Yi Li of Ann Arbor Wins Junior Duck Stamp Best of Show

Yi Li is Michigan's Best of Show winner in the Junior Duck Stamp contest held on March 27, 2008, at the Green Point Environmental Learning Center in Saginaw. Her piece entitled "Where the Sky and Water Meet," was done in colored pencil and acrylic and featured a pair of Red-

breasted mergansers. Li is the daughter of Zhong and Julee Li of Ann Arbor. She is a junior at Huron High School in Ann Arbor. Li has been drawing since about age 9 and received a third place award in last year's Junior Duck Stamp contest. Li's artwork went against the rest of the country's Best of Shows in the national competition held at the San Diego Zoo in California on April 17. Seokkyun Hong of Texas won first place in the national competition. Her artwork will be made into the Federal Junior Duck Stamp for 2008-2009.

Three hundred and twenty-one students in grades K-12 entered this year's contest. Entries came from all parts of the state and included students from public schools, private schools, art schools, and home schools. 2008 Refuge Deer Hunts

The refuge will accept applications for its 2008 deer hunting season beginning June 1. Hunters can either apply online or by mailing a 3" x 5" card to the refuge. Applications must be postmarked by August 1, 2008, to be eligible for the drawing and associated priority points.

The refuge is offering 18 hunts including four archery, two non-ambulatory (wheelchair hunters only), four shotgun, and six muzzleloader. There is no special youth hunt this year. Youth are encouraged to apply as a partner with an adult.

More information about each hunt can be found on the hunter information sheets. This information and maps of the various hunt areas are on our website. People may also pick up information sheets at the refuge headquarters, Green Point Environmental Learning Center and at select licensing outlets and other sites around the state.

Please note that the refuge has new selection rules regarding partners. This year partners will be selected based upon the one with the least points. For example if someone with 6 points partners with someone with 1 point, their application will be selected at the one point level, not the six point level. Engineering Underway for New Auto Tour Route on Refuge

The design and engineering phase for a new auto tour route at Shiawassee National Wildlife Refuge is underway. This phase should be complete in time for the refuge to begin construction in FY2009. Currently, visitors mainly have access to four trails situated on the edges of the refuge and few get to see the wildlife spectacle that makes the refuge unique. The 7.5-mile Wildlife Drive will meander past forests, grasslands, marshes, open water pools, and the Shiawassee River and will enhance the ability of visitors to see waterfowl, herons, eagles and a great diversity of other wildlife. Further, visitors will be able to see the management practices the refuge uses to attract this abundance of wildlife.

The Wildlife Drive is funded via \$2M from the Federal Highway Administration, \$620K from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (FWS) Deferred Maintenance account, and \$200K from FWS Visitor Facility Enhancement funds. Construction will include elevating low roads, improving the gravel road surface, and rounding out restrictive corners. Other important amenities include a new observation platform on the Shiawassee, a new parking area for visitors to access the 4.5-mile Ferguson Bayou Trail, and a new fishing and canoe access site along the Spaulding Drain.

The new route should increase the refuge's visitor numbers substantially and provide a boost to the local economy. Recreational use at the refuge generated approximately \$1 million in economic activity during fiscal year 2006, according to a report by FWS entitled "Banking on Nature 2006: The Economic Benefits to Local Communities of National Wildlife Refuge Visitation." Approximately 60,000 people visited Shiawassee Refuge in 2006, with non-residents accounting for 63 percent of the total expenditure. The Wildlife Drive will conservatively attract 30,000 new visitors annually. In fact, this facility is by far the most requested improvement to the refuge's visitor services program made by the public.

An important challenge in developing the Wildlife Drive is the poor condition of adjacent county roads. In fact, Curtis and Ambrose Roads are so eroded that the refuge will only be able to open the tour route during the most optimum road conditions to prevent visitors

from becoming stuck. The refuge is working with the Friends of Shiawassee NWR, the Saginaw County Road Commission, Spaulding Township, Saginaw Valley Convention and Visitors Bureau, Saginaw County Chamber of Commerce, and the Saginaw County Drain Commission to obtain federal Public Lands Highway Discretionary Program funds to rehabilitate these county roads. This repair will enable the refuge to keep the tour route open for much greater periods.

Free Native Plant Workshop

In an effort to attract local wildlife to your property, these workshops will help you incorporate all the most important aspects of a native habitat into your own backyard. Two workshops covering forest management and wetlands have already been held. The final workshop will provide information on using native plants on your land. On **June 9**, from 6:00—7:00 p.m., Designs by Nature will present information on the importance of using native plants for landscaping. From 7:00—8:00 p.m. they will offer native plants for sale to anyone who might be interested. This workshop is free and will be held at Green Point Environmental Learning Center, 3010 Maple Street in Saginaw.

Promoting conservation to private landowners is a priority for the Conservation District and the refuge. In a world where the majority of land is privately owned, it is important that we provide the knowledge and information to landowners to assist with wildlife and habitat conservation.



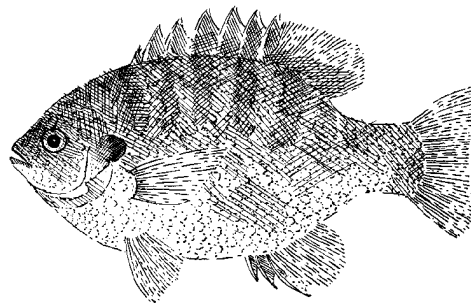
Volunteers Needed for Kids' Free Fishing Day on June 7

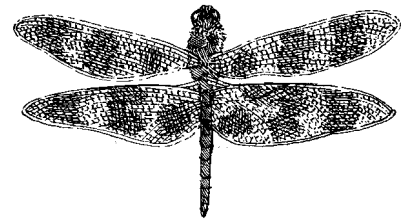
