The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will be filling two positions through the Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) program. Applicants are not eligible if they turn 19 prior to the end date in early August and must be 15 by the starting date in early June. Projects include but are not limited to:

- Nature Trail Construction and Maintenance
- Building, Signage, and Grounds Maintenance
- Wildlife monitoring
- Weed Control
- Environmental Education and visitor services

YCC members will learn about the different jobs in the Fish and Wildlife Service and the conservation of natural resources.
