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REDINGTON NAMED SUPERVISOR
OF SHOSHONE NATIONAL FOREST

Paul G. Redington, former chief of the Biological Survey and now a member of the Forest Service, has been assigned to take charge as Forest Supervisor of the Shoshone National Forest, Wyoming, with headquarters at Cody, Chief Forester F. A. Silcox announced today. He succeeds Forest Supervisor J. N. Langworthy who retired February 1.

Mr. Redington first visited the Shoshone Forest in 1904, and served as an Inspector under Associate Forester E. A. Sherman in 1907 and 1908 in the States of Wyoming, Montana, and Idaho. Prior to his detail to the Biological Survey, Mr. Redington became well acquainted with the Shoshone country, and later, during his work in the Biological Survey, he spent some time in Cody and vicinity.

The Shoshone National Forest was set aside in 1893, and was one of the first national forests established. The forest is one of great scenic beauty and is visited by large numbers of recreationists. Mr. Redington is especially equipped to handle the important wild life resources of this forest, through his knowledge and experience in game management problems. Big game is abundant within this forest and fishing conditions are described as excellent.
