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U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Extends Public Comment Period on the Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement and Revised Habitat Conservation Plan for the Nebraska Public Power District's R-Project Transmission Line

DENVER – The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) is announcing a 30-day public comment period extension for the R-Project Transmission Line Draft Revised Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) and revised draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS). This is associated with Nebraska Public Power District's permit application for the incidental take of the American burying beetle (*Nicrophorus americanus*). The initial public comment period began on February 9, 2024, with an end date of April 9, 2024. **The new end date to provide comments is now May 9, 2024, at 11:59 p.m. (ET).**

During the public comment period, the Service is seeking feedback on the effect on the human environment of the potential action, including the issuance of a permit authorizing incidental take of a covered species in association with covered activities, and revised HCP implementation. The Service is extending the public comment period in response to requests from the public for more time to review and comment on information following public meetings. Input received during the public comment period will be incorporated into the final SEIS.

Background

The Nebraska Public Power District is proposing a 226-mile long, 345-kilovolt transmission line that would cross portions of the sandhills in north-central Nebraska. The R-Project starts at the Gerald Gentleman Substation near Sutherland, Neb.; goes north to a substation located in Thomas County near Thedford; then extends east to another substation in Holt County, where it will connect to the Western Area Power Administration's existing Fort Thompson to Grand Island line located on the eastern border of Holt County.

The activities involved during the construction, operation and maintenance of the transmission line may result in take of the federally threatened American burying beetle, and therefore the Nebraska Public Power District applied for an incidental take permit under the Endangered Species Act. The permit previously issued by the Service in 2019 was remanded by the U.S. District Court in 2020, and the Nebraska Public Power District has prepared a revised HCP in support of its new application for an incidental take permit.

The Nebraska Public Power District worked with the Service to incorporate new information obtained since the court's 2020 remand of the previously issued permit. The draft SEIS evaluates impacts related to the proposed issuance of the incidental take permit and the associated revised HCP implementation, including a risk evaluation for whooping cranes, potential impacts on cultural and historic resources, and potential effects from renewable energy projects related to the R-Project.

The Service hosted two in-person meetings in February 2024 and one virtual public meeting in March 2024. Input received during the public comment period will be incorporated into the final supplemental environmental impact statement. No additional public meetings will be held during this public comment period extension.
