Good afternoon,

Enclosed you will find an import permit application for an elephant trophy from Namibia for Mr. David Scott Madden. Mr. Madden hunted in Bwabwata West National Park with operator Hunt Africa Namibia and Professional Hunter, Jacobus H. Pienaar.

Bwabwata National Park is a protected area in northeastern Namibia that was established by merging Caprivi Game Park and Mahango Game Reserve. It is situated in the Zambezi and Kavango East regions, extending along the Caprivi Strip. It is bounded by the Okavango River to the west and the Kwando River to the east. Angola lies to the north and Botswana to the south. The area is an important migration route from Botswana to Angola for African elephant. In the new National Elephant Conservation and Management plan for Namibia, attached, it states that the removal of the southern boundary fence of Bwabwata National Park has been negotiated with Botswana to provide more ease of movement along the elephant corridors and to maintain and manage KAZA's (Kavango Zambezi Trans frontier Conservation Area) elephants as one contiguous population. In the West region of the park, where this hunt took place, the operator estimates that there are about 2,500 elephants. Bwabwata is an unusual, protected area as about 5,500 people live in the park. The Namibian government involves park residents and neighbors in planning and managing the park.

We have attached the management plan for Bwabwata National Park put out by the Ministry of Environment and Tourism and the Republic of Namibia. In it you will find that the park is effectively managed together with the other North-East Parks (Khaudum, Nkasa Rupara, Mangetti, and Mudumu National Park) to ensure the conservation of important habitats, to safeguard corridors for regional wildlife migration; to provide engines for economic growth in poor rural areas; and to provide access to natural areas for local, regional, and international visitors. As mentioned above, there are thousands of residents that live in the park and through proper management humans and wildlife are now living in a "status quo that offers tremendous benefits to both conservation and rural community development."

In the document "It's not too good to be true – Elephants are thriving in Namibia" (attached) written as a response to the IUCN classification of the African Savannah elephant as "endangered", it states that "in Namibia, elephant numbers are increasing and their range is expanding, a testament to sound long-term conservation policies." Namibia's Ministry of Environment and Tourism (MEFT) has been conducting aerial transect surveys of its elephant populations since 1979. With highly experienced observers and many repeat surveys, it has been possible to predict population trends over time. It has been calculated that the Namibian elephant population has an annual growth rate of 5.36%. "This is biologically realistic, as elephant population growth rates can be as high as 7% under ideal conditions that are rarely met by free-ranging elephants."

As the population of elephants have grown so have the communities of people in Namibia. Managing the human-wildlife relations has been a major success for them. In the document, "The State of Community Conservation in Namibia", the Forward written by the Minister of Environment and Tourism for Namibia, Pohamba Shifeta, states "the sustainability of the conservancy movement hinges on its success and on five critical issues: benefits to communities, good governance and financial management, conservation hunting, wildlife crime, and drought related to climate change." He goes on to state that Conservation hunting is "essential to the economic survival of many communal conservancies." Bwabwata West National Park is home to the Omega village numbering about 1,000 people. In the operator enhancement report provided Hunt Africa Namibia, it details how they contribute money and goods to the Omega people and are contractually obligated to donate 2.5 million Namibian dollars to the local community yearly. As well, they provide game meat totaling about 45 tons a year. The conservation hunting model that Namibia has adopted has proven successful for both wildlife and the communities.

In addition, we have attached the new Elephant Conservation and Management Plan for Namibia, where it reiterates that "Namibia's elephant population is increasing, and elephant distributions ranges are expanding. (1)" Chapter 7 details at length how Conservation hunting is managed and necessary for the survival of the species. Hunting quotas are monitored and strictly maintained and have allowed for the growth of the elephant population.

Please refer to the documents provided along with the numerous documents and responses previously submitted to the FWS by Conservation Force, Professional Hunters, Operators and Professional Hunting Organizations, as well as information submitted by the government authorities of Namibia in making a positive enhancement determination for this import.

Enclosed please find the attached permit application to import an elephant trophy from Zimbabwe for Mr. Gregory C. Stabrylla. Mr. Stabrylla took his elephant on June 7th, 2021, in Dande Safari area. This area is operated by Charlton McCallum Safaris (CMS).

The Dande Safari area is a vast and wild landscape of more than 500,000 acres and is home to around 87,000 people in scattered small villages and homesteads. Surrounded by open borders, Dande is vulnerable to ivory poachers crossing over from neighboring Zambia and Mozambique. When Charlton McCallum acquired Dande East they saw the toll that that poaching was taking on the area and the dire future that could be ahead and developed the Dande Anti-Poaching Unit (DAPU). They began to pay salaries (out of their own pockets) to community game scouts, they provided uniforms, GPS, and radio communications systems, and armed them in their efforts to put an end to poaching in the area. In the article, "The Good Fight", it states that "DAPU's initiatives have been remarkable. Since 2010, DAPU scouts have collected more than 5,000 illegal snares and have arrested numerous poachers. These efforts have allowed negative game populations to flourish, and resurgence of wildlife has allowed for hunting to move back into the area" These endeavors have now continued into Dande North as well where they have had similar outcomes. Charlton MacCallum safaris has provided their last quarterly newsletter (attached) that sums up their anti-poaching efforts for 2020. In the Short Fact Sheet on Zimbabwe Elephant Management, attached, it provides that Charlton McCallum Safaris spends on average "\$85,000 a year on anti-poaching." Their forces have directly led to an 80% decline in elephant poaching in the important border region.

Charlton McCallum Safaris is also heavily involved with the local surrounding communities on many levels. First, the overwhelming bushmeat poaching lead to the creation of the DAPU which spawned employment for over 40 local scouts. These employment opportunities provide a substantial amount of money to local villagers in a very impoverished area of Zimbabwe. Scouts also assist in problem animal control for their communities. Second, CMS provides vital protein to the community diet by engaging in a meat-sharing system, giving away meat to locals primarily from elephant hunts. Lastly, CMS was the very first operator in Zimbabwe to go into a joint venture with the communities, sharing a 50% partnership of business with them. In the article, "Community Conservation Success in Zimbabwe's

Dande Safari Area” it details how CMS is “deeply involved with the CAMPFIRE programs.” One of the major projects that has been a success are the solar powered boreholes created for a year-round water source. With the current hold on elephant trophies fewer and fewer American hunting tourists are traveling to Zimbabwe costing the community the agreed 36% of all elephant trophy hunting income that is provided by CMS, which over and above the income provides the incentive for community members to preserve wildlife populations for the future.

This operator, along with all others, was heavily affected by the global pandemic of COVID 19 and the devastating effects that the virus and shutdowns had on all tourism businesses. Charlton McCallum Safaris in partnership with Conservation Force, took the African Emergency COVID Relief Fund pledge, agreeing to the following (1) to continue to occupy the identified area (2) to continue to control poaching, (3) and to continue community stewardship incentives during the 2020 COVID crisis. In the 2020 DAPU end of year report it reads that “Obviously with COVID, poor crops, no hunters, and 90% unemployment” they slipped backwards in the numbers of snares picked up through anti-poaching but managed to only have one elephant poached in Dande that they know of.

Charlton McCallum are leaders in wildlife conservation. The documents provided show that hunting revenues mitigate the three primary threats to elephants identified by FWS by creating incentives to secure habitat, protect elephants through extensive anti-poaching, and reduce conflicts through benefits for rural communities

In addition, this year CMS, along with two other safari companies, funded the construction of a primary school and high school in Masoka. Also, the DAPU (Dande Anti-Poaching Unit, run by Charlton McCallum) were the winners of the Ox of Okavango award, presented by the African Professional Hunters Association for exemplary work in wildlife conservation and its habitat.

Lastly, we have attached the article *Zimbabwe to Maintain Must-visit International Hunting Destination Status*, written by Emmanuel Koro, an international award winning independent environmental journalist. Mr.Koro writes “International hunting has emerged as one of the most promising industries whose revenue has great potential to support wildlife and habitat conservation in southern African hunting areas, including Zimbabwe at the same time funding rural infrastructure development. The International hunting benefits have accordingly made rural communities co-existing with wildlife value it more and in turn, continue to see the need to conserve it and its habitat.”

The updated Zimbabwe National Elephant Management Plan (2015-2020) has been submitted to the Fish and Wildlife Service on many applications previously, so we have not provided it, but we ask that you please reference that document to gain the full scope of what the country is doing to manage their most valuable wildlife commodity.

Enclosed please find the permit application to import an elephant trophy from the Republic of South Africa for applicant, Jeff Austin. Mr. Austin hunted with professional hunter Eugene Small in the Mapungubwe Game Reserve in South Africa in May of this year.

The Mapungubwe Game Reserve is within the Mapungubwe National Park, set against the norther border of South Africa, joining Zimbabwe and Botswana. It is an open, expansive savannah landscape at the confluence of the Limpopo and Shashe rivers. This is the land of sandstone formations, mopane woodlands, brooding baobabs, ancient floodplains and unique riverine forests that form a dramatic backdrop for the wealth of animal life - elephant, giraffe, buffalo, white rhino, gemsbok and the more elusive mammals like hyenas, leopards and lions. This area is also part of the Greater Mapungubwe Transfrontier Conservation Area, where cross-border movements of the Tuli elephants occur between South Africa, Botswana, and Zimbabwe. See the attached High Level Panel Report on the status of elephant populations in South Africa.

Enclosed is an import permit application for a personal sport-hunted elephant trophy taken by Richard Metzger. Mr. Metzger hunted with professional hunter Frans Van Der Merwe and operator Kwatale Safari Company in Controlled Hunting Area (CHA) NG43 of Botswana this year.

National Status and Management

The Botswana Government reopened controlled hunting in 2019, initially issuing quotas for 2020 but postponed the reopening and rolled forward the quotas until April 6, 2021 due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. As a corollary to reopening elephant hunting Botswana completed a number of beneficial management instruments that will advance and further secure the survival of elephant.

Botswana has completed a new National Elephant Management and Action Plan. This replaces the country's dated 1991 Management Plan.

The Botswana wildlife management authority, the Department of Wildlife and National Parks (DWNP) of the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Conservation and Tourism (MENT), has also completed an up-to-date elephant Non-Detriment Findings (NDF) with 2 annexes, including information addressing how controlled hunting in Botswana provides enhancement of survival of elephants, attached.

One of the addendums to the NDF applies the IUCN SSC *Guiding Principles on Trophy Hunting*

as a *Tool for Creating Conservation Incentives* (often cited by USFWS as useful indicators of benefits of regulated hunting), to Botswana's evolving elephant hunting which demonstrates the benefits of regulated safari hunting.

The National Management Plan creates the position for a National Elephant Coordinator, who has already been appointed. The National Elephant Coordinator will co-ordinate elephant management in Botswana and work with a National Elephant Committee formed by representatives of communities, private landowners, safari operators, NGOs, and independent researchers.

Together with the new National Management Plan, the DWNP has also approved the Priorities and Budget for the first year of its implementation.

At the onset of the re-opening of controlled hunting, DWNP also adopted *Hunting and Escort Guidelines 2019*, streamlining all the due processes before, during and after each hunt along with the functions and role of the DWNP Escort Guides, which are mandatory for each hunt. Furthermore, the Guidelines includes reporting forms for elephant hunts that are an important monitoring and evaluation tool. Interestingly, those Guidelines provide that controlled hunting will take place in areas where there will be no adverse effects on photographic tourism, page 6.

Botswana's elephant hunting re-opened after an extensive, country-wide public consultation process. After an imposed five-year moratorium on hunting, a review began in 2018 with the selection of a Cabinet Sub-Committee on Hunting Ban Social Dialogue. The review included a national year-long process of consultative meetings with community members, local authorities, and stakeholders that culminated with the overwhelming decision to re-open controlled hunting. See the attached documents "Media Statement on the re-opening of hunting", and the Declaration of open season on hunting. The participatory process itself should serve to further motivate and incentivize elephant conservation.

Botswana's elephant population has grown to be the largest in the world. It is secure and stable or growing.

Specific Area Management

The area in question NG43, is a leased concession area. See pages 29 to 32 of the NDF for an explanation of the four kinds of hunting areas/quotas in Botswana.

Leased concession areas (aka commercial concessions) refer to CHAs that are leased to safari hunting companies or photo tourism operators. In the case of commercial CHA's, Government advertises the CHAs available for leasing, and interested parties prepare technical and financial proposals (constituting a management plan) which are submitted to a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) for review: the successful applicant is approved by the relevant Land Board and a Lease issued by the Ministry of Lands. The technical / management plan specifies planned / proposed improvements for the CHA. All proposed plans and improvements are

subject to a variety of environmental review processes – for example, in the case of building camps/lodges an environmental impact assessment needs to be undertaken and approved through the Department of Environmental Affairs (DEA). Borehole installations need to be approved and registered by the Department of Water Affairs.

NG43 is a commercial Controlled Hunting Area on State land: the initial land use (1998) was multi-purpose, being both hunting and photographic, but after the renewal of the head lease in 2014 for a further 15 years, the land use reverted to non-consumptive tourism. Once the hunting moratorium was lifted in 2020, the DWNP approved a hunting quota for NG43 and an addendum to the Head Lease to include hunting as a land use in NG43.

Allocation of the hunting quota is undertaken by the Department of Wildlife & National Parks (DWNP), and is accessible to the concessionaire only after the management plan has been approved and the incumbent informed of their rights (hunting and photo tourism) to the CHA by the relevant Land Board.

Access to the hunting quota is granted by the DWNP annually, after the quota is declared / published by order through the Government Gazette. Quota is purchased by the operator/company and a Single Game License (SGL) is issued per client by species for a determined period by DWNP, supported by the purchase and issue of a Controlled Hunting Area permit, also determined for a specific period per client.

Operator Company Profile

Kgori Safaris (Pty) Limited is a registered proprietary limited company with a 100% citizen shareholding by Jacob Dickie Nkate (51%) and Jacobus Gerhardus Van Rensburg (49%). Both shareholders are directors. Frans Jacobus Wilhelmus Van Der Merwe, a Botswana resident, is the third director and a licenced full professional hunter.

Kgori Safaris was formed in 1993 by Jacob Nkate and Jim van Rensburg to conduct tourism activities. Jim van Rensburg has been holding a Botswana Professional Hunters License since 1998. In 1998 the company received the lease for NG 43 and developed the entire current infrastructure in the area, including boreholes, fire breaks and access routes, game drive tracks, artificial water points and camps. Tourism facilities consist of a 16-bed photographic lodge and camp sites for tourists, and two 8-bed hunting camps. The lease for NG43 was renewed in 2014 for a further 15-year period.

Kgori Safaris has been operating Mboma boat station (a licensed boating camp) in Moremi Game Reserve since 2001 and obtained a 15-year lease in 2015 for a 24-bed photographic lodge in the community-based concession NG19.

Operator Enhancement

Community Participation and Collaboration

There are no communities living in the concession. However, NG43 lies close to SANKUYO village community: Kgori Safaris has worked with Sankuyo village since starting operations in 1999, ensuring that the community receive tangible and financial benefits from hunting and photographic operations in NG43.

75% of the company's unskilled labour force is from Sankuyo village, situated in CHA NG34 (NG34 is currently a single / photographic use only CHA having converted from multi-purpose use to single purpose use (non-consumptive) as a result of the hunting ban implemented in Botswana). The transfer of skills and training is a key component of the NG43 management plan, and is in line with national labour and training programs. A technical component of the Management Plan for NG43 details Employment, Staff Welfare, and Training & Development conditions and procedures. Attached.

Meat Benefits

As provided by the Hunting and Escort Guidelines 2019, approved by the Government of Botswana in 2019, Kgori Safaris has abided to those Guidelines by directly delivering all the elephant meat to Sankuyo. Specially designed and constructed trailers are used to transport elephant carcasses to Sankuyo village. It should be noted that the community in Sankuyo village are dependent on the meat distribution programme from NG43/Kgori Safaris, since they are no longer a multi-purpose use CHA: the Sankuyo Tshwaragano Management Trust are eager to recall their hunting quota in NG34 (bordering NG43) from DWNP to subsidize the community meat requirements, but also to generate additional revenue from the hunting quota – COVID has negatively impacted photographic tourism, whereas safari hunting tourism has remained resilient.

The value of meat provided to the community is calculated based on the following:
the value of game meat is equal to ration meat (cooking meat with bones), currently selling for P30/kg.

A conservative estimate of meat harvested from an elephant bull is 1,400 kg, at P30/kg. This is P42,000 of meat per elephant. The meat value of 10 elephants is P420,000. (Equivalent to approx. \$38,000 US Dollars).

Habitat Improvement Enhancement

14 boreholes were drilled in the period 1998 – 2013. Two more boreholes were drilled during 2021 at a cost of BWP100,000 per borehole.

Fire plays an important role in the ecology of the Kalahari system, removing moribund plant

material, initiating new growth through the breaking of seed dormancy, and improving the grazing quality of the area by recycling nutrients. However, its impact is closely linked to fire frequency and to fire type, with higher frequency fires typically having an overall negative impact on a region's ecological integrity through its negative effect on vegetation biodiversity and with hot fires (greater than 2,000 kJ/s/m) affecting tree, shrub and sward (grass) layers compared to cooler fire predominantly only affecting the shrub and sward layer.

A total of 977 km of tracks are maintained in NG43 (See Fig. 1a in the attached Operator Enhancement Report and in the attached Map). Tracks are manually opened at the beginning of the season, removing trees and new shrub growth: annual maintenance of these tracks serve as effective fire breaks within the CHA.

Fire breaks around lodges, campgrounds are regularly maintained as the lodge roof structures are mostly thatch: risk of fire is high, especially in the dry, winter months, so staff are trained to educate clients on appropriate safety procedures and reducing the risk of fires by demarcating non-smoking zones in camp areas.

In summary, the attached import permit application package documents the extraordinary benefits of this applicant's hunt to the long-term survival of Botswana elephant. Of special note is the operator's long term habitat improvements (water holes and fire management), environmental monitoring, and support of Sankuyo village through the direct meat delivery program.

Good Afternoon,

Enclosed you will find an import permit application for an elephant trophy from Namibia for Mr. Gregory Arthur Fowler. Mr. Fowler hunted in Bwabwata West National Park with operator Hunt Africa Namibia and Professional Hunter, Jacobus H. Pienaar.

Bwabwata National Park is a protected area in northeastern Namibia that was established by merging Caprivi Game Park and Mahango Game Reserve. It is situated in the Zambezi and Kavango East regions, extending along the Caprivi Strip. It is bounded by the Okavango River to the west and the Kwando River to the east. Angola lies to the north and Botswana to the south. The area is an important migration route from Botswana to Angola for African elephant. In the West region of the park, where this hunt took place, the operator estimates that there are about 2,500 elephants. Bwabwata is an unusual Protected Area as about 5,500 people live in the park. The Namibian government involves park residents and neighbors in planning and managing the park.

We have attached the management plan for Bwabwata National Park put out by the Ministry of Environment and Tourism and the Republic of Namibia. In it you will find that the park is effectively managed together with the other North-East Parks (Khaudum, Nkasa Rupara, Mangetti, and Mudumu National Park) to ensure the conservation of important habitats, to safeguard corridors for regional wildlife migration; to provide engines for economic growth in poor rural areas; and to provide access to natural areas for local, regional, and international visitors. As mentioned above, there are thousands of residents that live in the park and through proper management humans and wildlife are now living in a "status quo that offers tremendous benefits to both conservation and rural community development."

In the document "It's not too good to be true – Elephants are thriving in Namibia" (attached) written as a response to the IUCN classification of the African Savannah elephant as "endangered", it states that "in Namibia, elephant numbers are increasing and their range is expanding, a testament to sound long-term conservation policies." Namibia's Ministry of Environment and Tourism (MEFT) has been conducting aerial transect surveys of its elephant populations since 1979. With highly experienced observers and many repeat surveys, it has been possible to predict population trends over time. It has been calculated that the Namibian elephant population has an annual growth rate of 5.36%. "This is biologically realistic, as elephant population growth rates can be as high as 7% under ideal conditions that are rarely met by free-ranging elephants."

As the population of elephants have grown so have the communities of people in Namibia. Managing the human-wildlife relations has been a major success for them. In the document, "The State of Community

Conservation in Namibia”, the Forward written by the Minister of Environment and Tourism for Namibia, Pohamba Shifeta, states “the sustainability of the conservancy movement hinges on its success and on five critical issues: benefits to communities, good governance and financial management, conservation hunting, wildlife crime, and drought related to climate change.” He goes on to state that Conservation hunting is “essential to the economic survival of many communal conservancies.” BwaBwata West National Park is home to the Omega village numbering about 1,000 people. In the operator enhancement report provided Hunt Africa Namibia, it details how they contribute money and goods to the Omega people and are contractually obligated to donate 2.5 million Namibian dollars to the local community yearly. As well, they provide game meat totaling about 45 tons a year. The conservation hunting model that Namibia has adopted has proven successful for both wildlife and the communities.

The Last document that we have provided is the National Elephant Conservation and Action plan that was put out in 2021 by MEFT (Namibia’s Ministry of Environment, Forestry, and Tourism). This plan is comprehensive and addresses specific management goals for the country to protect one of their most valuable wildlife assets. In many ways, elephant conservation and management issues differ in Namibia then in other elephant range states. Namibia’s elephant population is increasing, and its elephant distribution range is expanding. In the vast plan you will find current population statuses and trends as well as chapters to address any possible threats to elephants in Namibia, and how they set the offtakes and quotas. The Zambezi region and western Bwabwata National Park had a quota in 2019 of 11.5 elephants that could be taken yearly.

Please refer to the numerous documents and responses previously submitted to FWS by Conservation Force, Professional Hunters, Operators and Professional Hunting Organizations, as well as information submitted by the government authorities of Namibia in making a positive enhancement determination for this import.



Enclosed is an import permit application and supporting information for a personal sport-hunted elephant trophy taken by Jeffrey Holmes. Mr. Holmes hunted with professional hunter Grant Albers and operator BETCO Distributors (Pty) Limited, dba Savanna & Sky (Pty) Limited in Controlled Hunting Area (CHA) NG35 of Botswana in 2021.

National Status and Management

The Botswana Government, following the re-opening of controlled hunting in 2019 with a series of criteria and provisions, allocated quotas initially for 2020 but postponed the re-opening and rolled forward the quotas until to April 6, 2021 due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Botswana has completed a new National Elephant Management and Action Plan. The Botswana management authority, the Department of Wildlife and National Parks (DWNP) of the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Conservation and Tourism (MENT), has also completed an up-to-date elephant NDF with 2 annexes, including information addressing how controlled hunting in Botswana provides enhancement of survival of elephants, attached. One of the addendums to the NDF applies the IUCN SSC Guiding Principles on Trophy Hunting as a Tool for Creating Conservation Incentives, which are often cited by USFWS, to Botswana's evolving elephant hunting which demonstrates the benefits of regulated safari hunting.

The National Management Plan creates the position for a National Elephant Coordinator, who has already been appointed. The National Elephant Coordinator will co-ordinate elephant management in Botswana and work with a National Elephant Committee formed by representatives of communities, private landowners, safari operators, NGOs, and independent researchers.

Together with the new National Management Plan, the DWNP has also approved the Priorities and Budget for the first year of its implementation.

At the onset of the re-opening of controlled hunting, DWNP also adopted Hunting and Escort Guidelines 2019, streamlining all the due processes before, during and after each hunt along with the functions and role of the DWNP Escort Guides, which are mandatory for each hunt. Furthermore, the Guidelines includes reporting forms for elephant and leopard hunts that are an important monitoring and evaluation tool. Interestingly, those Guidelines provide that hunting will take place in areas where there will be no adverse effects on photographic tourism.

Botswana's hunting, and in particular elephant hunting, re-opened after an extensive, country-wide public consultation process. After an imposed five-year moratorium on hunting, a review began in 2018 with the selection of a Cabinet Sub-Committee on Hunting Ban Social Dialogue. The review included a national year-long process of consultative meetings with community members, local authorities, and stakeholders that culminated with the overwhelming decision to re-open controlled hunting. See the attached documents "Media Statement on the re-opening of hunting", and the Declaration of open season on hunting. The participatory process itself should serve to further motivate and incentivize elephant conservation.

Botswana's elephant population has grown to be the largest in the world. It is secure and stable or growing.

Specific Area Management

The area in question, CHA NG35, is a Special Elephant Quota Area (SEQ). Botswana's SEQ areas are NG8, NG9, NG11, NG35, CT4, and CT7. See pages 29 to 32 of the NDF for an explanation of the 4 kinds of areas/quotas in Botswana.

Special elephant quotas were allocated in these areas with high incidences of human elephant conflict to limit the interference of elephants in and around human settlements and to create an opportunity for communities to benefit from wildlife sustainable utilization. Funds accrued from the auctions of Special Elephant Quota areas are allocated to the Conservation Trust Fund: project proposals are submitted to the CTF and are directed towards Government and community projects within the elephant range. Proposals are also considered at mitigating the impact of COVID-19 on Community Trusts and to resuscitate those Community Based Organizations (CBOs) that were negatively affected by the hunting moratorium from 2014-2019.

In 2020, a special conservation auction of hunting licenses for elephant quota was held by the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources, Conservation & Tourism (MENT) to raise money for the Conservation Trust Fund (CTF). The Ministry auctioned hunting license packages of 10 elephant for 7 CHAs with high human-elephant conflict. (Incidentally, the auction for one area (CT29) did not take place.) Savanna & Sky Hunting was the highest bidder in the auction for NG35 paying the equivalent of approx. \$374,000.00 U.S. Dollars (BWP 4.0 million at 2020 average rate of exchange) for the auctioned elephants in NG35. Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic the hunts were postponed for one season and the packages were increased to 12 elephants by DWNP, adding a further 2 licenses in each area. The funds of the auction accrued to the Conservation Trust Fund (CTF) for the implementation of related community projects and programs. See attachments for details on the auction, invoices, and more about the Conservation Trust Fund.

The hunting season of 2021 in Special Elephant Quota Areas runs from April 6, 2021, to December 31, 2021. The COVID-19 pandemic and one year time constraint has limited operator activities.

All elephant hunts are accompanied by a DWNP Escort Guide (EG), with a registered PH contracted to the Company: the EG has powers of arrest, and reports on legal and illegal resource use.

Operator Company Profile

Betco Distributors (Pty) Limited trades as Savanna & Sky Hunting. It is a registered company, owned by Richard Peake (Botswana citizen) and co-managed with Grant Albers (Botswana resident). Both are Botswana registered professional hunters with accumulated experience of 35 years of big game hunting in Botswana.

Savanna & Sky specializes in safari hunting and tailor-made photographic safaris throughout Botswana: Savanna & Sky has an extensive client base, primarily from the US; their intention is to extend operations to other parts of Botswana, especially into areas of high elephant conflict and where community-based tourism opportunities may prosper .

Operator Enhancement

Community Participation and Collaboration

Special Elephant Quota Areas like NG35 in this instance are intended to provide community benefits through the Conservation Trust Fund wherein all SEQ area fees are paid.

The initial length of the leases in SEQ areas was one year. One or more of these areas may be motivated to form community trusts but for the current, opening year the quotas for each area are aimed at injecting revenue into the community to reduce the high level of human elephant conflicts.

Despite the above, the current winners of the 2020 auctions are improving relationships with communities living in the Special Elephant Quota areas.

Savanna & Sky Hunting has resolved to improve relationships with a number of communities living in NG35, particularly with those communities living in close proximity to the Buffalo Fence. The Buffalo Fence is a Government mandated veterinary fence, erected to restrict the movement of wildlife into livestock/arable land, and vice versa but with the main purpose to reduce the spread of Foot & Mouth Disease found in buffalo and other cloven hoofed species into cattle.

Savanna & Sky Hunting provided financial support to a local NGO to educate communities on elephant co-existence and to provide materials and labour to maintain sections of the Buffalo Fence. The value of this support over a 3 month period is approx. BWP65,000 (US\$6,500)

CHA's allocated a SEQ are considered marginal tourism areas, where photographic tourism is limited and / or constrained by human / livestock presence and where infrastructure to support photographic operations is not present and / or viable. Communities located in these CHA's are encouraged by the DWNP Community Outreach programme to consider funding options through the CTF to finance and develop other wildlife-based projects to supplement local livelihoods.

In NG35 Operator Savanna & Sky Hunting assisted communities in the area with voluntary donations to build Kgotla shade and fencing (traditional court), electrification of housing and the main kgotla offices and predator proof cattle fences (Kraals) in four villages in the area. See attached letters of appreciation and media article. The value of these donations is of approx.BWP400,000 (US\$40,000)

Meat Benefits

In line with Botswana's Hunting and Escort Guidelines 2019, Savanna & Sky Hunting delivers the full body of each elephant taken on quota to the local communities.

The value of meat provided to the community is calculated based on the following:

The value of game meat is equal to ration meat (cooking meat with bones), currently selling for P30/kg.

A conservative estimate of meat harvested from an elephant bull is 1,400 kg, at P30/kg. This is P42,000 of meat per elephant. The meat value of 10 elephants is P420,000. (Equivalent to approx. \$38,000 US Dollars).

In summary, this application package documents the extraordinary benefits of this applicant's hunt to the long-term survival of Botswana elephant. Of special note is the operator's long-term commitment to Botswana and its elephant, community networking, direct meat delivery system, and substantial funding of the Conservation Trust Fund of the Botswana Department of Wildlife and National Parks.

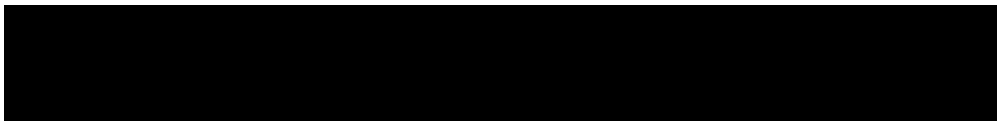
Note 4: *Sport-hunted trophy* is defined at [50 CFR 23.74](#) as follows: *Sport-hunted trophy* means a whole dead animal or a readily recognizable part or derivative of an animal specifically identified on the accompanying CITES document that meets the following criteria:

- Is raw, processed, or manufactured;
- Was legally obtained by the hunter through hunting for his or her personal use;
- Is being imported, exported, or re-exported by or on behalf of the hunter as part of the transfer from its country of origin ultimately to the hunter's country of usual residence; and
- Includes worked, manufactured, or handicraft items made from the sport-hunted animal only when:
 - i. Such items are contained in the same shipment as raw or tanned parts of the sport-hunted animal and are for the personal use of the hunter;
 - ii. The quantity of such items is no more than could reasonably be expected given the number of animals taken by the hunter as shown on the license or other documentation of the authorized hunt accompanying the shipment; and
 - iii. The accompanying CITES documents (export document and, if appropriate, import permit) contain a complete itemization and description of all items included in the shipment.

Note 5: Certain hunting trophies, including elephants, are subject to restrictions on their use after import into the United States. Please see 50 CFR 23.55 for more information or contact the Division of Management Authority.
