See attached to address comments pertaining to use of cubs, cubs-of-the-year and for consistency between and within documents. I think I captured any confusion regarding coy/cubs language. There is a portion that addresses the 48 females with cubs-of-the-year metric as being the model-averaged number, which is important to make sure that is clear to the general public. It would be good to make it clear that if we do develop a new estimation technique that does not use females with coy that it should no longer serve as a recovery criterion.
