

## SPECIES STATUS ASSESSMENT PROCESS

- Requested data from states, tribes, researchers, others.
- Considered species' needs
- Evaluated threats
- Projected species' future abundance and distribution




# WHITE-NOSE SYNDROME (WNS) IS THE PRIMARY THREAT

- Kills bats during winter hibernation and in early spring
- An infectious disease caused by fungus (Pd) that thrives in cool, humid conditions
- Responsible for the deaths of millions of bats in eastern North America





## WNS SPREAD - 2006 TO PRESENT



## SPECIES STATUS ASSESSMENT FINDINGS

- Declines of 97 to 100% in WNS-affected northern long-eared bat populations
- Significant downward trend in abundance and distribution
- Continued declines expected across the range



# ONGOING CONSERVATION NORTHERN LONG-EARED BAT

- WNS National Plan
- Wind energy efforts to reduce and avoid mortality
- Work collaboratively to monitor bat populations and share survey data
- North American Bat Monitoring Program





## TACKLING WHITE-NOSE SYNDROME

- WNS National Plan: framework for collaboration and coordination with 150+ partners in US.
- Support research and development of management strategies through annual grant programs
- More than \$46 million to states, tribes, federal agencies, research institutions and NGOs





## TACKLING WHITE-NOSE SYNDROME

- Fungus present in a large part of North America and expected to continue to spread
- Solution is not a single cure, but a multi-faceted approach
- Suite of tools in development





# OTHER STRESSORS

- Wind energyrelated mortality
- Habitat loss
- Climate change





# LOOKING AHEAD: CONSERVATION TOOLS AND STRATEGIES

- Focus on surviving bat populations, protect sensitive life stages
- Use our experience with other endangered bats
- Use existing ESA tools to work with
  - federal partners like U.S. Forest Service and Federal Highways Adm.
  - states, tribes, private land managers
  - wind industry
- Streamline ESA processes



# 2022 CHANGES FOR PROJECT PROPONENTS

- If proposed listing action finalized, species-specific 4(d) rule removed
- How will proposed federal agency actions be affected?
  - Projects completed prior to December 2022
    - Still able to use 4(d) rule
    - No need for further consultation
  - Projects completed after December 2022 may require consultation or re-initiation



## **NEXT STEPS**

- Public comment period
- Virtual public information meeting and hearing
- Gather additional information from state, tribal, and other partners
- Craft a conservation approach focused on surviving population
- Develop tools and guidance to assist partners and stakeholders
- Final decision by end of November 2022






- Verbal public comments will be accepted in order of registration.




#### **Zoom Participants Icon**
