2013 Bison Hunting

Information and Regulations

Background

Bison hunt management on the National Elk Refuge is designed to achieve optimum herd size as determined through a cooperative effort between National Elk Refuge, Grand Teton National Park, and Wyoming Game & Fish Department managers.

General Hunting Information

Hunting of bison on the National Elk Refuge is permitted from August 15, 2013 through January 12, 2014. Bison hunting licenses are issued by the Wyoming Game & Fish Department. Individuals who have not already applied and been selected for the 2013 season are not eligible to hunt bison this year. A Refuge-specific bison hunting permit is required and will be provided with the State license.

Twelve hunt periods will be available to hunters:

- Period 1: August 15 – 23
- Period 2: August 31 – September 6
- Period 3: September 14 – 20
- Period 4: September 28 – October 4
- Period 5: October 12 – 20
- Period 6: November 2 – 15
- Period 7: November 23 – December 1
- Period 8: December 7 – 13
- Period 9: December 14 – 20
- Period 10: December 21 – 27
- Period 11: December 28 – January 3
- Period 12: January 4 – 12

The following items must be in the hunter's possession while bison hunting on the Refuge:

- Refuge bison hunting permit
- Valid State of Wyoming Bison Hunting License
- Valid Hunter Safety or Instructor Card or certificate for persons born on or after January 1, 1966
- Wyoming Conservation Stamp

Bison hunting is allowed in both the North and South Units of the Refuge, but each unit has distinct weapons restrictions. Hunters are responsible for knowing which weapons can be used in the hunt unit they are accessing.

Hunters are responsible for knowing and observing hunt boundaries (*see map*). Much of the North and South Unit hunt boundaries are identified on the ground by signs and posts. The North Unit hunt area is bounded on the west by the Highway 26/89 fence line and on the north by the south bank of the Gros Ventre River main channel.

Persons may only discharge firearms while actively hunting with a valid Refuge permit in accordance with Refuge regulations (50 CFR 27.42 and specific Refuge regulations in 50 CFR Part 32).

South Unit

- Hunters present in the South Unit must carry an appropriate limited range weapon.
- South Unit hunters are restricted to limited range weapons, including muzzleloading rifles and archery equipment as defined by the Wyoming Game & Fish Department, or shotguns with slugs.
- Rifled barrels and sighting systems are recommended for hunters using a shotgun.
- All handguns must meet the Wyoming Game & Fish Department's definition of a legal firearm for the taking of bison, and must use straight-walled cartridges with a barrel length no longer than 12 inches.
- Handgun cartridges must be at least 2" in overall length such as 45-70 government or 460 SW magnum.
- Using rifles that shoot black powder cartridges is prohibited in the South Unit.

North Unit

- North Unit bison hunters may hunt with any legal weapon as defined by the Wyoming Game & Fish Department for the taking of wild bison, including rifles, handguns, black powder firearms, and archery equipment.

Special Regulations

All State of Wyoming hunting regulations (available online at <http://wgfd.wyo.gov/web2011/home.aspx>) are in effect and will be enforced. Hunters must review all regulations and maps prior to hunting on the Refuge. Refuge hunting permits may be revoked in the event of improper hunter conduct or violation of regulations, and future Refuge hunting privileges could be denied.

Prohibited activities while bison hunting on the Refuge include:

- Parking along Refuge roads
- Pursuing or following bison by vehicle, including between parking areas
- Overnight camping or parking
- Shooting from parking areas or Refuge roads
- Shooting wildlife other than bison
- Target or practice shooting
- Use or possession of alcoholic beverages while hunting
- Collection of specimens, including but not limited to antlers, skulls, and artifacts

A fluorescent orange exterior garment as defined by State regulations must be worn by anyone in a hunt area. Hunters need to ensure anyone accompanying them is compliant with this regulation.

Any person(s) accompanying a bison hunter must stay with the hunter at all times except during retrieval activities.

Certified weed free livestock feed is required on the Refuge.

Regulations for Archery Hunting on the Refuge

- Archery hunters on the Refuge must wear a fluorescent orange exterior garment as defined by State regulations.
- Archery hunters are exempt from the hunter safety certificate requirement.
- Hunters within the archery only hunt area (*see map*) must maintain a minimum distance of 200 yards from residences.

Refuge Access and Travel

The primary access to and from Refuge bison hunt areas is through the main Refuge entrance at the end of East Broadway Avenue in Jackson.



- Vehicles parked on the Refuge must be in a designated hunt parking area.
- The West and South parking lots may be occasionally closed until 2:00 pm during December in order to prevent early morning bison disturbance and improve harvest opportunities. Closure dates will be posted on the Refuge web page and marked near the intersection of the Refuge Road and Flat Creek Road.
- One bison hunt parking area and access point is available on North Highway 89. Off-Refuge parking and access is also allowed on the Gros Ventre Road at Mile Post 1.1 and 2.3. The Gros Ventre Road parking and access areas are for use by both permitted elk and bison hunters. Retrieval of bison and elk will not be permitted back to the Gros Ventre Road parking areas.
- Hunters may not exit vehicles or be dropped off on roads between hunter parking areas.
- Motorized vehicle travel in a hunt area is prohibited, except as noted in the section entitled "Retrieval of Harvested Animals."
- Horses and bicycles are permitted in a hunt area, but bicycles must remain on designated retrieval roads.
- ATVs must be registered, insured, and operated by a licensed driver. ATVs may only be driven on Refuge roads to one of the hunter parking areas and are not allowed on Refuge retrieval roads.
- Prior to the start date of the hunt, hunters may only access Refuge areas open to the general public. Hunters are only allowed into hunt areas on the dates listed on their valid permit.
- During periods of very high or extreme fire danger, a water source or fire extinguisher combined with a shovel is recommended for each vehicle.
- Bear spray is recommended for all persons participating in the Refuge hunt program.

A temporary safety zone exists in the area around Grand Teton National Park's Gros Ventre Campground. This area is closed to hunting and hunter entry until October 5.

Retrieval of Harvested Animals

The following information will assist successful hunters in retrieval of bison from a hunt area:

- Hunters are encouraged to make prior arrangements for retrieving and field dressing carcasses in order to expedite the process, thus reducing spoilage of meat. This is critical during periods of warm weather.
- Commercial retrieval services are available for a fee. Current businesses authorized to operate on the Refuge are posted on the bulletin board at the Refuge Administrative Office on East Broadway Avenue.
- Vehicles used for retrieval are restricted to designated retrieval roads.
- Bison should be dragged to the nearest retrieval road location (*see map*). Hunters must return by the most direct route to the parking lot. Driving off designated roads is prohibited.
- Bison hunters may retrieve animals any time during the day. Note that elk hunters utilizing the same or adjoining Refuge hunt areas cannot retrieve elk until after 2:00 pm. Consideration should be given to elk hunters utilizing the same or adjoining Refuge hunt areas prior to 2:00 pm.
- Designated retrieval roads will only be open to vehicle traffic to retrieve bison until dark.
- No game retrieval will be permitted through Grand Teton National Park. This includes retrieval to Gros Ventre Road parking areas at Milepost 1.1 and 2.3.
- Successful hunters may not transport other hunters into a hunt area. Only the successful hunter and helper(s) may be in the vehicle.
- The Refuge has wheeled carts and sleds available on a first-come, first-served basis at the Miller Barn in order to assist hunters.
- Refuge roads and parking areas may be temporarily closed due to inclement weather or management considerations.

Hunters with Disabilities

The National Elk Refuge encourages hunters with disabilities to participate in the bison hunt program and seeks to afford them reasonable accommodation for the activity.

Hunters who have both a Wyoming Game & Fish Disabled Hunter Permit and a National Elk Refuge permit are eligible to reserve a designated accessible hunt site. Reservations must be made at the Jackson Hole & Greater Yellowstone Visitor Center at 532 North Cache Street in Jackson. A hunter with a Disabled Hunter Permit who wants to use an accessible site, but does not have a reservation, must stop at the Visitor Center. There, the hunter will receive a reservation confirmation and instructions entitled “2012 Hunting Procedures for Persons with Physical Disabilities.” The disabled hunter companion permit is not valid on the Refuge.

Brucellosis Surveillance

Hunters must collect biological samples from harvested animals. Instructions are provided by State wildlife managers. For further information, contact the Wyoming Game & Fish Department.

Hunters should take personal safety precautions to reduce the risk of infection with brucellosis by wearing rubber / latex gloves while field dressing bison.


