National Wildlife Refuge, Calf Island Unit Hunting Regulations

Welcome

Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge consists of ten units located along the coast of Connecticut from Westbrook to Greenwich. Due to its location within the Atlantic Flyway, the refuge provides important resting, feeding, and nesting habitat for many species of birds including the endangered roseate tern and threatened piping plover. The Calf Island Unit is the westernmost unit of the refuge, located approximately one half mile off the shore of Greenwich, Connecticut.

Hunt Information

Waterfowl and white-tailed deer hunting occurs on all areas of the Calf Island Unit, unless denoted by "No Hunting Zone" signage. All Connecticut hunting regulations apply, including season dates and harvest limits. Waterfowl may be hunted with all permitted methods of take, per State regulations. White-tailed deer hunting on the Calf Island unit is archery only.

***Note: Calf Island Unit landmass may be different than what is depicted on the hunting map due to natural processes. The Service only regulates hunting on the islands to the mean high tide line. Lands below the mean high tide line are regulated by the State of Connecticut.**

Safety

Hunters operating motorboats to reach refuge islands, or through refuge marsh areas, should always be aware of marine weather conditions and tide changes. Entering certain areas of the refuge is likely to expose hunters to mosquitoes, ticks, and other disease-carrying insects.

Firearms

Persons possessing, transporting, or carrying firearms on National Wildlife Refuge System lands must comply with all provisions of State and local law. Persons may only use (discharge) firearms in accordance with refuge regulations (50 CFR 27.42 and specific refuge regulations in 50 CFR Part 32).

Vehicles

Licensed motor vehicles are permitted only in designated refuge parking areas as shown on the map, or other legal public parking areas.

Boats

Hunting Regulations

Hunting regulations are designed to provide safe recreational opportunities through wise use of renewable wildlife resources. Hunting is permitted in accordance with Federal regulations governing public use on National Wildlife Refuges as set forth in Title 50 of the Code of Federal Regulations. Hunting will be in accordance with applicable Federal and State of Connecticut regulations subject to the conditions stated below.

Access

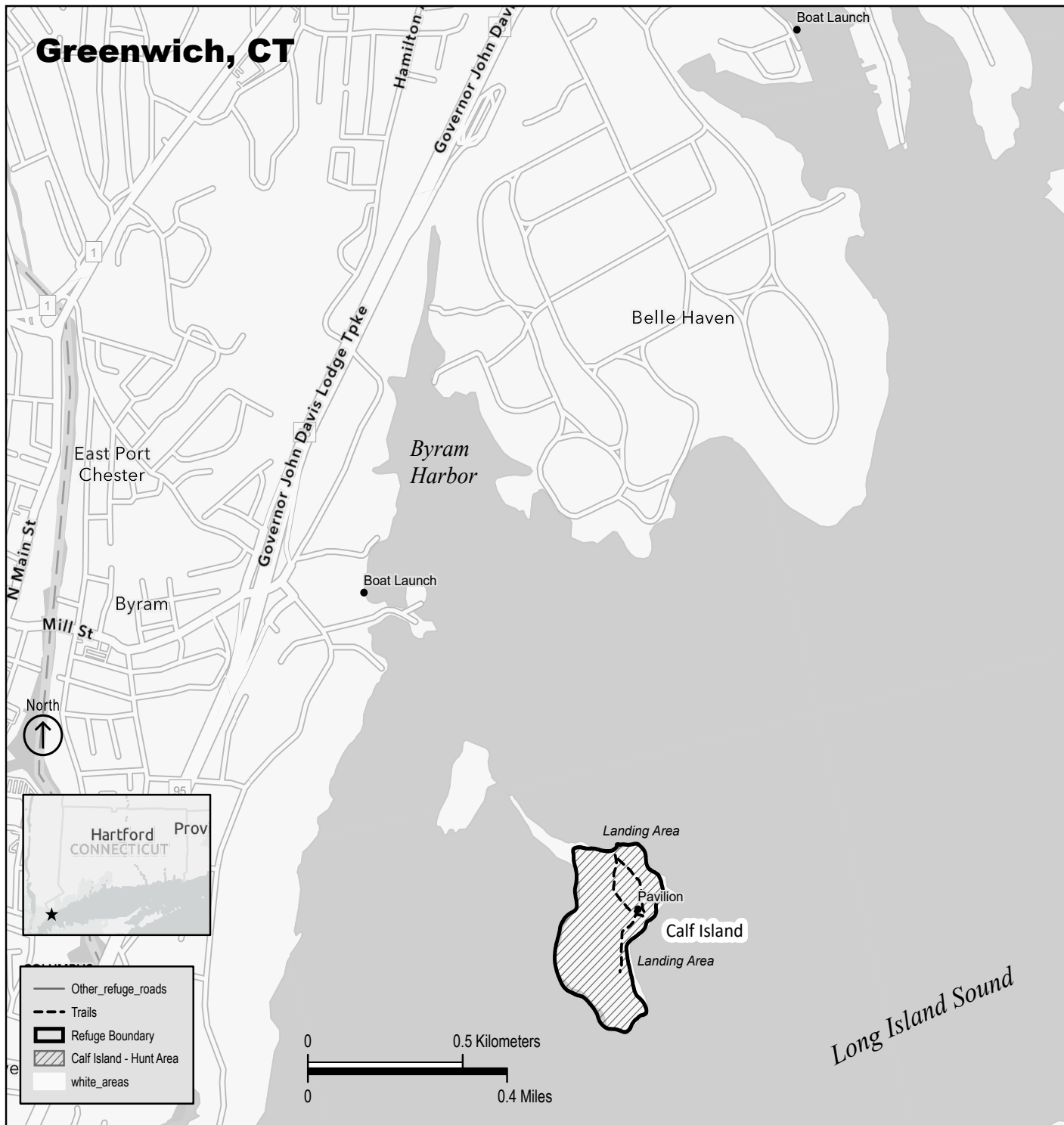
Hunters may access refuge hunting areas from 1 hour before legal sunrise until 1 hour after legal sunset. Access to the Calf Island Unit is by boat. Hunters may land boats on island beaches taking into account weather and tides. See map on reverse.

Dogs

The use of dogs when hunting waterfowl on the refuge is allowed.

Harvest Reporting

Successful hunters are requested to return a Big Game Harvest Report (FWS Form 3-2359) and/or a Migratory Bird Hunt report (FWS Form 3-2361) to the refuge at the end of the hunting season. Prohibited Activities

- Entering closed areas is prohibited.
- Camping and Fires are prohibited.
- Searching for or removal of any items such as antlers, skulls, plants, historic and archaeological features, which are protected by Federal law is prohibited.
- Use of electronic or photographic trail monitoring devices is prohibited. Use of drones is prohibited.
- Marking or flagging any tree or other Refuge feature with reflectors, paint, or other substance is prohibited.
- Permanent tree stands, nails, screw-in steps, or other items that penetrate the outer bark of a tree are prohibited. Tree stands, blinds, or other hunting equipment must be removed from the refuge at the end of each day.
- Access to the Refuge from private property is prohibited.
- Launching motorboats from the refuge is prohibited.
- Parking is prohibited on the refuge unless it is in the designated parking locations as indicated on the map or a public parking area.

Signs and Boundaries

Please respect the following signs:

- No vehicles; Refuge Boundary; No Hunting Zone

Applies to the area located behind

- Refuge Boundary: Entry permitted in accordance with refuge regulations
- Closed Area: All entry prohibited
- No Hunting Zone: Hunting, weapons, and game retrieval prohibited
