May 2023: The Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge is presently located in twenty-two different locations in the four primary Connecticut River watershed states of Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Vermont. The Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge is located in ten locations on the mainland and near shore islands along the northern shore of the Long Island Sound in Connecticut.

Urban Birding Program Draws New Crowd



May kicked off our monthly urban birding series, which takes place once a month at Riverfront Park in Springfield, MA. The park is located in between the Connecticut River and the heart of Downtown Springfield. Conte volunteer Bill Randolph is leading the programs, which are run in partnership with the Springfield Libraries. The first event drew ten participants, most of whom were new to birding and unfamiliar with the Conte Refuge. The highlight of the evening was watching a female Baltimore oriole weaving her nest in a tree along the bike path next to the river. All participants said they looked forward to joining future programs.

Partnering For Climate Change Education



Conte visitor service staff partnered with Mass Audubon, contributing to a semester long project at the Renaissance School in Springfield, MA, that focused on the effects of climate change. The program was developed by school and MA Audubon educators, and exposed the students to the realities of climate change, its effect on wildlife and people, and asked them to help develop solutions for moving in a positive direction. Conte staff assisted with the field trip aspect of the course, helping lead students in a hands on expedition in nearby Abbey Brook Conservation Area and the surrounding neighborhoods.

First designated in 2011, the program supports partners to conserve habitats, reduce bird hazards, and engage communities in bird education, recreation, science, and conservation. The resigning ceremony took place at Keney Park, and was attended by many of the contributing partners. Partnering To Create Harmony



Create Harmony (P.A.T.C.H.) to create a pocket park in Springfield. Conte staff worked with partners as part of the Urban Wildlife Conservation Partnership efforts in Springfield, MA to restore a wetland and a pollinator planting in this environmental justice community. The area was planted with milkweed and other pollinator friendly plants by volunteers from the neighborhood and will be used as an educational greenspace for the community. This vacant lot is being restored for wildlife and the community including pollinator and rain gardens as well as used for urban agriculture.

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Falkner Island Oystercatcher Shows Off New Band

McKinney Refuge partnered with Audubon Connecticut who assisted the refuge biologist to trap and band oystercatchers on Falkner Island. Oystercatchers are a state threatened species, and this month we counted five American oystercatcher nests on the island. The banding, which is done by trained professionals who are permitted through the Service, help us determine important biological information, such as, how long a bird might live, if the same birds come back to the same place each year, and where the best foraging areas might be along the coast.
