2023 Wild Things Youth Art Contest and Exhibition Rules and Entry Form

Contest Rules

Entrants must be between the ages of 5 and 18 as of September 29 2023.

Age categories are: 5-7; 8-10; 11-13; 14-16; and 17-18.

Only one entry per person is accepted.

Artwork that has been entered in a previous year may not be re-entered.

Artwork must be: Original, recent creation, **matted** and not computer generated, scanned, nor traced.

Artwork must not be: framed, nor have name, initials, nor a title on the front of the artwork.

Please Note: Velcro will be affixed to the back of the entries for hanging on a fabric panel.

Subject matter must represent native Louisiana wildlife, which is wildlife that is indigenous to Louisiana Wildlife Refuges (plants, animals, landscapes and any combination of these). Entries will be automatically disqualified if they depict exotic species.

Size: Artwork must be at least 8 ½" x 11" matted and may not exceed 20" x 24," matted.

Categories

The two prize categories are **drawing and painting**.

If you mix mediums, you must classify your entry as one or the other.

If you use oil pastels, you must clearly indicate your medium as drawing or painting.

Entry Deadline

Deadline for entry is Friday, September 29, 2023 by 4:00 p.m.

Loblolly Pine, Slash Pine, Spruce Pine, Longleaf Pin, Swamp Chestnut, Live Oak, Nuttall Oak, Red Oak, Turkey Oak, Water Oak, White Oak, Bald Cypress, Pond Cypress, Black Tupelo, Swamp Tupelo, Black Willow, Beech, Honey Locust, Magnolia, Maple, Sugarberry

Other Plants:

Wild Azalea, Spanish Moss, Black Rush, Spartina, Smilax, Baccharus, American Beautyberry, Southern Bayberry, Black Mangrove, Trumpet Vine, Pickerel Weed, Bulls Tongue, Water Lilly, Palmetto, Wax Myrtle

Animals:

White-tailed deer, Louisiana Black Bear, Bobcat, Raccoon, Opossum, Green Anole, River Otter, Grey Squirrel, Mexican Free-tailed Bat, Big Brown Bat, Fox Squirrel, Bald Eagle, Prothonotary Warbler, Pileated Woodpecker, Wood Duck, Great Blue Heron, Mallard

Habitat Types:

Salt Marsh, freshwater Marsh, Brackish Marsh, Bayous, Barrier Islands, Cypress Breaks, Sea Grass Bed, Bottomland Hardwoods, Pine Flatwood Forest/Pine Savannah.
