Narrow sword-shaped leaves, covered with dense, silky, silvery gray hairs. 	 Endemic to the island of Hawai'i. Historically occurred from the southwest rift to the northeast slope of Mauna Loa. Currently, three populations with more than 60 wild individuals at Kapāpala, Kahuku, and Upper Waiākea. Reintroduction efforts established 690+ plants with natural recruitment occurring.
Kinolau (Body Form)	'Ano Like (Similarities)
 'Āhinahina are one of the kinolau or physical manifestations of Poli'ahu. Poli'ahu is the beautiful snow goddess of Mauna Kea, Mauna Loa, and Haleakalā; the three places 'āhinahina species occur. 'Āhinahina were once so common, that they appeared to look like blankets of snow covering the mauna (mountains). 	 'Āhinahina and hinahina mean "gray".² Gray is the official color³ of Kaho'olawe; its flower⁴ is the hinahina kū kahakai (<i>Heliotropium anomalum</i> var. <i>argenteum</i>). Other native plants that are "hinahina": 'Ewa hinahina (<i>Achyranthes splendens</i> var. <i>rotundata</i>); Pōhinahina (<i>Vitex rotundifolia</i>); 'Āhinahina—the Mauna Kea and Haleakalā silversword species.
