Greetings,

I need some clarification about the chronology of changes to demographic criteria.

In the 2013 draft revised supplement to the demographic criteria, we said:

“In 2007, we supplemented the 1993 Grizzly Bear Recovery Plan with revised demographic criteria for the Greater Yellowstone Area (GYA) population (72 FR 11376, March 13, 2007).”

However, this FR notice says nothing other than to refer people to our website for the revision of the demographic criteria. To what 2007 document were we referring when we wrote this in 2013? On the web, I see workshop summaries and documents produced by teams in 2007 or so but I am not finding an official USFWS supplementation with revised demographic recovery criteria in 2007. What was the revision (from exactly what to exactly what) and where is the official document making this supplementation to the recovery plan?

Likely I am just missing a piece of the chronology, but I would like to understand the history so would appreciate your help in clarifying.
