Subject: Draft talking points to announce the decision to move forward with a delisting proposal

To date our public position has been that the Director has not reached a decision to move forward with a delisting proposal. Here are a few talking points to announce a change in this position:

- The Director of the Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) has reached a decision and has directed Service biologists to develop a proposal to delist the Yellowstone grizzly population based on the fact that the population is recovered and adequate regulatory mechanisms are in place to assure the long-term health of this important grizzly population and its habitat.
- This process will involve publishing a proposed rule in the Federal Register to delist the Yellowstone grizzly population, followed by a public comment period and public hearings. There will also be peer review of the proposal. The publication of the proposal and the start of the public comment process is still several months away. Upon completion of the public comment process, the Service will evaluate the comments and the peer reviews and make a decision to move forward with delisting or not.
- This proposal will only potentially impact the Yellowstone grizzly population. All other grizzly bear populations in the states of Montana, Idaho, and Washington will remain listed.
- The objective of the Endangered Species Act (Act) is to get listed species to the point at which protection under the Act is no longer required. Thus, eventual recovery and delisting is the objective of the Act and all the work the agencies have been doing to recover this grizzly population over the past 35 years has been directed toward this delisting objective.
