in other areas where wild, undisturbed character is the highest wildlife habitat value. Alternative approaches compatible with wilderness should be considered for those areas.
3818	Wilderness designation is not always cost effective. Why create a more protracted and expensive process?
3818	Wilderness designation would limit the research and study of wildlife in a natural habitat. Habitat manipulation to monitor both habitat and wildlife responses would be contrary to acceptable activities inside a Wilderness Area. I do not see a need to hamstring good wildlife management practices when the Service currently controls and manages much of the Refuge under the wilderness study area criteria.
3818	Wilderness designation is not always wildlife friendly. The minimum tool analysis process is often used as a road block or wears petitioners down and most times cause them to opt out of a good project. The time frames associated with trying to accomplish projects in a designated wilderness are overwhelming in most situations, regardless of what the management documents may stipulate.

- 3821 Alternatives considered should include looking at the existing wilderness recommendations and providing a restoration component if any of these lands have had their wilderness values compromised in the intervening years.
- 3821 The President sent his wilderness recommendations to Congress in the 1970's, finding about 341,500 acres to be suitable for preservation as wilderness. Until Congress acts on those recommendations, it is the Service's responsibility to keep those lands in suitable condition for designation as wilderness.
- 3821 Alternatives considered should include looking at the lands with wilderness values that may have been overlooked.
- 3821 Alternatives considered should include looking at the adjustments that could be made to directly link travel management with wilderness management.
- 3821 Alternatives considered should include looking at the existing wilderness recommendations and providing a restoration component if any of these lands have had their wilderness values compromised in the intervening years.
- 3824 Areas that were potential wilderness in the last Conservation Plan should be re-assessed. Any additional roadless portions of the Refuge should be evaluated for wilderness potential. All potential wilderness should be designated. Wilderness provides the highest protection for wildlife, vegetation, watershed, cultural resources, traditional hunting opportunities, solitude and quiet recreation.
- 3826 Potential wilderness boundaries should be clearly marked with signs. Clear maps with wilderness boundaries should be made available to the public.
- 4491 I support some aspects of wilderness projects, but not at the expense of fighting fires and building guzzlers or anything that will help wildlife.
- 4862 The new plan should confirm the department's wilderness recommendation for eight areas totaling 341,000 acres, and also re-study the 232,000 acres that were previously found unsuitable for wilderness.

In Favor of Wilderness/WSA Designation

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Wilderness is an important part of the Refuge and official designation will ensure long-term protection of this beautiful wild area. (10, 952, 992, 1000, 3813, 3826)
M	We support FWS determination to analyze Sheldon’s wilderness resource in the CCP. The CCP should evaluate all wilderness lands that were previously proposed for wilderness designation so that the public may understand the conservation status of those lands. The plan should also identify future management actions. We also applaud the Service’s determination that further study of the wilderness potential on the refuge will be considered in the CCP. The CCP should review all the refuge lands to determine if there are other potential acreage designations. Wilderness designation would ensure the wildlife objectives of the Refuge by preserving the natural high desert wild lands. We believe that refuge wilderness is an invaluable resource. (3810, 3811)
60	I favor some wilderness in the Refuge, especially if it is limited to the huge tables where we can not travel anyway
129	Wilderness designation benefits native species. Therefore, as much acreage as possible should be designated wilderness.
535	I support roadless area designations without making an inaccessible huge wilderness. Limited specified access roads accomplish much in the way of human enjoyment without dramatic impact on the range and wildlife.
904	I am all for wilderness except that I do like road access and camping.
985	I encourage the Service to set aside as much land as possible for wilderness. It is exciting to know that it exists and it is important for the plants and animals to have a wild place to live into the future.
986	Please preserve the natural beauty and wilderness of the Refuge.
3806	There are many misperceptions of the management that is permissible in Wilderness. There are considerable benefits Wilderness can contribute to balanced refuge management. We urge you to consult in detail with Wilderness management experts and with Congressional Delegation representatives before assuming existing developments, needed restoration work, or managed fire, automatically disqualify lands for Wilderness designation.
3811	Our primary concerns include preserving wilderness character on the Refuge.
3813	We urge that the 232,000 acres that were not initially recommended for wilderness be reviewed in the CCP. Some of those lands may have been found unsuitable because of conflicts or structures that no longer exist.

- 3813 The CCP should review the condition of the areas in the initial wilderness recommendations and determine whether any activities or structures have encroached that could impair wilderness values. The CCP should then provide for removing anything inconsistent with wilderness designation.
- 3813 The Refuge contains important habitat for birds and other wildlife. One of the highest priorities in the CCP should be to recommend all suitable lands for designation as wilderness because that will provide statutory protection for the roadless wildlife habitat areas. The history of Sheldon shows that purely administrative designations are not enough to protect this outstanding wildlife habitat.
- 3813 One of the highest priorities in the CCP should be to recommend all suitable lands for designation as wilderness. Until potential wilderness areas have been designated, the Service has the responsibility to keep those lands in suitable condition for designation as wilderness.
- 3816 We commend the Refuge for proposing to initiate further study of the wilderness potential on the Refuge. A number of significant changes have occurred since the original agency proposal was made in early 1970s. We believe wilderness designation, management protocols, and resulting wildlife and habitat benefits support and enhance achievement of primary refuge purposes, contributions to the Refuge System mission and, explicitly, Goal 1 as described by the Refuge.
- 3821 Our primary interest is seeing long term protection for the refuge's incredible wilderness resources. We believe that the permanent protection that wilderness designation gives will help keep the refuge a wild place where many plant and wildlife species will thrive. Wilderness designation will remove the threat of mining and other lands actions.
- 3822 I strongly urge the Service to continue to protect all the wilderness study areas within the refuge by managing them to protect their wilderness values and character. Managing these areas for wilderness is very compatible with advancing the Refuge's primary goals of maintaining habitat for native plants and animals and will not result in user conflicts.
- 3822 I urge the Refuge management to consider the wilderness values in adjacent BLM lands in the Massacre Rim and Sheldon Contiguous WSAs in managing the Refuge lands that border these areas.
- 3825 We wholeheartedly support examining whether lands outside of the existing WSAs but within the Refuge boundary meet the minimum criteria for a wilderness designation proposal and will assist this effort in any way we can.
- 3826 CalUWild believes that the West's remaining wildlands should be added to the National Wilderness Preservation System. Therefore, the current CCP planning process is the appropriate vehicle to begin the process of fulfilling the Interior Department's recommendation of 30 years ago that wilderness at the Refuge be created. We recommend that Congress designates all qualifying lands within the Refuge as wilderness. Until such time as Congress acts on wilderness legislation for the Refuge, areas with wilderness character should be managed to preserve that character.

- 4529 I believe that remote roadless areas are an important component in the Refuge, and provide large unfragmented habitats. I support designation of qualifying roadless areas within the Refuge as wilderness.
- 4581 I would like to see the former wilderness study updated in preparation for a future Sheldon wilderness bill.
- 4603 Consult with Wilderness management experts and with Congressional Delegation representatives before assuming existing developments, needed restoration work, or managed fire, automatically disqualify lands for Wilderness designation.
- 4603 The CCP should review all areas recommended for Wilderness classification during the 1974 study and recommend Wilderness classification for all areas that still qualify. Please review all other roadless areas on the Refuge that meet minimum qualifications for Wilderness and recommend them for inclusion in the Wilderness System.
- 4656 We recommend the Preferred Alternative includes the recommendation that Congress designate all qualifying lands within the Refuge as wilderness.
- 4656 We favor creation of the Sheldon Wilderness.
- 4688 Wilderness designation is the best method of keeping land human-impact free for the benefit of wild plants and animals. We urge rapid study and the designation of a maximum acreage as wilderness.
- 4711 The wilderness recommendations for eight areas with 341,000 acres should be adopted in the CCP, plus appropriate areas that may have been omitted for reasons that no longer apply. Where grazing developments disqualified the land from wilderness status 30 years ago and those developments no longer exist, the lands may now be suitable for designation as wilderness. Such candidate areas should be identified on maps in the draft plan.
- 4714 The CCP should include wilderness recommendations for all 341,000 acres that were recommended by the President 30 years ago. Re-assess the 232,000 acres that were omitted from the wilderness recommendations and determine whether any are suitable for wilderness. When cattle grazing ended in 1994, many fences and structures and access roads became obsolete. That could make more lands available for protection as wilderness.
- 4714 The top priorities of the CCP should be restoration of deteriorated wildlife habitat and gaining wilderness protection for the intact roadless areas of the refuge.
- 4862 Wilderness designation is important for the Sheldon refuge because it's the best protection available.
- 4862 The new plan should confirm the department's wilderness recommendation for eight areas totaling 341,000 acres, and also re-study the 232,000 acres that were previously found unsuitable for wilderness.
- 4872 The CCP should reaffirm the Secretary of the Interior's wilderness recommendations and should consider other lands that may now be suitable for wilderness designation.
- 4872 The CCP should reaffirm the Secretary of the Interior's wilderness recommendations and should consider other lands that may now be suitable for wilderness designation.

In-holdings within Area

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	The CCP should contain clear guidance for acquisition of private land in-holdings within the Refuge. These isolated parcels continue to compromise wildlife habitat values, some occupying important water sources and riparian habitat. As those lands become available for purchase, the Service should be ready to acquire them. (3813, 3821)
M	The Refuge should acquire in-holdings and restore them to their original wild condition. (952, 986, 992, 1000, 3813, 3826)
3810	The CCP should evaluate and report on in-holdings in proposed wilderness and their affect on wildlife, water rights, surrounding wilderness lands, view sheds and road access.

Mineral Exploration within Area

3802	Wilderness designation should not be concerned about mining. The small areas that are open to mining are manageable and offer those that recreate in this way a place to do so.

Not in Favor of Wilderness/WSA Designation

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Do not make the Refuge a wilderness area. (26, 4762, 4767, 4782, 4797, 4804)
M	Wilderness designation prevents the young and old from accessing affected areas. (52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 4647, 4819)
M	Managers can close roads and accomplish other functions of wilderness on a case by case basis by using professional judgment and public involvement. It is far better to handle these issues at a local level rather than carving out huge tracts of land on a map and removing it from multiple use. (141, 416)
2	Do not designate wilderness on the refuge in order to exclude people from enjoying the Refuge.
136	The wilderness study areas need to be re-examined. I believe several of these locations do not meet the criteria for wilderness. Many of the designated areas have extensive trails and roads that have existed for fifty years or more.
829	The addition of more wilderness declarations will be counterproductive to wildlife and the public.
877	I would like to see the Sheldon stay a Refuge and not a wilderness.
932	The criteria for wilderness designation of the Refuge needs to be re-examined in the best interest of outdoor enthusiasts who utilize the resources.
969	I am against wilderness designation on the Refuge. Additional wilderness designation would conflict with other CCP goals, such as mechanical access to suppress wildfires, improve habitat, and maintain water sources.
1011	In my view, the Wilderness designation for the Refuge is completely unwarranted and counter-productive. The Service already has complete management control over the Refuge. With the current restrictions on travel, camping, predator hunting, why is there a need for the further restrictions of wilderness designation?
2002	I am opposed to wilderness designation because it is unnecessary and serves no useful purpose for wildlife management on the Sheldon. Wilderness designation does not allow land management for water development or maintenance, use of aircraft for wildlife censusing, mechanized or aerial fire fighting, etc.
3802	We do not need any wilderness or Wilderness Study Areas (WSA) in the Refuge. Through the Refuge Act, you have all the power that you need. I ask that you consider eliminating WSA's and not having any wilderness inside the Refuge. Wilderness limits fire management, water developments, and the enhancement of springs and meadows.
3803	Establishment of more of this area, or any part of this area, as "Wilderness" is totally beyond me. Wilderness designation is a "GOVERNMENT LAND GRAB" couched in the "TO SAVE IT" jargon. The real purpose is strictly political, ensuring there is adequate "equity or collateral" for the loans we seek from foreign countries.

- 3809 Wilderness Study Areas are not appropriate for wilderness designation. Man-made artifacts currently on the landscape and the presence of non-native wild horses and burros (introduced by man) has had a significant effect on the habitat that the Refuge offers to native species.
- 3818 Wilderness study areas should not be pushed to full blown wilderness designation. The Service currently controls all the access points, special uses, camping locations, and just about every aspect of human activity on the Refuge. The creation of any wilderness areas would limit all management options in the future in perpetuity.
- 3818 Sufficient wilderness acres lie to the south of the Refuge to satisfy those who seek solitude in areas resembling something akin to untrammelled country, therefore wilderness is not needed for the Refuge.
- 4647 I am opposed to any wilderness designation on Sheldon. Wilderness designation does not benefit wildlife because it inhibits fighting wild fire and minimizing invasive plant species that follow fire.
- 4647 I don't support wilderness designation for the Alkali Peak WSA, because it would involve massive road closures and closure of the Devany camp ground.
- 4647 Wilderness precludes management tools to suppress wildfire, manipulate vegetative types, develop water sources.
- 4757 Topics that need to be addressed in the CCP include too many wild horses, a comprehensive predator management policy, eliminate wilderness management areas, possibly roadless area designations.

## Wildlife/Habitat Management

### Fencing

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Removal of obsolete livestock fencing should occur. (3789, 4861, 4862)
M	All boundary fences and enclosures should be well maintained. (3819, 4833)
20	When we left the Virgin Valley Ranch in the late 1980's so that the refuge could be "cattle free," the Service was going to take down all of the existing bob wire fences. I look around and see many partial fences remain.
136	Until fencing the perimeter is complete, horses will continue to move to the Refuge from adjacent lands. This compounds the issues of management success.
3789	When building new fencing, use something other than barbed wire, that is more wildlife friendly.
3801	Many of the fences are in disrepair and the troughs are not functioning. Perhaps some of the more-sensitive riparian habitats could be fenced off and the troughs repaired in an effort to stabilize these zones and allow wildlife, including horses, to drink from these sources without impacting streamside vegetation.
3818	Many of the historic exclosures, designed to protect resources from livestock and cattle, have been compromised and the integrity of those projects has been lost by feral horse use.
3819	The compatibility of livestock exclusion fences with wildlife needs attention. It is recommended that future management planning efforts review all fences built to control livestock and how these fences affect various wildlife on site today. This includes external boundary fences. Fence structures allowed to exist should have a minimum adverse effect on the welfare of wildlife.
3823	Fencing and posting the exterior boundary would be helpful to the public.
4827	I would like to see spring areas fenced for a year or two to rest the plant life.
4833	Fencing should be removed. If fencing is necessary, it should be made wildlife-friendly.

## Fire Ecology and Management

<b>ID</b>	<b>Comment</b>
M	Wilderness designation will limit access for fire management. (877, 3802, 3803)
M	Fire prevention should be addressed in the CCP. (4788, 4811)
M	Horse and/or livestock grazing reduces fire fuels. (31, 3803, 3807, 3817, 4756, 4791)
M	Oppose all use of prescribed burns. (33, 4755, 4793)
20	I cannot understand why the fields at Virgin Valley Ranch have not been burned each year to allow the new growth to flourish. Maybe if this were done, the wildlife like ducks, geese, swans, deer and antelope, to name a few, might return.
3818	Without large ungulates on the Refuge, habitat management will undoubtedly shift to fire as the preferred method of habitat manipulation. A prescription should be developed for each fire with measurable goals and objectives for specific wildlife species. Management perspective should be broadened to include fuel reduction.
3818	Under normal management regimes, a minimum of two seasons of grazing rest from livestock is applied to both wildfire and prescription burns. Most of the prescribed fire projects and wildfire areas on the Refuge have been compromised because of over utilization from feral horses.
3818	Wildfire suppression, with the current status of the sage-grouse and other sagebrush obligate species, needs to be seriously managed on a site by site basis. The single largest risk factor to sage-grouse is the loss of habitat to wildfire and type conversion to less desirable plant species.
3819	Recognize that wildfires have been a natural disturbance factor that contributes to diverse composition and production of forage classes (grasses/forbs/shrubs) in the Great Basin ecosystem. Include a revised and updated fire management suppression program.
3819	The Badger Mountain fire warrants an active, immediate rehabilitation program. Because the fire was extensive in size, it will require special considerations for rehabilitation. We encourage you to use tried and tested techniques.
3824	Over the years, I have observed the substantial progress of vegetation health and vigor due to carefully prescribed burns. This adaptive management approach to use of fire should continue.
3825	We are very concerned about the proliferation of cheatgrass on the Refuge, particularly in areas that have been subjected to prescribed burns and other treatments. These areas, which include important habitat for Brewer's sparrow, sage sparrow, shrike and (especially) pygmy rabbit, frequently have been fragmented or destroyed by these past actions. Eliminate burning as well as sagebrush mowing in areas not yet invaded by cheatgrass to prevent its spread. We believe a day with a chainsaw would address any juniper issues that may be present on the Refuge.

- 4824 Mountain browse communities are highly diverse and productive and require future fire suppression and restoration throughout the Refuge.
- 4824 NDOW has major concerns with the recent prescribed fire projects and future projects affecting wildlife habitat.
- 4824 NDOW suggests that the best science be presented to justify any further prescribed fire programs in the CCP. These studies should be able to predict outputs and wildlife impacts to sage brush obligate species.
- 4875 Prescribed burning could result in air, soil, water quality, and micro fauna impacts.
- 4875 Identify chemicals used on treated wood and prepare a plan to ensure the release of toxins will be minimized.
- 4875 If prescribed burns are part of the management plan, the USFWS should prepare a smoke management program that includes elements from Section VI of the Interim Air Quality Policy on Wildland and Prescribed Fires.
- 4875 Describe the measures that will be taken to assure that water and air quality standards will be met during prescribed burns.

**General Wildlife/Habitat Mgmt**

M	The Refuge should be managed to benefit the native wildlife. (1802, 2002, 2871, 3822, 4529)
M	Natural processes should be allowed to occur on the Refuge with as little interference from humans as possible. (7, 1009, 1016, 4068, 4529)
M	Antelope and other sage brush obligate wildlife have been adversely affected by horses and burros. (2871, 3802)
M	Wilderness designation limits water development projects. (877, 3802)
20	I cannot understand why the fields at Virgin Valley Ranch have not been burned each year to allow the new growth to flourish. Maybe if this were done, the wildlife like ducks, geese, swans, deer and antelope, to name a few, might return.
22	The Refuge should benefit wildlife without regard to economics.
28	Predator populations should be controlled. They have increased greatly while the prey populations have decreased.
1021	The CCP should put wildlife requirements first, including biological habitat requirements.
1033	The wildlife need their land.
2308	Please do not kill the animals on the refuge.
3789	Please allow beavers to remain on the Refuge.
3798	Public lands are not being managed properly.
3808	If a lethal predator control program is currently practiced on the Refuge, a thorough evaluation of its efficacy and potential negative impacts must be assessed.
3808	Follow the standardized sequence for refuge planning suggested in "Science-Based Stewardship: Recommendations for Implementing the National Wildlife Refuge System Improvement Act" (biological inventory, identification of plan goals, identification of threats, choice of focal species, CCP, monitoring and implementation, plan amendment [according to monitoring results]).

- 3808 The Service must provide a detailed analysis of the historic and modern-day condition of the habitat found on the Refuge and how those conditions have changed over time. The analysis should include a complete inventory of the status of the vegetation communities, soil structure and stability, climate data, an objective measure of the condition of the range, evidence of the presence and spread of invasive species, and documentation of the prevalence of erosive conditions on the Refuge. There should also be a discussion of how changes in habitat conditions affect the ecology and wildlife of the refuge including the wild horses/burros inhabiting the Refuge.
- 3808 Humane, non-lethal wildlife conflict management techniques need to be assessed.
- 3808 Please consider adopting a management policy stipulating that in instances where wildlife, including wild horses/burros, appears to be a threat to property, facilities, human safety, habitat, or special status species, that humane, non-lethal management techniques will be employed first, prior to any consideration of lethal methods.
- 3808 A rigorous biological survey and inventory of flora and fauna inhabiting the refuge is needed.
- 3809 We highly recommend that Sheldon NWR use Cabeza Prieta and Kofa NWR's efforts as a model for developing a similar collaborative effort with Nevada state wildlife management authorities to restore and/or install artificial water sources for the wildlife of Sheldon NWR.
- 3817 For comparison purposes, I would like the Service to include reasonable estimates for wildlife species exclusively within the Refuge as well as estimated reductions in these same species if the Service offered an alternative that included management plans for a range of wild horse numbers between 400-800 and 80-150 burros.
- 3818 Imposed limitations and constraints through rules, regulations, policies, laws or a combination thereof are often times some of the largest risk factors confronting wildlife and their habitat. Look beyond the refuge concept and look to the future for a clearer understanding of the very complex interactions between the many wildlife species that occupy the Refuge and the many diverse habitat types therein.
- 3818 Water development has played an important role in the enhancement and enrichment of the overall habitat for a myriad of species on the Refuge. I would retain and maintain the manmade structures that have been developed over the decades. They have become core use areas for the wildlife, especially pronghorn.
- 3818 Wildlife needs of the Refuge can be managed with the relatively small footprint of mining.
- 3819 Forage data from Big Springs Table could be collected, analyzed, and extrapolated for the Great Basin. This is valuable information for management plans and decisions.
- 3819 It is recommended that annual bighorn lamb recruitment studies be re-instated. Perhaps this could be a project for a volunteer in future years. It can not be emphasized too strongly that it is the responsibility of FWS to obtain biological data on the SNWR through whenever reasonable means is deemed appropriate. Direct observations by refuge biological trained staff would be a highly desirable strategy.

- 3819 Conduct field investigations to document the condition and trend of past and current vegetation structure, composition, and seral stage of forage classes (grasses, forbs, shrubs, and trees) by acreage.
- 3819 Special attention is urged for mountain mahogany management research and plans. Heavy utilization by deer and past livestock has led to low plant survival. In addition, low plant reproduction and current moth infestations pose serious hurdles to maintaining healthy, productive stands.
- 3819 Provide management strategies in the CCP to change the dominant, unhealthy shrublands to a mixture of native grasses, forbs, and shrubs.
- 3822 I urge the FWS to put their mission of managing habitat for native species, such as the pronghorn, mule deer, sage grouse, and pygmy rabbit, first. This means focusing management to achieve goals for the health of native species, and only managing non-native species in a way that helps achieve the first goal.
- 4089 Do not remove any wildlife, including wild horses and burros, from the Refuge. They should be allowed to roam free.
- 4159 We need greater biodiversity.
- 4688 Use of chemical pesticides should be closely monitored and kept to a minimum.
- 4763 Better game management in the refuge.
- 4788 Water development should be addressed in the CCP.
- 4800 Remove excess animals.
- 4802 Water issues should be addressed in the CCP
- 4811 Water development should be addressed in the CCP.
- 4824 NDOW encourages the CCP to consider the full landscape and risks affecting the many birds and mammals dependent on sage brush communities in the Great Basin.
- 4833 A policy regarding manmade reservoirs and the many small "scoops" which provide water to animals should be established.
- 4833 Plant and animal inventories should be used to manage the wildlife and habitats within the Refuge.
- 4833 The USFWS should identify wetlands and seeps that support vegetation and wildlife for possible filing as a vested water right to prevent the usurpation of valuable water resources by private and public entities.
- 4833 Research on the sagebrush steppe should be used to identify the best restoration programs for the Refuge.

- 4875 If silviculture activities will be conducted in the project area, the EIS should discuss habitat and wildlife impacts and retention of a healthy ecosystem during and after disturbance activities.
- 4876 Humane population management should occur for all wildlife populations.

Invasive/Non-native Species

M	Cheat grass is a primary invasive species concern for a variety of reasons. (62, 3823, 3825, 4716)
M	Invasive plant and animal species should be removed from the Refuge. (129, 959, 1010, 1013, 3816, 4785, 4861, 4875)
M	The discussion of horse and burro management might best be placed within the content of invasive species. The obligatory relationship of controlling horses and burros to achieving habitat restoration and diverse, abundant and healthy wildlife populations is best understood when the issues are described in context. (1021, 3892, 3816, 3822, 4823)
30	Invasive species are only bound to get worse.
33	I am opposed to the use of toxic chemicals to manage invasive species on the Refuge.
62	Horses and burros have overgrazed forage, which allows invasive species, such as cheat grass, to take over.
2744	The land is being destroyed by non-native animals and predators.
3809	We recommend aggressive management strategies to reduce populations of non-predator species such as ravens and beaver that may adversely affect other species and their habitats.
3810	A strong monitoring and evaluation program is the key to good refuge management. We recommend that an effort to inventory, monitor, protect, and enhance habitat for refuge species is outlined in the CCP, particularly with regards to non-native species.
3816	The discussion of horse and burro management might best be placed within the content of invasive species. The obligatory relationship of controlling horses and burros to achieving habitat restoration and diverse, abundant and healthy wildlife populations is best understood when the issues are described in context.
3818	I would broaden the management perspective to include the use of herbicides for greenstrip and control of noxious plants. The single largest risk factor to sage-grouse is the loss of habitat to wildfire and type conversion to less desirable plant species.
3823	Horses are vehicles for weed dispersal, such as cheat grass.
3823	The CCP should focus on the impact of rising temperatures on plant associations. Cheat grass is of special concern because it moves into disturbed lands, appears to be adapting to colder climates, and seems to be increasing in the Sheldon.

- 3825 Invasive species adversely affect natural habitats. We are very concerned about the proliferation of cheatgrass on the Refuge, particularly in areas that have been subjected to prescribed burns and other treatments over the years, include important habitat for Brewer's sparrow, sage sparrow, shrike and (especially) pygmy rabbit. We feel that the focus in the upcoming CCP should be on "hands off" treatment of weeds and invasive species, including eliminating cheatgrass and minimizing the risk of cheatgrass in sites not yet invaded.
- 4688 Exotic, invasive species should be aggressively combated with emphasis on non-chemical methods such as well studied insects and other bio-controls.
- 4694 Dynamic triggers should be written into the CCP so that the Sheldon can have proactive rather than reactive management of non-native species (horses and exotic vegetation).
- 4706 The EIS should provide a discussion to comply with the Executive Order (EO 13112) on invasive species.
- 4755 I oppose all use of toxic chemicals in this area.
- 4833 Juniper can be an essential part of wildlife habitat and should be managed appropriately.
- 4833 If Juniper is not an essential part of wildlife habitat, the juniper should be removed.
- 4875 Alternatives should evaluate the effects of livestock grazing on the potential for the colonization of noxious weeds.
- 4875 If silviculture activities will be conducted in the project area, the EIS should discuss reduction of potential for invasive species colonization as discussed in EO 13112.

Native Species Specific

M	The Sheldon Refuge should be managed with its original intent - for the antelope. (4770, 4781, 4795)
62	Horses and burros are endangering sage hens, logger head shrikes, and other birds.
62	Horses and burros are endangering Lahontan cutthroat and other fishes.
62	A large portion of the Refuge's budget is used to manage and control feral horses and burros instead of being used for the benefit of native species. Horses and burros need to be managed at levels that are beneficial to all wildlife on the Refuge.
141	Predator management can be implemented to augment and enhance the populations of native species within the complex. The Refuge manager should be able to act when predator management is necessary to accomplish the goals of the Refuge.
148	I understand that native antelope populations are being compromised by mountain lion. Please revise management strategies in favor of the native wildlife.
150	Horses stand guard over springs and prevent native wildlife from drinking. This habitat destruction will take years to repair. Who knows if the sage grouse will ever return?
416	Predator management can be implemented to augment and enhance the populations of native species within the complex. When predator management is necessary to accomplish the goals of this refuge complex the refuge manager should be able to act.
922	Our natural resources should be kept for native wildlife.
959	The Refuge should be managed to protect and maintain native species. Few examples of this ecosystem remain intact and the Refuge is uniquely situated to preserve native species. Non-native species should not be stocked for sport fishing.
959	The Refuge should be managed to protect and maintain native species. Few examples of this ecosystem remain intact and the Refuge is uniquely situated to preserve native species.
971	It has been proven that horses are native to the United States and should be allowed to live on the Refuge.
3598	Please give the Refuge priority to the pronghorn antelope.
3811	The CCP should take steps to increase resource resiliency by working to reduce non-climate stressors on native wildlife and water sources, including the humane removal of feral horses and burros.
3815	The bighorn sheep are reintroduced and are deemed critical to the Refuge, particularly by hunters, and are not considered exotic species. How can the CCP allow that bighorn sheep are more native than the wild horse. Patricia Fazio, PhD and Jay Kirkpatrick, PhD published an exhibit that concludes the horse is indeed native wildlife.

- 3816 It is known that the Refuge harbors plant and mammal species generally requiring specific attention and protection. Threats include mining activities, grazing, off-road vehicles, pollution, and other modifications of required habitats. These species require appropriate and frequent monitoring to assure that population integrity is determined and trends known. By making specific commitments the Service can assure the public that deserving species are receiving needed attention.
- 3816 We believe the Refuge should terminate the practice of stocking non-native fish in order to give high priority to recovery of habitats and populations of native fish species and their related ecosystems.
- 3816 It is known that the Refuge harbors unique fish. Threats include mining activities, grazing, off-road vehicles, pollution, and other modifications of required habitats. These species require appropriate and frequent monitoring to assure that population integrity is determined and trends known. By making specific commitments the Service can assure the public that deserving species are receiving needed attention.
- 3818 The management and control of the wild horses is my number one concern relative to the success of any new planning efforts on the Sheldon. It is the single largest factor influencing many of the critical habitat sites on the Sheldon. As stated in those documents, if native wildlife are to thrive and recruit under natural habitat conditions, then the Sheldon must manage to a zero horse and burro number.
- 3822 I urge the Service to take a close look at fish stocking policies on the refuge and to consider only stocking native fish in waters on the refuge. Recreational fishing, particularly the stocking of non-native species in artificial man-made reservoirs, should not be a priority public use of the refuge, as it is in conflict with the purposes for which the reserve was created.
- 4123 It is imperative that we continue to monitor and foster the native vegetation, animal, and overall habitat of the region.
- 4123 The damage done to the area needs to be halted and to the greatest extent possible, reversed, to provide adequate natural habitat for native species such as the pronghorn antelope, the greater sage grouse, and the Lahontan cutthroat trout, among others.
- 4819 Do not disturb the Sage Grouse strutting grounds for research.
- 4824 Mountain browse communities are highly diverse and productive and require future fire suppression and restoration throughout the Refuge.
- 4824 Virgin Creek presents an outstanding opportunity to protect and better manage for strains of Alvord cutthroat trout.
- 4824 Antelope harvest programs will respect and manage to meet Refuge goals.
- 4824 The 3,500 antelope population goal can be achieved with water development and management of wild horses.
- 4824 NDOW 's Mule Deer Species Plan will be tiered to the Sheldon Management Unit to serve as a cooperative implementation level or habitat management plan with the USFWS.

- 4824 The Sheldon Sage Grouse Population Management Unit Conservation Plan should provide the CCP with an example of the next tier of land use planning.
- 4824 As a matter of the Commission's Elk Species Management Plan, NDOW will entertain a Sub-herd Plan at a time when elk numbers reach viable and sustainable populations. The intent is for the Plan to serve as a mutual agreement and habitat management plan tiered to the CCP.
- 4824 Management actions that influence sport fisheries require adequate mitigation to sustain native fish species populations in their historical distributions.
- 4824 Bighorn captures on the Refuge may be required to meet NDOW's goals and objectives of the Bighorn Species Plan.
- 4824 The new CCP should embrace Sage Grouse Conservation Guidelines as the standard of planning inclusive of the harvest programs outlined in the existing plan.
- 4824 NDOW requests that the maintenance of existing pit tanks, large capacity guzzlers and impoundment be maintained for antelope management.
- 4824 Resource Activity Plans will further plan and implement new guzzlers to achieve the antelope population goal.
- 4824 The bighorn sheep are thriving in various locations of the Refuge and many are dependent on our large capacity water developments. In order to achieve bighorn sheep potentials, future actions will require additional guzzlers and vegetation projects to increase habitat.
- 4825 The large native ungulates, such as mule deer, antelope and bighorn sheep should have an area free of competition from large, non-native grazing animals.
- 4833 The CCP should develop a plan to link the Hart and Sheldon Refuges which includes options for: facilitating migration; acquiring additional lands; purchasing conservation easements; and coordinating with local landowners, state agencies, and non-profits to secure pronghorn migration corridors.
- 4833 The Toiyabe Chapter believes that the pronghorn antelope population will thrive to the extent that access is facilitated between the Hart and Sheldon Refuges.
- 4833 The CCP should address the needs of protecting, maintaining, and enhancing sensitive species.
- 4833 In the CCP, elk and buffalo management should be subject to the Refuge purposes, including maintaining/restoring ecosystem health.
- 4875 Alternatives should evaluate the effects of livestock grazing on special status species.
- 4875 The EPA is concerned about water quality as related to the ESA listed salmonids.
- 4875 Evaluate all special status species, including ESA listed species, describe the critical habitat, identify any impacts the management programs will have on these species' critical habitat, and discuss how all requirements under the ESA will be met.

Research

ID	Comment
3789	The Sheldon Refuge should preserve some horses in order to study the effects of horse grazing on the desert environment.
3801	I am pleased that the Refuge will establish an enclosure study to document current impacts to upland and riparian sites by horses and burros. Empirical data collected at the Refuge can assist in developing appropriate horse population numbers.
3806	This Refuge is unique as it provides a large area of Great Basin, high desert ecosystem free from livestock use. Opportunities for research are important. One of which is to study the long debated benefits of protecting native wildlife habitat from livestock grazing. There simply is not another area in the Great Basin that provides this level of quality research opportunity. Horse grazing negates much of this unique opportunity.
3818	The Refuge is a tremendous area to study wildlife and their habitat. Research should be encouraged and tolerance for new and innovative practices to help the wildlife management field progress in both knowledge and applied practices.
3818	Wilderness designation would limit the research and study of wildlife in a natural habitat. Habitat manipulation to monitor both habitat and wildlife responses would be contrary to acceptable activities inside a Wilderness Area.
3819	The two 3-phase research enclosure plots that were damaged in the Badger Mountain fire should be reconstructed to continue vegetation trend data collected during the past 30-year period.
3819	Forage data from Big Springs Table could be collected, analyzed, and extrapolated for the Great Basin. This is valuable information for management plans and decisions.
3819	It is recommended that annual bighorn lamb recruitment studies be re-instated. Perhaps this could be a project for a volunteer in future years. It can not be emphasized too strongly that it is the responsibility of F&WS to obtain biological data on the SNWR through whenever reasonable means is deemed appropriate. Direct observations by refuge biological trained staff would be a highly desirable strategy.
3819	Conduct field investigations to document the condition and trend of past and current vegetation structure, composition, and seral stage of forage classes (grasses, forbs, shrubs, and trees) by acreage.
4824	Habitat assessments and re-introduction potentials for sharp-tail grouse should be considered.
4824	Research work now being done on the Complex will provide better science in future management decisions particularly in fire and fuels projects.
4824	Several factors mentioned in the Executive Order will require additional assessments to determine wildlife objectives and any changes in the landscape in respect to "excessive forage" for livestock before the exclusion of livestock is changed at The Refuge.

- 4824 NDOW suggests that the best science be presented to justify any further prescribed fire programs in the CCP. These studies should be able to predict outputs and wildlife impacts to sage brush obligate species.
- 4833 The CCP should inventory all water bodies, identify water bodies owned by USFWS, and identify water bodies that may require filing with the Nevada State Engineer.
- 4833 An invasive species inventory should be completed.
- 4833 Additional research should be completed regarding human activities and effects on wildlife and habitat, including off-road vehicles, camping, hunting, and mining.
- 4833 Additional research should be completed on the sagebrush steppe to determine what can be done to protect the plants and animals.
- 4833 Additional research should be completed regarding wildlife habitat to determine the best management programs for habitat protection.
- 4833 Plant and animal inventories should be completed to identify increasing and declining plant and animal populations.
- 4858 There should be scientific data on all wild horses and burros so that they can remain in the wild without being disturbed by people and civilization.
- 4875 Inventory all special status species, including ESA listed species, describe the critical habitat, identify any impacts the management programs will have on these species' critical habitat, and discuss how all requirements under the ESA will be met.
- 4875 Identify all drinking water sources, potentials for contamination, and measures to be taken to protect these sources.
- 4875 Evaluate effects on wildlife and plants as related to habitat fragmentation caused by roads, land use, management activities, and human activities.

Riparian/Upland Restoration

M	The vegetation in the Refuge has suffered from many years of abuse by livestock grazing and wild horses. The CCP should include provisions for restoring the natural ecosystem, leading to a future in which "hands-off" management lets nature do the job. (3813, 3821)
M	We feel that as you move forward with the plan, one alternative should look at the existing wilderness recommendations and provide a restoration component if any of these lands have had their wilderness values compromised in the intervening years. (3821, 3824)
M	Develop a program to restore and protect riparian areas. (986, 3801, 3819, 4711, 4763, 4768, 4778, 4784, 4786, 4861, 4871, 4872)
M	Allow natural processes to restore damaged areas. (986, 992, 1000, 3826)
28	Restoration of the Dufferrena Ponds would help the bird populations.
29	Are there scientific studies that illustrate the bio-diversity benefits of wet meadow or edge habitat, as it has been created at Pond 13 by the long-time drainage patterns? Storm debris from within the clay canyons regularly is washed out and onto the roads, requiring bulldozing in support of the goose habitat and the dam. The muck needs to be moved out of the meadow and off of the fault valley road on a regular basis. It is not uncommon for people to drive into the ditch next to the road.
62	Horses damage springs and riparian areas, which requires restoration.
142	The fencing of springs to prevent damage to the riparian area has been helpful due to horse use, but is not good for sage-grouse broods (dense grass is avoided by young broods). Areas that need to be under continuous fencing should be given priority of converting to wildlife friendly fences (springs, camping areas and boundary fences).
142	Control of juniper expansion should be a priority to preserve the sage-steppe ecosystem. Consider protecting some old growth groves. I refer you to the Forest Service document from the Modoc National Forest for guidelines in controlling juniper expansion.
992	The Service should restore newly purchased in-holdings to their original condition.
1000	The Service should restore newly purchased in-holdings to their original condition.
3648	Areas needing restoration should be identified as part of the planning process (i.e. fence or development removal, weed removal, restoring damage from off road vehicles, etc) so that the ecology groups can help the process for the wildlife, especially the noxious weeds invaders.

- 3801 Many of the fences are in disrepair and the troughs are not functioning. Perhaps some of the more sensitive riparian habitats could be fenced off and the troughs repaired in an effort to stabilize these zones and allow wildlife, including horses, to drink from these sources without impacting streamside vegetation.
- 3802 Wilderness limits the protection and enhancement of springs and meadows.
- 3818 Many of the meadow systems have been heavily influenced by head-cuts and reduction in the water table. Without mechanical intervention, the recovery rate for many systems will be painfully slow or virtually impossible. The recovery of many of these sites would greatly enhance the amount of free or flowing water associated with these historic wet meadow systems. The dividends to the sagebrush obligate species and wildlife in general would be significant.
- 3819 Native bighorn sheep inhabited the rocky escarpment on the Refuge's west boundary during historic times, however, no bighorns have occupied the site during the past 55 years of management. Apparently there is adequate forage, water, and escapement cover to sustain a viable herd. Our investigation of this deficiency indicates federal interagency communication problems stemming from a domestic sheep trail in the adjacent west valley. We urge active negotiations to resolve the alleged problem. The result would be a return of endemic bighorns to historic habitat--an objective of federal agencies advocating the principle of sustaining maximum native wildlife diversity on public rangelands.
- 3819 Please recognize that the major Refuge natural resource management issue is the present high acreage of unhealthy vegetation communities in late seral stage with abnormal composition diversity of grass/forb/shrub densities. Therefore, provide management strategies that will accelerate vegetation alterations simulating natural disturbance factors to enhance seral stage changes over the next decades.
- 3819 Certain water improvements developed in the past were designed to provide drinking water for livestock. These still exist. Their compatibility with wildlife were not always recognized. The developments are now potential death traps to wildlife and should be removed. This would also allow water to seek a natural course for runoff as opposed to the artificial system presently in existence.
- 3821 Since livestock grazing was terminated in 1994, there may be additional fences, roads, water developments and other installations that supported grazing are now obsolete and could be removed.
- 3823 The CCP should focus on "on call" grazing. There may be an occasion when grazing is appropriate to protect a species (i.e. sage grouse) or reduce weeds. Then the USFWS should have the flexibility to bring in livestock for a specific area and a specific limited time. The livestock used would have to be weed free; goat herds are now being used to control white top, for instance.
- 3824 Existing routes deemed unnecessary to the system should be rehabilitated on a priority basis and until then should have a serious steel sign or physical block designating closed.
- 3825 Restoring and enhancing biological integrity, diversity, and environmental health will ensure that the Refuge's purposes are met.

- 4123 The damage done to the area needs to be halted and to the greatest extent possible, reversed, to provide adequate natural habitat for native species such as the pronghorn antelope, the greater sage grouse, and the Lahontan cutthroat trout, among others.
- 4529 The CCP should clearly identify areas needing restoration (i.e. fence or development removal, weed removal, restoring damage from off road vehicles, etc). A priority list of these areas should be developed so that limited staff and funds can be focused most effectively.
- 4656 Natural processes should be encouraged where they still exist in the Refuge or restored where they don't.
- 4666 Areas needing restoration should be identified as part of the planning process (i.e. fence or development removal, weed removal, restoring damage from off road vehicles, etc).
- 4705 Modoc County has noted with approval the National Wildlife Refuge System's outreach to provide expertise and opportunities to accomplish ecosystem habitat restoration and enhancement on surrounding lands, both government and privately owned. The County supports this approach to overall resource management.
- 4819 The Gooch ditch should be improved for any available flow to the serve Big Spring Reservoir.
- 4824 Restoration efforts on Hell Creek and lower Virgin Creek should also occur.
- 4824 In order to achieve bighorn sheep potentials, future actions will require additional vegetation projects to increase habitat.
- 4824 Pond 13 would be better managed for wetland habitats. Hard stem bulrush and willow objectives should enhance water quality in the lower Virgin Creek drainage.
- 4824 Mountain browse communities are highly diverse and productive and require future fire suppression and restoration throughout the Refuge.
- 4833 The Catnip Reservoir should have a management plan that includes the restoration of the dam, which is currently leaking.
- 4833 Research on the sagebrush steppe should be used to identify the best restoration programs for the Refuge.
- 4872 Removal of obsolete grazing structures and grazing access routes may make some areas more suitable for wilderness than they were 30 years ago.
- 4875 Identify efforts toward restoration of native habitats disrupted by the colonization and establishment of noxious weeds.
- 4875 Identify water bodies potentially listed on the State's current 303(d) list, determine if a water quality restoration plan is established, and include measures so no net degradation to the listed water bodies occurs if no restoration plan exists.

## Wildlife/Habitat Protection

M	Eliminate disturbance to sage grouse leks that is caused by research/study. (27, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57)
M	Given the motive for establishing the Refuge, motorized travel management decisions should be based on the needs of wildlife, not human recreation. (992, 1000)
M	The CCP should include a comprehensive plan to manage special status species and their habitats. (3810, 3816)
17	What wildlife live on the Refuge (bear, cougar, deer, wild horses?) and how many acres of wildlife habitat are included in the Refuge?
20	I have heard that the Service wants to push in Duferrena Pond #13 and possibly more. What would this accomplish? I use to drive by and see many ducks, geese, and other wildlife using it.
32	The first priority of the Refuge should be to protect the living things: animals, birds, and vegetation. There are many people more concerned with their personal profit than wildlife and habitat protection.
32	Protect the habitat of the Refuge but don't go over the top by changing the entire environment. Some changes come naturally.
35	A reduction in coyote numbers will improve the population size of smaller game such as pygmy rabbits.
35	I see no mention of big horn sheep in the plan.
43	"Wildlife-dependent" uses such as hunting, trapping, and fishing should not be allowed on a refuge. A refuge should be a place where wildlife can live free of human harassment.
140	I believe Sheldon is still one of the best areas to visit and view wildlife, and I would like to see that continue in the future.
395	Humanely treat the wildlife.
408	Choices should be made in harmony with and for the welfare of nature, humans, and animals. The earth is very vulnerable. Make the right decisions.

- 435 There are many advocates of sharing this land with the wild creatures that inhabit it with us. Human beings must learn to inhabit our land with less of a conquering and vanquishing footprint.
- 494 So many wonderful species have become extinct due to human mismanagement and insensitivity, so the few remaining indeed are in need of a sanctuary.
- 535 I support the control of predators which directly impact all other wildlife.
- 582 Do not hurt the animals.
- 812 Leave alone the beautiful animals, they are God's creatures.
- 824 Horses and burros are vital to the Refuge's ecosystem.
- 829 I have witnessed a severe decline in the health of the antelope habitat on the Refuge. Springs are trampled to a point of nonexistence and forage has been overgrazed by the multitude of horses and burros. These horses and burros drive many of the spring dependant wildlife away from what little water that exists. Wild horses and burros are the single largest danger to the Refuge. They must be aggressively managed.
- 829 Coyotes and predators in general may be affecting antelope kid production and survival. The protection of predators on the Refuge should be relaxed. The lion population may also be increasing and may also impact sheep and other wildlife.
- 900 The position the Service holds should be in the best interest of our wildlife, not uninformed people that want to manage through emotions rather than sound science.
- 959 The wetlands of the Refuge should be preserved as part of the greater ecosystem and not necessarily as recreation sites. Activities on or near these critical areas may need to be limited to preserve habitat for native species first. Camping sites may need to be moved away from wetlands.
- 986 Public roads should not significantly affect wildlife movements or destroy significant fragile habitat.
- 1593 Illegal poaching of antelope is a bigger problem than feral horses and burros.
- 1802 If the springs and water sources are protected from horses and burros, the vegetation and riparian habitat will also be protected.
- 2308 The wildlife should be allowed to live free and wild at Sheldon Refuge.
- 3808 Impacts of recreational activities on native flora and fauna needs to be assessed and mitigated.
- 3808 Additional management alternatives for protecting flora and fauna on refuges is needed.

- 3808 Please consider restriction or prohibition of the use of moist soil management and water manipulation practices and lethal predator control in favor of re-establishing natural conditions and ecological relationships.
- 3808 We are concerned that in managing NWRs, the Service has strayed far from its own policy which "directs that wildlife comes first in the National Wildlife Refuge System." Many refuges allow and encourage activities that are detrimental to wildlife such as hunting, trapping, motor boating, and jet skiing. Management should emphasize wildlife and habitat protection over public recreational uses.
- 3809 An unnecessary wilderness designation could hinder the Refuge's efforts to achieve its conservation and habitat management objectives.
- 3810 A strong monitoring and evaluation program is the key to good refuge management. We recommend that an effort to inventory, monitor, protect, and enhance habitat for refuge species is outlined in the CCP, particularly with regards to non-native species.
- 3810 We encourage the Service to maintain its "wildlife first" philosophy and to prescribe the best and most thorough protection for all fish, wildlife and plants on the refuge.
- 3813 The Refuge contains important habitat for birds and other wildlife. One of the highest priorities in the CCP should be to recommend all suitable lands for designation as wilderness because that will provide statutory protection for the roadless wildlife habitat areas. The history of Sheldon shows that purely administrative designations are not enough to protect this outstanding wildlife habitat.
- 3813 No off-road vehicles should be allowed to travel off public roads because that would damage the wildlife habitat. We want the agencies to place protection of the habitat as the highest priority.
- 3813 The CCP should contain clear guidance for acquisition of private land in-holdings within the Refuge. These isolated parcels continue to compromise wildlife habitat values, some occupying important water sources and riparian habitat. As those lands become available for purchase, the Service should be ready to acquire them.
- 3816 The refuge should be open to fresh ideas within the context of its mandates and limitations while seeking to convey the urgency of controlling alien invasive species, including feral horses and burros, restoring the vitality and long-term stability of all wetland habitats within the refuge, and maintaining healthy, diverse, and abundant wildlife as intended by its establishing orders, and statutory mandates.
- 3817 I would like the Service to provide a reasonable assessment of current and potential carrying capacity for wildlife species to help project an average of availability as well as target population objectives for all major big game species and significant other wildlife species, such as sage grouse.
- 3817 I have a strong desire to see the Service develop a sound program that will support the preservation of the Refuge's historically significant and distinct equid populations in balance with healthy habitat and wildlife populations.

- 3818 Large water developments for California bighorn have been built in a number of sites on the Refuge only to be compromised by both burros and feral horses. Drinking these guzzlers dry or damaging the units themselves have forced NDOW and other wildlife support groups to add pipe rail fencing around each unit. Additional expenses have to be factored into these wildlife related projects in order to protect them from horse and burro use.
- 3818 Wilderness designation is not always wildlife friendly. The minimum tool analysis process is often used as a road block or wears petitioners down and most times they opt out of a good project. The time frames, associated with trying to accomplish projects in a designated wilderness, are overwhelming in most situations, regardless of what the management documents may stipulate.
- 3819 Management objectives should strive to meet the original goal of the Refuge to sustain an average long-term (15 year or longer) population of 3,500 pronghorn. The key to increasing and sustaining higher pronghorn populations appears to be perpetuating the quality and quantity of preferred, succulent, nutritious forages--especially during pregnancy and lactation. Until effective adaptive management strategies are tested with vegetation condition and trend restoration practices to increase pronghorn population to original goal levels, livestock (permitted, trespass, or feral) should not be allowed on the Refuge in order to test the original pronghorn population objective. Nor should any exotic wildlife ungulates be introduced.
- 3822 I strongly urge the FWS to continue to protect all the wilderness study areas within the refuge by managing them to protect their wilderness values and character. Managing these areas for wilderness is very compatible with advancing the Refuge's primary goals of maintaining habitat for native plants and animals and will not result in user conflicts.
- 3823 At this point, pronghorn antelope, mule deer, and bighorn sheep do not appear to have negative impacts on maintaining native species. But elk, if they migrate into the refuge, will need constraints.
- 3823 Fencing and posting the exterior boundary will be helpful to the public.
- 3823 The CCP should focus on the national place for the Refuge as a living repository of an historic ecosystem. This is one of the few sagebrush steppe areas that can be managed for their biological resources.
- 3823 The basic foundation of animal life is the density, composition, and diversity of plants. Plants, not ungulates (such as bighorn sheep, horses, and cattle) should be the focus of the CCP.
- 3823 Because sage grouse are a sensitive species, special attention to sage grouse distribution and needs is critical.
- 3823 The CCP should focus on healthy plant communities along with insects, reptiles, and birds. The plan should focus on biodiversity including greater understanding and protection for sagebrush dependent species.
- 3824 Health of the remaining aspen stands should be assessed and addressed. Aspen are a dwindling precious resource in the Great Basin.

- 3824 Work should be done to fence (wildlife friendly) the entire refuge, monitor and repair it on a timely basis.
- 3824 I have observed substantial progress in riparian health over the years since the removal of livestock from the Refuge. Continuation of this trend should be a high priority.
- 3825 We believe the CCP process is the logical place to re-evaluate the biological need and options for management of the greater Hart-Sheldon ecosystem including the BLM-managed public lands that surround and bridge the two refuges. Because the Refuges' purposes are to protect pronghorn and the ecosystem on which the species relies, it is imperative that the Service take a landscape level approach to long-range management planning for both refuges.
- 3825 We ask the Lakeview District to recognize and designate the Pronghorn Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC). This 1.1 million acre proposal included the Hart Mountain and Sheldon refuges and the vast landscape between them critical to pronghorn and other wildlife species. ONDA is also advocating in support of a Sage Grouse National Conservation Area, based on similar issues of biological connectivity as the Pronghorn ACEC proposal.
- 4114 The FWS should be held accountable for its management practices that protect game species for hunters and destroy the natural balance of our ecosystems.
- 4123 The first concern of the Service is to maintain the native features of the area.
- 4656 Natural processes should be encouraged where they still exist in the Refuge or restored where they don't.
- 4666 Natural processes should be allowed to occur on the refuge with as little interference from humans as possible.
- 4705 It seems appropriate to provide a level of protection, particularly for the species for which the Refuge was primarily created to protect.
- 4749 I do look forward to the days when wildlife was abundant and an area where one could visit and see outstanding wild animals.
- 4756 Considering the dire straits of the mule deer population within and around the Sheldon it is imperative that the refuge serve as a "breeding ground" for mule deer in hopes that the population will increase and migrate onto other lands surrounding the refuge. The Sheldon is a critical factor in bringing back our antelope, deer and bighorn populations.
- 4763 Improve the springs (fence them in to protect them).
- 4785 Please protect the streams and other water bodies from non-native species.
- 4824 NDOW will aggressively manage beaver and exempt sport fishing in Virgin Creek.
- 4861 Recreational uses in the refuge should be limited to activities related to wildlife, such as wildlife-watching, and consistent with protection of wildlife habitat.

- 4862 Please use only natural processes to maintain an healthy and function ecosystem, and do not use processes such as chaining or crushing.
- 4872 Restrict the pubic road system to routes that will not harm wildlife habitat.

## **Major Issues within the Scope of the CCP/EIS**

The USFWS received 4,874 submittals from the public during the scoping period. These submittals contained a total of 18,950 individual comments. Below is a brief summary of the type and/or range of comments received in each theme. As a note, 17,863 of the comments fit into 155 “multiple commenters” groupings that often reflect the number of comments received from various nonprofit organization action alerts. The “multiple commenters” are represented in the comment report ID column as “M.”

### **Camping**

There were 39 comments received concerning camping at the Refuge. The most common comment associated with camping was in support of moving camping areas away from springs, wetlands, and/or riparian areas in order to minimize impacts to those resources. Other common issues identified were the need for a campground host and discrete, designated campsites at the Virgin Valley Campground. In addition, several individual campground-specific improvement and management suggestions were made.

### **Cultural Resources**

There were 15 comments received concerning cultural resources at the Refuge. The most common comment acknowledges the need for identifying and protecting historic and prehistoric resources. Other comments however, expressed disagreement in that did not want tax dollars spent on cultural resource surveys and protection. Some comments support identifying a “Western Culture” theme for the Refuge and preserving the historic structures on the Refuge.

### **Development of Alternatives**

Forty two (42) comments about alternatives development were received. Most commenters expressed the need for adding lands for various outcome purposes such as linking the Hart Mountain and Sheldon complex together, acquiring in-holdings, or increasing wilderness lands. Other comments encouraged the Refuge to take a proactive stance on management strategies addressing climate change. Several ideas for alternatives development focusing on horses and burro management were offered.

### **Feral Horse and Burro Management**

The vast majority of comments in the scoping process addressed the feral horse and burro management issue. Most of these comments came from Action Alerts (web-sites setup to send prepared comment statements), but there were also numerous comments that came from individual letters, and official comments from organizations (some of these representing memberships in the thousands). The comments represent very diverse views on the horse and burro management issue.

Three distinct Action Alert items were circulated to the mailing rosters of a few activist groups such as In Defense of Animals, The Animal Welfare Institute, and For Humane Treatment of Animals. Commenters often modified the original action alert message to

emphasize their personal concerns and question the validity of proposed management (for example, many disputed the feral or non-native designation of horses and burros). In total, 17,659 individual comments pertain to this issue.

The action alerts focused on several concerns:

- Using humane, non-lethal, immunocontraception programs for population control
- Allowing the horses and burros to live free and wild at the Refuge, opposing any round-ups
- Using only the most humane gathering techniques, excluding helicopters, and using only experienced contractors who have successfully passed criminal background clearance
- Valuing the horses and burros as iconic images of the west and integral parts of the Refuge
- Implementing strategies to guarantee horses/burros are adopted to “good” homes and ensuring that they are not sent to slaughter

There were also extensive comments in support of removing feral horses and burros from the Refuge and managing them as invasive species rather than wildlife or native species. Several commenters acknowledged that horses/burros have had negative impacts to habitat while many others expressed belief that they have no or positive impacts to the habitat.

The general issues regarding feral horses/burros are listed below. The number in parentheses indicates the number of comments received in that category:

- Adoption & Other Off-refuge Treatments (78)
- Environmental Values (53)
- Gathering and Other On-refuge Treatments (13,017)
- Habitat Impacts (154)
- Horses Are Not Wildlife (13)
- Policy Related (28)
- Related to Refuge Purposes & Mission (52)
- Viewing and Historic Values (4,086)
- General Feral Horse and Burro Mgmt (178)

## **Fishing**

There were 41 comments regarding fishing management on the Refuge. Many comments support improvements to Gooch Ditch to direct flow to Big Springs. Several comments support stocking reservoirs with native fish species only. In general, there is support for maintaining a public fishing opportunity on the Refuge.

## **Horseback Riding**

Only one (1) comment regarding horseback riding was received. The comment suggests limiting vehicle access and expanding a trail system for foot and horseback access to the majority of the Refuge.

## **Hunting**

Thirty five (35) comments were received pertaining to hunting. While a few comments support closing the Refuge to hunting, the majority of comments request hunting be allowed. In addition to traditional game, some comments support a hunt for predators such as coyote and mountain lions. In addition to hunting, several comments support trapping on the Refuge.

## **Land Acquisition and In-holding Management**

There were 31 comments regarding land acquisition and in-holding management. The most common sentiment was to include a process in the CCP to acquire in-holdings from willing sellers. Access to in-holdings and mining claims is an issue for many of the owners and/or claim holders.

## **Livestock Grazing**

Thirty seven (37) comments were received regarding livestock grazing. Comments ranged from supporting livestock grazing as a means of fire fuels reduction to opposing livestock grazing all together on the Refuge. A few comments suggest an “on-call” grazing program.

## **Mining and Energy**

There were 25 comments received about mining and energy issues. Comments ranged from passionate concerns about access to, and services for, mining claims to suggestions to disallow extraction and sale of any Refuge resources.

## **Predator Management**

Seventy six (76) comments were received regarding predator management. The majority of the comments support development of a predator management program. As indicated in the hunting theme, another common comment was to allow hunting and/or trapping of predators.

## **Public Access, Roads, and Transportation**

There were 137 individual comments received regarding public access, roads, and transportation issues. Many comments expressed the need to clearly indicate open/closed roads through sign posting and/or map brochures. Several of the comments strongly disapprove of closing any existing access within the Refuge, arguing that the public should have access to enjoy wildlife viewing in the unique Sheldon habitat(s). A relatively balanced number of comments were received opposing and supporting ORV/ATV use on the refuge. Many of those in support of ORV/ATV use also acknowledge they should be limited to

designated routes. Several commenters encourage that travel management plans be made based on the needs of wildlife and not human recreation demands that might further fragment habitat.

### **Refuge Administration**

Thirty-nine (39) comments were received regarding refuge administration issues. The range of comments included a variety of thoughts, ideas and opinions on refuge management. A small group of comments expressed concern about the definition of “managing” resources; acknowledging that outcomes are not always the intended results. Others are concerned that in order to achieve effective refuge administration, additional staff resources are necessary. Several ideas for various volunteer and partnering opportunities were suggested. A handful of commenters provided suggestions for environmental education and outreach programs.

### **Threats to Refuge Resources**

There were 31 comments recorded concerning threats to Refuge resources. Nearly half of them (14) were associated with concerns about climate change and encouragement that the Refuge proactively investigate and plan for impacts associated with climate change. Another ten (10) comments were concerned with the human threat to wildlife. These comments range from suggestions to monitor human impacts on wildlife to limiting or excluding human access. Other comments offered ideas about the impacts of (and protection from) various other threats such as pesticides/herbicides, treated wood chemicals, and general water quality pollutants.

### **Visitor Services**

Twenty-eight (28) comments were received regarding visitor services. Of the nine (9) comments addressing visitor facilities, seven (7) of them advocate for dumpsters at the Virgin Valley campground, indicating that the dumpster at the rest stop is consistently overloaded. Twelve (12) comments encourage the development and use of visitor information brochures and/or maps for various purposes. Some comments suggest the use of fees to fund some of these suggestions and others such as campground host positions.

### **Wilderness Management**

The Refuge received 128 comments about wilderness management. While 44 of the comments generally support a wilderness/WSA designation, 33 of the comments are not in favor of the designation. Seventeen (17) comments addressed concerns about access to any designated wilderness/WSA for a variety of reasons: limiting handicapped population from wildlife viewing, restricting resource management, and excluding the general visitors from experiencing the unique habitat(s) of the Refuge. Nine (9) comments support a plan for acquiring in-holdings within the potential wilderness designation areas. In addition, a variety of general wilderness management comments were received ranging from suggestions to manage the potential wilderness areas as wilderness until Congress decrees them to be wilderness to more resource-specific suggestions about issues such as water rights purchases.

## Wildlife/Habitat Management

The Refuge received 344 comments regarding wildlife and/or habitat management with a consistent desire for wildlife protection. The issues were categorized into several groups:

- Fencing (14) – ranging from removal of obsolete fencing to construction of a new boundary fence and the materials and designs that should/should not be used
- Fire ecology and management (29) – a range of comments indicating that wilderness designations will limit access for fire management, horses and livestock grazing can be a fire suppression tool, and opposition to prescribed burns; several comments about species-specific needs pertaining to fire regimes
- Invasive and/or non-native species management (32) – many comments support the monitoring, suppression, and/or removal of various invasive plant and animal species; several comments suggest that discussion of horses and burros as invasive species is appropriate; several comments reflect concern specifically about cheat grass spread
- Native species management (46) – multiple comments advocate that the Refuge be managed for antelope as originally intended and many others express concern for the impact the feral horses/burros and predators are having on native species and/or their habitat; many comments recommend species-specific management approaches for pronghorn antelope, big horn sheep, greater sage grouse, Alvord and Lahontan cutthroat trout, and mule deer
- Research (23) – comments suggest a variety of research subjects and monitoring opportunities within the Refuge as well as inventories of various resources
- Riparian and/or upland restoration (52) – several comments advocate for development of a restoration program while a few suggest natural processes be allowed to restore damaged areas; a couple of comments specifically encourage a restoration program that leads to “hands off” management and others recommend evaluating the need for restoration in any of the proposed wilderness areas; several specific restoration project ideas were offered (juniper control, horse-damaged area restoration, Dufferrena Ponds, fence projects, water project removal, and others)
- Wildlife and/or habitat protection (95) – comments ranged from generic sentiments to protect the animals to specific suggestions to eliminate sage grouse lek disturbance including for the sake of research; several comments support development of aggressive species-specific habitat management plans; some comments suggest predators may be negatively affecting the health of non-predator native wildlife populations; several comments support and advocate for the renewed implementation of a “wildlife first” philosophy and policy
- General wildlife and/or habitat management (53) – several comments advocate that natural processes be allowed to occur without human interference; several also advocate for the Refuge to be managed for the sake of native wildlife; a wide variety of general comments associated with wildlife and or habitat protection range from requesting no animals be killed on the Refuge to general statements that public lands are not being managed properly; several suggestions for specific management practices or models were offered

## **Issues Outside of the Scope of the CCP/EIS**

In addition to the thousands of Refuge related comments, several comments were received that pertain to issues off of the Refuge such as management of lands under the jurisdiction of other Federal or state agencies.
