


## We are mapping the sightings of Delmarva fox squirrels

The Delmarva fox squirrel has recently been delisted and is no longer classified as a Federally endangered or threatened species. However, monitoring of this species will continue for 10 years to insure it is still doing well. We are mapping the distribution of this animal and are looking for photos or observations you may have made while visiting the refuge or while sitting in a tree stand or blind.

## How to tell a Delmarva fox squirrel from a gray squirrel?


Delmarva's are large, silvery gray and do not have a brown wash on the back or tail. They are larger than the more common gray squirrel and can be seen along roadsides or field edges as well as in the mature forest that is their home.
