Wildlife Services lead our Nation's efforts to manage these problems. Our programs and research find innovative solutions that protect people, agriculture, and wildlife so all of us can coexist.

APHIS' Wildlife Services leads our Nation's efforts to manage conflicts between people and wildlife so they can coexist.

Wildlife are one of America's most valued public resources. Yet in the dynamic landscape we share, wildlife-related problems — livestock predation, crop losses, property damage, disease threats, and more — are common. We work nationwide to help solve these problems while considering a wide range of public interests.



The four main goals of Wildlife Services are to:

- 1. Provide wildlife services, protecting agriculture, wildlife and other natural resources, property, and human health and safety.
- 2. Develop effective methods and strategies with technology that is biologically, environmentally, and socially sound.
- Value and invest in people with an organizational culture that promotes innovation as Federal leaders of wildlife management.
- Inform and communicate. Collect and analyze internal and external communication to build an understanding of the Federal
 role in these efforts.

Federal Statutory Authority

7 U.S. Code § 8351

Predatory and other wild animals

(Formerly known as the The Animal Damage Control Act of March 2, 1931)

"The Secretary of Agriculture may conduct a program of wildlife services with respect to injurious animal species and take any action the Secretary considers necessary in conducting the program. The Secretary shall administer the program in a manner consistent with all of the wildlife services authorities in effect on the day before October 28, 2000."

- " Provides broad authority for the Wildlife Services program.
- The word "may" imply an authorization, not a mandate.
- The authority does not specify a regulatory function.

Federal Statutory Authority

7 U.S. Code § 8352

Authorization of expenditures for the eradication and control of predatory and other wild animals

"The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to make such expenditures for equipment, supplies, and materials, including the employment of persons and means in the District of Columbia and elsewhere, and to employ such means as may be necessary to execute the functions imposed upon him by section 8351 of this title."

Provides authority to expend appropriated funds to deliver the Wildlife Services program.



Federal Statutory Authority

7 U.S. Code § 8353

Control of nuisance mammals and birds and those constituting reservoirs of zoonotic diseases; exception

"On and after December 22, 1987, the Secretary of Agriculture is authorized, except for urban rodent control, to conduct activities and to enter into agreements with States, local jurisdictions, individuals, and public and private agencies, organizations, and institutions in the control of nuisance mammals and birds and those mammal and bird species that are reservoirs for zoonotic diseases, and to deposit any money collected under any such agreement into the appropriation accounts that incur the costs to be available immediately and to remain available until expended for Animal Damage Control activities."

- Provides authority to enter into agreements with public and private entities to control nuisance wildlife, except urban rodent control.
- Provides authority to control wildlife that serve as reservoirs for zoonotic diseases. (i.e. Avian Influenza surveillance program)







- Small and large-scale resources protection work
- Avian and mammalian conflict species
- IWDM lethal and nonlethal methodologies
- Public and private lands
- Resources protection work can be proactive or responsive, or both

Costs and Timelines

- Costs will vary based on scope and locality
- Utilize Interagency Agreements (IA) and Cooperative Service Agreements (CSA)
- 100% full cost recovery
 - WS does not receive Congressional appropriated funding for T&E species protection
 - Federal appropriations law cannot augment funding of other federal agencies (DOI, DOD, etc.)
- Approx. \$150K-\$175K for a wildlife biologist FTE, slightly less for technicians
- Start up costs for capital assets



Regulatory Hurdles - NEPA

- Existing NEPA related to WDM for desert tortoise protection:
 - USFWS Reduce Common Raven Predation on the Desert Tortoise EA and FONSI (2008)
 - WS-Nevada Predator Damage Management EA and FONSI (2020)
 - USFWS Issuing Permits for Common Ravens in Nevada EA and FONSI (2024)
 - WS-California Wildlife Damage
 Management EIS and ROD (2024)
- If expanded flyway/population level raven management is desired, additional NEPA may be required
- Possible additional Section 7 compliance required

Challenges – Staffing

- WS programs do not currently have staff stationed in the areas of interest in NV and CA
- Will need facilities to house staff and equipment
- Funding will be needed to establish positions
- Providing "on call" services will be challenging



Challenges – State regulations

- California statutes and regulations make WDM more challenging
 - Species-specific differences
 - Methodology limitations
 - Pesticide notification requirements
 - Firearm ammunition restrictions
- WS-California has figured out ways to comply with state regulations while delivering effective WDM services
- There are cost differences for services due to these regulatory restrictions
