In 2022, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service established a new policy for awarding Cooperative Agricultural Agreements (CAAs). The new policy requires an open and competitive process for awarding CAAs.

In you are interested in applying for a CAA (grazing permit), you must return application(s) to Upper Souris NWR/WMD office by April 14, 2025. A separate application is required for each unit. Cooperators will be selected based on answers provided within the application. Applicants who receive the highest score for a particular unit will be awarded a Special Use Permit (SUP). Please be advised, falsifying information on the ranking application will result in forfeiture of the application.

SUPs will be valid for a period of up to 5 years without competition. Grazing rates and timing will be determined annually, although there may not be grazing allowed every year. Grazing rates and deductions will be determined similar to previous years, i.e. deductions are given for temporary fencing, boundary fence repair, spraying noxious weeds, etc.

All applications must be returned to Upper Souris NWR/WMD by **April 14, 2025**, to be considered. Mail applications to 17705 212<sup>th</sup> Ave NW, Foxholm, ND 58718 or email them to katherine\_figaro@fws.gov. Cooperators will be selected and notified by **April 21, 2025**.

#### **Fees**

Fees for grazing will be adjusted annually, based on the average grazing fee rates published in the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) annual publication of Agricultural Prices. If the district unit is below the base rate for grazing, we will increase the yearly fee by \$1.00/Animal Unit Month (AUM) per year until the base rate is reached. Once the USDA base rate is reached, the rate will then be based on the USDA's annual rate reported. If the base rate goes below the current rate, the reduced rate will be matched.

J. Clark Salyer WMD has adopted the definition of an AU and AUM referenced in the "Study of Fees for Grazing Livestock on Federal lands, A Report from The Secretary of the Interior and The Secretary of Agriculture, dated October 21, 1977." An AU, as defined by the Society for Range Management, is "…one cow of about 1,000 pounds. Thus, one cow on the range for 1 month is an AUM. If livestock other than cattle are used for grazing, or different aged calves or bulls are grazed, the following conversion factors will be used to calculate grazing fees.

Class of animal	Factor
Yearling (9-18 months)	0.70
Weaner Calf	0.50
Cow	1.00
Cow/Calf Pair	1.20
Bull	1.50
Mature Sheep or goat	0.20
Ewe w/lamb or nanny w/kid	0.30
Horse or mule	1.20
Bison	1.00

#### **Cost-sharing and deductions**

Materials for habitat improvement (such as fence maintenance/construction or herbicides may be provided by J. Clark Salyer WMD. Alternatively, the cost of materials may be reimbursed to the cooperator through deductions in grazing fees. Receipts must be provided at years end to request

deductions for materials. Materials provided by USFWS is the preferred method for improvements on refuge lands.

Approved standard deductions are as follows:

**New Construction (3 Strand)	\$0.70/FT	X	Feet
**New Construction (4 Strand)	\$0.80/FT	X	Feet
***Old Barbed Wire Fence Removal	\$0.20/FT	X	Feet

<sup>\*</sup>Barbed Wire fencing materials will be supplied by the WMD for fence construction and repairs (Barbed Wire, Wire Clips, Steel T Posts and Wood Posts).

#### Electric Fence

Install & Remove (District Materials)	\$0.05/FT X Feet
Install & Remove (Cooperator Materials)	\$0.07/FT X Feet
Water Gap Fencing	\$0.30/FT X Feet
Water Hauling	\$15/Day # of Days Water Hauled
Livestock Moves	\$25/Move # of Livestock Moves

Other deductions may be approved by the District Manager dependent on unit work needs.

#### **Other Considerations**

Occasionally there are conditions which may impact timelines and/or operations. These may include, but are not limited to drought, prescribed fire, wildfire, habitat conditions (such as flooding or poor vegetation production), other habitat management actions, or unforeseeable emergencies which may require modifications to stocking rates, grazing rotations, or timelines for starting and/or removing cattle. These considerations should be communicated between both parties wherever possible and in the most expedient manner possible.

#### **Selection criteria**

The Selection Committee will evaluate proposals based on a competitive ranking using the following criteria (listed in no specific order):

- 1. Operational capacity and qualifications.
- 2. Proximity of operations
- 3. Experience with USFWS grazing operations on National Wildlife Refuges or Waterfowl Production areas, or other public conservation lands.
- 4. Understanding of grazing management practices focused on conservation.

<sup>\*\*</sup>New Fence Construction prices vary dependent on terrain. The prices will be higher on rough and/or rolling topography.

<sup>\*\*\*</sup>Old Fence Removal prices vary dependent on terrain and old fence condition.

5. Past Performance under USFWS cooperative agreements.

#### **Ranking Criteria**

Answer the following questions. Yes answers are worth 5 points, No answers are worth 0 points. The applicant with the most points will be awarded the permit. In the case of a tie, a random drawing between the highest scoring applicants will be conducted and a permittee selected. To be eligible for a Grazing Permit the Cooperator must be: 1) be at least 18 years of age; 2) a current livestock operator with a herd of at least 20 livestock.
