Thanks for the discussion this morning. I appreciate the time and you sharing the tribal concerns regarding the state's reintroduction and uncertainty of management options under a 10j rule. Attached are all three Northern Rocky Mountain DPS (NRM) rules if you are interested in reviewing them and seeing the evolution of take from the original reintroduction through recovery of the NRM population.

The document titled "NRM_10j vs Endangered Mgmt" breaks down the provisions of the NRM 10j rule scenarios and shows the types of take that were authorized under previous wolf reintroduction rules. Scott Becker, the regional wolf coordinator, is very knowledgeable regarding these rules, tribal management plans for wolves, and is available to walk through the information with you and your staff.

As I mentioned this morning, I am out of the office September 6 - 21, so let Scott or Kurt Broderdorp know if there is any follow up from the Ute Mountain Ute and Southern Ute meeting in September and if tribal leadership want to schedule a meeting with the Service while I'm out. Thank you.
