



The first stop on our road trip is the second oldest federal fish hatchery still operating today! Craig Brook supports the last remaining natural populations of Atlantic salmon in the U.S. and produces roughly 3 million eggs annually for the species' recovery!



What better way to kick off a hatchery road trip than with a fishing song? Add Louis Armstrong and Bing Crosby's "Gone Fishin" to your playlist to get you in the angling mood.



Public use areas and boat launches provide access to Craig Pond, where you can fish for lake trout and landlocked salmon, or to Alamoosook Lake, where you can fish for bass, pickerel, and perch.



Biking, boating, cross-country skiing, there are too many fun activities to list! But did you know you can go snorkeling?! If you're not a water fan, put on your hiking boots and hit the trails!



Hatcheries aren't just for fish! From bald eagles to black-capped chickadees, birds abound at Craig Brook! The trail systems provide forested habitat and the nearby lakes offer scenic views!



History lovers, this is the spot for you! Check out the Friends of Craig Brook Atlantic Salmon Flyfishing Museum, co-located in the Visitor Center.
