Peer Review Plan for the Guadalupe Fescue (Festuca ligulata) Draft Recovery Plan

About the Document

Title: Draft Recovery Plan for Guadalupe Fescue (*Festuca ligulata*)

Anticipated Dissemination Date: May 2021

Purpose: This draft recovery plan describes strategies for recovering Guadalupe fescue throughout its range. It provides specific criteria for reclassifying the species from endangered to threatened (downlisting), and removal of Guadalupe fescue from the Federal List of Endangered and Threatened Plants (delisting), in accordance with section 4(f)(1) of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.). The draft recovery plan contains information on Guadalupe fescue's life history, resource needs, current conditions, and threats, dentifies objective, measurable criteria, and outlines the actions necessary for achieving recovery of the species. This draft recovery plan was prepared by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's Austin Ecological Services Field Office.

About the Peer Review Process

Type of Review: Influential

Date of Peer Review: Peer review of the draft recovery plan will be concurrent with the public comment period (60 days) that is identified in a Federal Register Notice of Availability.

Reviewers: The Service will solicit external peer review of the scientific background information used in the draft recovery plan from at least three or more independent scientific reviewers with expertise in Guadalupe fescue, rare plant conservation and recovery, or the ecology of the Chihuahuan Desert mountains.

Criteria for Reviewer Selection: Peer reviewers will be selected based on the following criteria:

- Expertise: Reviewers will be experts in Guadalupe fescue, rare plant conservation and recovery, or the ecology of the Chihuahuan Desert mountains. They should have knowledge in one or more of the following areas: biology, ecology, demography, population genetics, and management and conservation of rare plant species.
- Independence: Reviewers should not be employed by the Service. Academic and consulting scientists should have sufficient independence from the Service or the Department if the government supports their work.

- Objectivity: Reviewers should be recognized by their peers as being objective, open-minded, and thoughtful. Reviewers should be comfortable sharing their knowledge and identifying their knowledge gaps.
- Advocacy: Reviewers should not be known or recognized for an affiliation with an advocacy position regarding the protection of Guadalupe fescue under the Endangered Species Act.
- Conflict of Interest: Reviewers should not have any financial or other interest that conflicts with or that could impair their objectivity.

About Public Participation: A 60-day public comment period for the draft revised recovery plan is anticipated to begin in May 2021, during which time the public will have the opportunity to review and provide input to the draft plan. The availability of the plan will be made public through news releases, newspaper articles, and mailings, and will be posted on Service websites with solicitations for public comment.
