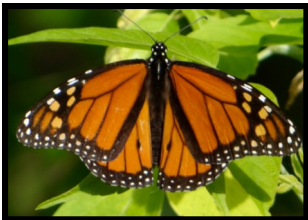
Wingspan: 1 3/4 to 2 1/4 inches

Wingspan: 1 3/4 to 2 inches
Prefers shade.
Emerges in early spring.

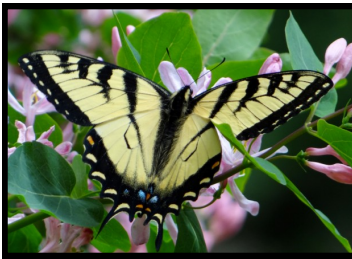
