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Tribal Comment Summaries related to the Proposed Colorado 10(j) Rule

Southern Ute

- Letter refers to all land under Southern Ute Tribal jurisdiction including reservation land and the Brunot Area.
- Supportive of the proposed 10(j) rule for the following reasons:
 - Allows for take “in the act of attacking” livestock without prior authorization
 - “in the act of attacking” allows for the taking of a wolf in defense of a pet dog
 - Definition of livestock includes bison, pigs, mules, and alpacas
 - Reporting requirements allow for 7 days to report opportunistic or intentional harassment.
- Concerns include negative impacts to:
 - Big game hunting
- Requests:
 - Take be allowable for unacceptable impacts to ungulate populations.
 - FWS removal of problem wolves from Tribal lands upon request.
 - FWS should have ultimate authority over the initial release of gray wolves
 - Release sites should include a maximum buffer from tribal interests.
 - Limit release sites to areas north of Interstate 70 to prevent potential interactions with Mexican wolves.
 - 10(j) boundary should extend beyond Colorado to provide management flexibility to Tribes in neighboring States.

Navajo

- Letter refers to all Navajo Nation lands including Tribal Trust lands and satellite area in Colorado (Wolf Spring Ranch).
- Concerns include negative impacts to:
 - Big game hunting
 - Herding cattle and sheep
 - Traditional Navajo lifestyle
 - Public Safety
- Requests:
 - Creation of a Colorado Wolf Management Group (including CPW, impacted Tribes, and other impacted stakeholders) to improve communication related to the reintroduction and management of wolves in Colorado.
 - GPS collaring of 100% of wolves to allow for identification and removal of wolves which cross onto Navajo land.
 - Removal of all wolves that cross onto Navajo land at no charge to the Tribe.
