Birds



Rappahannock River Valley National Wildlife Refuge was established in 1996, with a goal of protecting 20,000 acres along a 65-mile stretch of the lower Rappahannock River. As of June 2007, the refuge consisted of 17 tracts, distributed on both sides of the river, totaling 7,711 acres. This total includes 1,359 acres in conservation easements.

Hardwood and pine forests, steep shady ravines, forested swamps, tidal marshes, wet meadows, ponds, and grasslands make up the diverse habitats which have attracted about 208 species of birds. An additional 22 species are listed as rare, accidental, or infrequent occurrences.

Focus species or suites include bald eagles, waterfowl, forest interior birds, grassland birds, shrub/early succession species, and marshbirds. Several refuge tracts lie within one of the most important concentration areas for bald eagles in the Chesapeake Bay region. Winter counts recorded a peak of nearly 400 eagles. Barn owls also nest in the high cliffs of this area. Three of the refuge tracts are destinations on the Virginia Birding and Wildlife Trail. The Lower Rappahannock Important Bird Area, designated on the basis of the bald eagles, barn owls, Virginia's only population of the coastal plain swamp sparrow, and other birds of conservation concern, includes 8 refuge tracts.

The Wilna tract, open to the public year round from sunrise to sunset, offers a great diversity of bird watching opportunities throughout the year.

In spring and summer, grassland and shrub birds include grasshopper sparrow, eastern meadowlark. dickcissel, eastern kingbird, vellowbreasted chat, indigo bunting, blue grosbeak, prairie warbler, eastern towhee, American woodcock, bobwhite quail, wild turkey, American kestrel, and perhaps a barn owl. In the forested trails near Wilna Pond, look or listen for scarlet tanager, summer tanager, orchard oriole, northern parula, prothonotary warbler, Louisiana waterthrush, yellowthroated warbler, Kentucky warbler, vellow-throated vireo, and red-tailed and red-shouldered hawks. Check the pond too for wood duck, red-winged blackbird, green heron, and great blue heron. The shallow end contains many snags—there you might find pileated and red-headed woodpeckers any time of the year. Also in the spring or summer walk along the deep forest trail to find black and white warbler, hooded warbler, wood thrush, ovenbird, Acadian flycatcher, and maybe a Chuck-will's-widow, great horned or barred owl.

During spring migration, these same forests are also stopovers for beautiful long distance migrants such as: magnolia warbler; blue-winged warbler; American redstart; black throated blue and black-throated green warblers; yellow warbler; Blackburnian warbler; mourning warbler; warbling vireo and blueheaded warbler; veery; and Swainson's thrush. Check the grasslands too for bobolinks dancing across the tops of the grasses.

In winter, the river and its tributaries teem with waterfowl. The sounds of geese and swans can be heard from miles away. Many grassland species winter here: northern harrier; Cooper's hawk; sharp-shinned hawk; savannah sparrow; swamp sparrow; horned lark; American pipit; darkeyed junco and white-throated sparrow. In the flocks of mixed blackbirds, you might spot a few rusty blackbirds. Return to the forest trails to see if you can find kinglets, brown creeper, and winter wren amidst all the robins and scores of grackles.
