CONTEST CORNER | Tips for Success

DO'S





DON'TS

- Read the full contest rules
- ✓ Sign your entry form & have it signed by an adult
- ✓ Tape your entry form to the back of your art
- ✓ Fill out a Reference Form if you are in Grade 7 12
- Create your art horizontally (wide not tall)
- ✓ Include habitat
- ✓ Take a step back. Remember that your art will be shrunk to the size of stamp! Look at your art from across the room to smaller scale

- Don't sign, initial or write on the front of your art
- No mute swans, loons, grebes, coots or other birds not on the eligible species list.
- Don't copy or trace anyone else's photo or artwork! This must be your own creation.

How to Avoid Copying & Plagiarism

Although many of us may have learned to draw by copying art or photographs, this is not allowed in Junior Duck Stamp. We want you to use your own ideas and what you have learned to create a unique visual waterfowl message. Remember, even if someone else gives you permission to use their work, do not copy it!

Check Your Work: When someone looks at your artwork, they shouldn't be able to recognize the references you used to create it.

COMPOSITION CORNER | Tips for Success

The Essentials:

- 9" x 12" paper or canvas, no more than 1/4" thick
- Horizontal composition (wide not tall)
- No writing on the front; signature on the back
- As accurate/realistic as possible in anatomy and color
- Appropriate scale for shrinking to postage stamp size (1 ½" x 2")
- Absolutely no copying!
