Refuge Happenings

October 2020: *The Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge is presently located in twenty-two different locations in the four primary Connecticut River watershed states of Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Vermont. The Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge is located in ten locations on the mainland and near shore islands along the northern shore of the Long Island Sound in Connecticut.*

The Big Sit At Stewart B. McKinney

McKinney NWR was host to two teams participating in the 2020 Big Sit, held this month around the world. During the Big Sit, birders spend up to 24 hours in a 17 foot circle and try to identify as many birds as they can. This year, teams sat at the Salt Meadow and Milford Point Divisions of the Refuge. Birds recorded on the list included brown creeper, pine siskins, bald eagles, northern shovelers, American bittern and Swainson's thrush. Better yet, the event took place during National Wildlife Refuge Week.


Time Lapse Photos Of Pondicherry Division Now Live

Conte Volunteers installed the Refuge's third Chronolog Project, located at the Pondicherry Division in New Hampshire. Currently, we also have Chronolog stations at Fannie Stebbins and Nulhegan Basin. Chronolog is a citizen science project that lets visitor contribute to a time lapse photo collage of one particular area of the refuge. American Woodcock Banding At Nulhegan Basin



The Nulhegan Basin Division was one of three Vermont capture sites for the Eastern Woodcock Migration Research Cooperative, an international research collaboration led by the University of Maine, to better understand the migratory ecology of the American woodcock along the Eastern Seaboard. This study uses Global Positioning System technology to track the seasonal movement and habitat selection of American woodcock as they travel from their breeding grounds in Canada and northeastern U.S. to their wintering areas in the southern part of the U.S. A total of 4 woodcock from the Division were captured and outfitted with GPS units in September. Field work was led by PhD students from the University of Maine. Visit www.woodcockmigration.org to follow tagged birds as they migrate to southern wintering grounds.

Roadside Mowing At Nulhegan Basin



With over 40 miles of publicly accessible gravel roads, annual road maintenance is a perpetual project at the Nulhegan Basin Division. During the month of October, the Refuge's tractor and boom mower were used to cut the roadside shoulders at the Nulhegan Basin Division. This preventative maintenance action reduces the amount of woody growth that accumulates along the roadsides.

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Meeting With Mt Tom Adjacent Land Owners to Discuss Proposed Use of Quarry

Refuge staff met with adjacent Mt. Tom land owners to discuss a proposal by Mt. Tom Company to use the quarry as a disposal site. The quarry is no longer used to produce shot rock for construction purposes, and the owners are proposing to use the quarry as commercial disposal area for unwanted commercial soil. Refuge lands are in close proximity to the quarry and the road leading to refuge property would be heavily impacted by truck traffic if Mt. Tom Company's proposal is approved by State regulators.

Mollie Beattie Bog Boardwalk Upgrade

The NorthWoods ProCrew recently completed the construction of the Lewis Pond boardwalk and moved onto replacing the Mollie Beattie boardwalk. The Mollie Beattie boardwalk was named after the former Director of the USFWS and showcases an exemplary black spruce bog community. The replacement boardwalk will provide visitors the opportunity to experience being in a unique black spruce bog. The new structure is being built at a higher elevation to allow for native plant communities to grow underneath the elevated platform.
