Camino Real del Tierra Adientro Trail

- Open season: year round
- Length: 2.3 miles round trip
- Location: South of west side kiosk
- Surface: Natural earth and crusher fine
- Difficulty: Grade 3.5% Slope 1% width 10-15 feet
- Information: This is historical trail located on the refuge. Trail interpretation will be determined by tribal, community and partner consultation.
- Uses: Open for pedestrian use only

Refuge Field Loop Trail

- Open season: year round
- Length: 1.4 miles round trip
- Location: North of west side kiosk
- Surface: Natural earth
- **Difficulty:** Grade 0% Slope 1% width 10-15 feet
- Information: This trail is Valle de Oro NWR's longest trail. It heads north from the visitor center around the old alfalfa fields.
- Uses: Open to pedestrians, jogging, bicycling, horseback riding, and dog walking.

Starting August 1st, 2021 the west side of the refuge will be closed to all visitor uses for wetland and storm water swale construction. Project completion will determine reopening timeline.
