

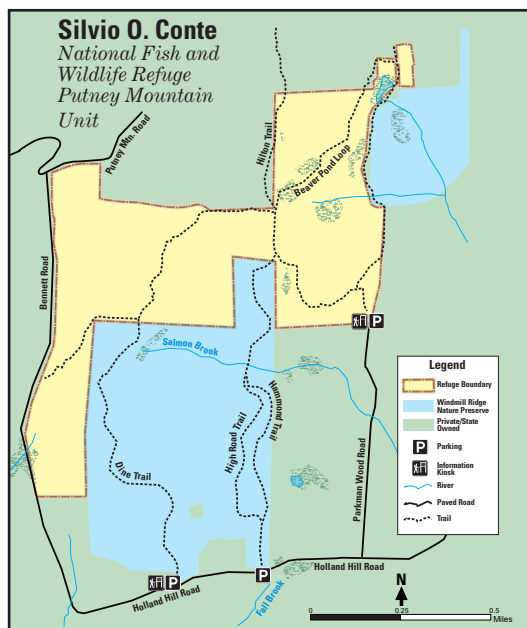
Come visit

The Putney Mountain unit is located in Putney and Brookline, Vermont. It lies about 20 miles north of the Massachusetts border and 5 miles west of the Connecticut River. It was acquired to protect the federally endangered Northeastern bulrush. The landscape is a northern hardwood forest, consisting mostly of American beech, sugar maple, and yellow birch. Animals that may be found in this habitat include white-tailed deer, black bear, beaver, wood duck, wild turkey, and many species of forest-nesting songbirds.

The division is open to the public year round for wildlife observation, photography, environmental education, and interpretation. Putney Mountain is open from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset. This unit is popular for bird watching, particularly during the summer nesting season.

Directions to the Putney Mountain Unit

Take Exit 4 on I-91 towards Putney, VT
Turn onto Route 5 North (Main St.): 0.5 miles
Turn left onto Kimball Hill Road: 0.3 miles
Continue onto Westminster West Road: 0.8 miles
Turn left onto West Hill Road: 2.4 miles
Turn right onto Putney Mountain Road: 200'
Turn left onto Holland Hill Road: 0.9 miles
Holland Hill Road turns right and becomes Joy Road: 250'
Turn left onto Holland Hill Road: 0.9 miles
Turn Right onto Parkman Wood Road: 0.7 miles
Park at the Putney Mountain Unit parking area



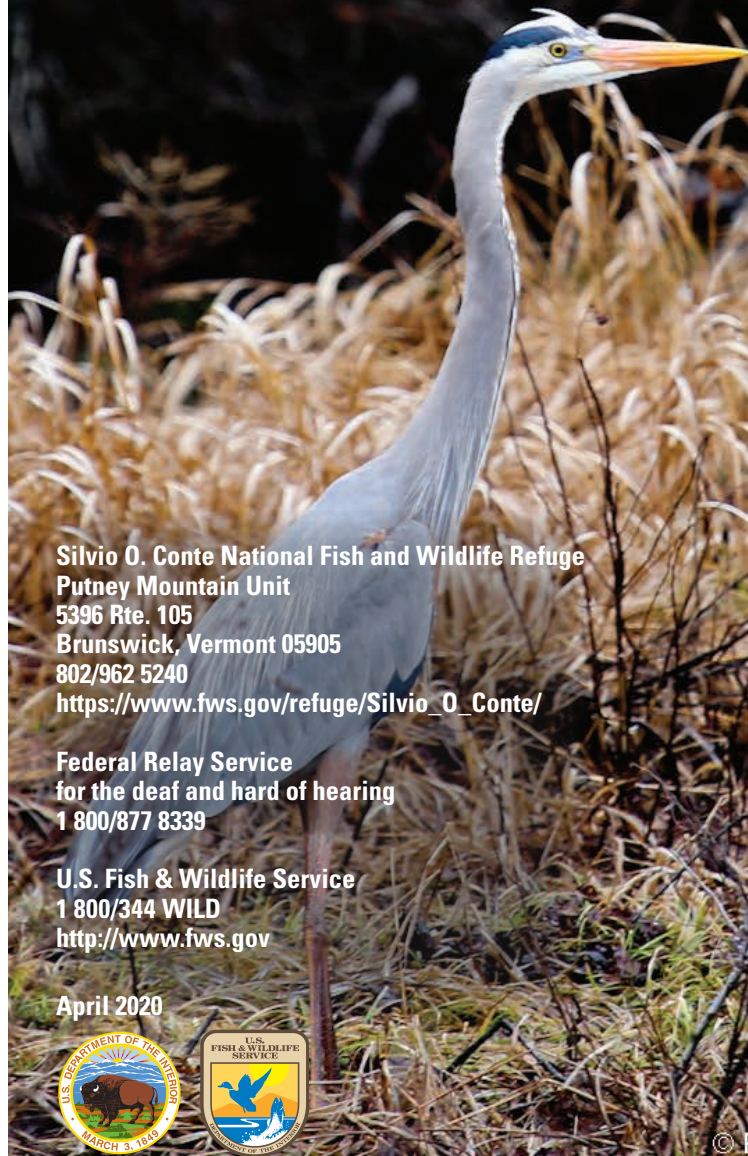
