#### **Habitat Protection**

The Coastal Program supports the protection of private lands of significant ecological value with conservation easements. • Invasive species control An easement is a voluntary legal restriction that limits future development on a property while maintaining current land use by the owner while preserving the site's natural resources. An easement is held by a nonprofit organization called a land trust. The Coastal Program works with land trusts to identify and assess potential easement properties and support their future management.

#### Restoration

The Coastal Program funds a variety of restoration projects that improve habitat for wildlife species and engage the public in wildlife conservation. Examples of previous projects include:

- Oyster reef establishment
- Wetland restoration
- Native wildflower meadows
- Longleaf pine habitat
