In December 2016, the summit, Prescribed Fire Summit 2016: Changing Fire Regimes, was hosted in Manhattan, Kansas. The summit was a collaboration of Kansas Grazing Lands Coalition, South Central Climate Science Center, Joint Fire Science Program, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, Oklahoma State Extension, Kansas State Extension, Natural Resources Conservation Service, and the Great Plains Fire Science Exchange.

The event included a plenary session, breakout sessions, and a tour of the Konza Prairie (Appendix A- Summit Agenda). With over 182 attendees and speakers, a total of 8 states were represented (California, Georgia, Indiana, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Texas) at the summit.

SUMMIT OUTCOMES

The *Prescribed Fire Summit 2016* successfully brought together various stakeholder groups to learn, share, and discuss current fire science and management. Research and extension specialists from four of the participating universities (Oklahoma State University, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Kansas State University, and University of Nebraska) collaborated to produce two publications following the summit:

Prescribed Burn Equipment

Cut and Stuff Practices for Enhanced Cedar Control with Prescribed Fires
