We do respect the Nation's wish to nurture the spirit of a sanctuary within this gorge as well, and hope to assist in making this happen.

It hasn't always been such a pristine area as there used to be a former gun club, a road and bridges that led to the base of the falls from Tully Farms Road, then of course, the salt mines. But nature, in her infinite ability to forgive and resuscitate, has given us a chance to do this right - to set up guidelines and signage that can convey the respectful use of this pretty gorge.

Many know what a beautiful place it is. We (Onondaga Nation included) discovered an access that would not be near any homes with viable off street parking. And it would be a quiet, peaceful trail that meanders through an open woods (a former road actually).

And a trail would limit access to one entry point. I have experienced former access points that are overgrown, yet passable if you're determined. Some are not safe. And some back up to homes on Hidden Falls Road. One known trail would eliminate others from venturing where they should not be. Having no access will not keep others from venturing in, and patrolling could be a challenge. A trail with moderate use will be self patrolled and along with trail maintenance, could be part of a collaborative initiative?

As a community we would very much like to work with the Onondaga Nation to create a trail together to be shared by all, and respect and nurture the land surrounding it.

- Comment 2: The discussion of the Ninemile Creek and Hudson Farms Fishing Access Project (Project 16) should indicate that the parking lot at the Hudson Farms property will be transferred to New York State as a fishing access lot, rather than being transferred to The Wetland Trust. Honeywell will be transferring to The Wetland Trust the remainder of the Hudson Farms property *other* than the parking lot area. Honeywell looks forward to completing discussions with the involved stakeholders to effect these transfers.

Hopefully this letter is arriving at the proper email location. My name is John Bishop and I live adjacent to the 1023 acres of land currently owned by Honeywell Corp. located in Tully Valley, Tully NY. This letter is concerning the transfer of this land to the Onondaga Nation for their care. I am a lifelong neighbor to this property, growing up here in the early 60's with very fond memories of the Fellows Falls area which is directly downstream from my property at 915 Woodmancy Rd. here in Tully. My family members and ancestors have long had close ties to this beautiful location as the Woodmansee's, Burroughs and Bishop's were all early settlers of this area coming from New England in the very early 1800's and settling in spots above the Falls. All three names are from my direct family tree. I began hiking these waterways before the age of ten and remember fondly the visits to the base of Fellows Falls when the Tully Rod and Gun club still existed and had a pavillion located near the base of the falls. The American Legion held steak roasts there too if I remember correctly. In those days the access roads were well maintained by Allied Chemical and you could drive a school bus to a parking area just below the waterfall which Tully School did on occassion for science class trips. One of my first cub scout hikes was with the scouts to the falls. I had a few relatives that were employed by Allied, and family reunions always meant a trip down to the brine reservoir to get brine for cooking salt potatoes. My last trip driving to the Falls was back in the late 70's or early 80's driving a firetruck there as the pavillion had caught fire.

One of my dreams for the last 50 plus years is that someday there would again be some public access to the area as it is just so beautiful. I have met numerous times with both Joe Heath, his wife, and some of the leaders of the Nation to help guide them on ways to access the Falls areas. I understand the concerns of privacy that some of my neighbors have so I most recently offered a hike that puts the parking are away from the Hidden Falls development, at a location of the now abandoned Allied road leading to Tully Farms rd. off Woodmancy Rd. There are a series of old logging roads that follow a gentle grade down to the lower falls area. Hopefully, this could be a solution that works for all.I am always open for sharing more of my memories and historic knowledge of the area.

The Onondaga Environmental Institute (OEI) appreciates the USFWS allowing public comment on the *Draft Natural Resource Damage Assessment Restoration Plan and Environmental Assessment Addendum for Onondaga Lake, in Syracuse, NY.* OEI is submitting this letter in support of the revisions made to Project 10 in Section 2.2.2. of the Addendum, "Tully Recreational Area and Nature Preserve Project".

The return of more than 1000 acres of land to the Onondaga Nation in the upper Onondaga Creek watershed is an important and momentous step in reclamation of their ancestral lands. OEI has been studying the upper Onondaga Creek watershed for over two decades and has long recognized the ecological significance of this area, containing pristine streams and ecologically valuable species, such as brook trout. The recovery of this land (referred to as "the Preserve" in the Addendum) to the Onondaga Nation, who are profoundly linked to this watershed, would not only revitalize their cultural, spiritual, and ecological connections to this land, but it would ensure the stewardship and protection of this area in perpetuity. As part of the recovery of the Preserve, OEI strongly supports the Nation's development of a Healing and Caretaking Plan (HCP). We feel that such a plan is vital to better understanding the natural resources in the Preserve and developing the strategies that will best heal and protect the area; all within the lenses of Traditional Ecological Knowledge and long-term stewardship. Without first completing the HCP, uninformed plans for public access and recreation could have irreparable damage to the natural resources in the Preserve, and thus, ultimately harm meaningful, quality engagement for the public. This would be inherently incompatible with the primary conservation, restoration, and stewardship goals of the establishment of the Preserve. OEI would advocate for the funds no longer being used for the construction of parking lots (as detailed in the Addendum) be reallocated for completing the HCP and supporting the necessary research, conservation, restoration, and education / outreach projects that would benefit the Preserve, the Onondaga Nation, and the broader public.

Dear Ms. Roe,

Onondaga County, Honeywell, and the other responsible parties that have combined to injure Onondaga Lake, Onondaga Creek, and the surrounding land with its massive amounts of unchecked deposits of toxic industrial waste, and pollutants at levels never seen before, should be made to focus reparations to primarily benefit the Onondaga Nation. The Onondaga Nation has been most harmed by the long and shameful history of willful destruction of their territory, and the neglect of their religious, cultural, and historic connections to this area. I support any effort to heal the injuries to the Onondaga Nation, and to hold those responsible to their obligations to correct, whenever possible, their destructive legacy.

I have personally worked for over fifteen years as an advocate for the return of clean Onondaga Lake shoreline to the Onondaga Nation. This advocacy began during County Executive Pirro's administration. It was then that our efforts targeted a small parcel of undeveloped Onondaga Lake shoreline as a potential candidate for Onondaga County to return to the Onondaga Nation. The parcel, Murphy's Island, was a badly polluted, but still undeveloped site that, if cleaned, would become a valuable parcel to return. I garnered the support of others who also believed in this just cause and gained media attention when the County Executive floated the concept of giving the parcel to a nearby mall developer, an outcome we successfully blocked. Soon after, a new County Executive, Joanie Mahoney was elected. She pledged support for our cause but did nothing to effectuate the parcel transfer. It was the Onondaga County Legislature that passed the Memorializing Resolution 452 to return a parcel of Onondaga Lake shoreline to the Onondaga Nation, and directed CE Mahoney to take all necessary steps to see to the transfer. Again, there was no action, and in fact, CE Mahoney personally urged the legislature to reverse their support of returning land because she understood the cost to clean Murphy's Island was more than what the responsible parties were willing to spend. However, the legislature recognized their commitment

and passed a subsequent resolution committing them to find another Onondaga Lake shoreline parcel to return in place of Murphy's Island. This history culminated with the promise by County Executive J. Ryan McMahon to return Maple Bay, a clean parcel of Onondaga Lake shoreline. CE McMahon met on multiple occasions with me, and with members of the Onondaga Nation, and their counsel to lay out the necessary legal steps to fulfill the county's long overdue promise. We are still waiting for this to happen.

I encourage the Onondaga Lake NDAR Trustees to engage with us to return Maple Bay to the Onondaga Nation.

Point 10 of the recent Draft Onondaga Lake NRDAR Addendum, the "TULLY RECREATIONAL AREA AND NATURE PRESERVE PROJECT Creation of Approximately 1,023 Acres of Nature Preserve and Natural Resource Restoration Area; Install Streambank Enhancements; Establish Opportunities for Compatible Cultural, Educational, and Recreational Public Use" is wholly in keeping with our efforts. It is a very good step. The same approach should be taken at Maple Bay so that this parcel can be returned to its rightful owners.
