## National Wildlife Refuge Bird List

The Tennessee National Wildlife Refuge, administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is located in west Tennessee, along beautiful Kentucky Lake. Its 50,000 acres of wetlands, woodlands and agricultural fields provide foraging, nesting and resting habitat for a myriad of birds. Established in 1945 for migratory birds, the wetlands and agricultural fields are managed for wintering waterfowl, while benefiting wading birds and shorebirds. An aggressive forest management program is underway to improve habitat for forest-dwelling migratory birds, including nesting and migrant wood warblers and thrushes.

#### **Tennessee National Wildlife Refuge**

The refuge headquarters office is located just northeast of Paris, Tennessee off of Highway 79. The Duck River Unit, the largest of the three units, is located in Humphreys and Benton Counties at the junction of the Duck and Tennessee Rivers. The sub-headquarters of this unit is located one and one-half miles south of Hustburg, Tennessee. The Big Sandy Unit is located 12 miles north of the town of Big Sandy and is at the junction of the Big Sandy and the Tennessee Rivers. The Busseltown Unit is located in Decatur County along the western bank of the Tennessee River, the entrance to the unit being five miles northeast of Parsons. Tennessee.

How to use your checklist The bird checklist was designed to be informative and simple to use. Symbols which appear in this checklist represent the following:

Seasonal appearance Sp. Spring, March-May

S Summer, June-July

F Fall, August-November

W Winter, December-February

#### Seasonal abundance:

- a abundant (a common species which is very numerous)
- c common (certain to be seen in suitable habitat)
- u uncommon (present but not certain to be seen)
- o occasional (seen only a few times during a season)
- r rare (seen only once or twice a year; some years not at all)
- accidental (has been observed on refuge less than three times in a specified season)
- \* known or suspected to nest on refuge

#### **Ethics for Birdwatching**

Take care not to disturb nesting birds, exposing eggs and young to extreme temperatures and predation. Disturb wintering wildlife as little as possible, particularly during critical feeding and resting periods. They need all of their energy reserves to withstand the stresses of harsh weather and migration.

Certain areas of the refuge are closed from November 15 through March 15 to minimize bird disturbance. Please observe all refuge signs.

Birdwatchers visiting the Refuge are asked to look for the following species that might occur in the area but have yet to be documented on the refuge. If positive observations are made, please notify us at the Refuge Headquarters.
