Trustee Council Announces Publication of Final Portland Harbor Supplemental Restoration Plan and Environmental Assessment

Today the Trustee Council published a Final Supplemental Restoration Plan and Environmental Assessment (SRP). Of the alternatives evaluated in the SRP, the Trustee Council has selected the Restoration Bank Credit Alternative for this phase of restoration.

- Alder Creek Restoration Project
- Harborton Habitat Development Project
- Linnton Mill Restoration Site
- Miller Creek Restoration Project
- Rinearson Natural Area

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What is a Restoration Bank?

Restoration banks are generally large-scale ecological restoration projects developed with the intent of generating restoration credits, often for sale.

Because they are not necessarily scaled to address just one PRP's liability, restoration banks can be bigger projects where many different habitat types are restored. These larger and more diverse projects can be more economical and sustainable.

The Portland Harbor Natural Resource Trustee Council is responsible for restoring natural resources that have been impacted by contamination in the Portland Harbor Superfund site. The purpose of this newsletter is to share information about the Trustee Council's work with those who are interested in our assessment and restoration efforts.

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
