What Action Is Being Proposed?

- We proposed critical habitat for the Miami tiger beetle on September 7, 2021.
- A Public Comment period is currently open through December 23, 2021.

- A final critical habitat rule is due September
 7, 2022.

What Is Critical Habitat


- Critical habitat identifies geographic areas that are important to conserving federally listed threatened or endangered species.
- Federal agencies are required to consult with the USFWS before they authorize, carry out, or fund any activity that may impact a listed species or designated critical habitat.

What Critical Habitat Is Not

- Designating critical habitat does <u>not</u> affect land ownership or establish a refuge, wilderness, <u>reserve</u>, <u>preserve</u>, or other conservation area.
- Critical habitat does not stop development.
- Critical habitat does <u>not</u> affect all activities within a designated area, only those actions that require a Federal permit, license, or funding.
 - The USFWS will work with the Federal agency to amend their project so that it can proceed without adversely modifying the critical habitat.


Miami Tiger Beetle

- Endemic to pine rockland habitat in Miami-Dade County
- First documented in 1934 from North Miami
- Considered extinct
- 2007 rediscovered in Richmond Pine Rocklands
- 2014 Petition for listing
- 2016 Listed as Endangered
- Two known populations at Richmond Pine Rocklands and Nixon Smiley Pineland Preserve



Threats

- Globally imperiled habitat
- Habitat loss of 98%
- Remaining pine rockland habitat highly fragmented
- Lack of prescribed fire
 - Vegetation encroachment
- Current and future development projects
- Collection
- Climate Change / Sea Level
 Rise



Miami Tiger Beetle Range

Considerations for Delineating Range

- Limited historical data (one extirpated location)
- At the time of listing and since two, small, isolated populations (Richmond and Nixon Smiley)
- Adult and larval MTB require open, sandy areas for thermoregulation, feeding, oviposition, and larval development.
- Based on limited occurrences and species' needs, we concluded the MTB is restricted to the Northern Biscayne Pinelands of the Miami Rock Ridge.
 - Northern Biscayne Pinelands characterized by extensive quartz sands



Physical or Biological Features

- Pine rockland habitat of at least 2.5 acres in size and maintained by natural or prescribed fire or other disturbance regimes
- Open sandy areas within or directly adjacent to the south Florida pine rockland habitat with little to no vegetation that allows for or facilitates normal behavior and growth such as thermoregulation, foraging, egg laying, larval development, and habitat connectivity, which promotes the overall distribution and expansion of the species.




Area Proposed as Critical Habitat

- 16 units (1,977 ac)
 - 2 occupied units (1,572 ac)
 - 14 unoccupied units (406 ac)
- 14 unoccupied units
 - Contain features for species
 - Currently managed to maintain pine rocklands




Miami Tiger Beetle Proposed Critical Habitat





Summary

- Designating critical habitat allows for the conservation and protection of the physical and biological features necessary for conservation of the Miami tiger beetle.
- Critical habitat only affects projects being authorized, carried out, or funded by Federal agencies.
- Critical habitat does <u>not</u> place additional regulatory burden on private landowners or non-Federal agencies unless they are subject to conditions related to Federal funding or authorization.




