


Come visit

The Fort River Division, located in Hadley, Massachusetts, is named after the major body of water flowing through it: the Fort River. This river is located in the eastern portion of the Pioneer Valley, and is the longest free-flowing tributary to the Connecticut River in Massachusetts.

A one-mile long, universally accessible birding and natural trail is located at the Fort River division. The trail is open to the public year round, a half-hour before sun-rise to a half-hour after sun-set, boasting a variety of habitat types, including hardwood forest, floodplain forest, and grasslands; attracting a diversity of resident and migratory wildlife. Along the way, visitors can read storybooks that change on a monthly basis. Wildlife observation, hiking, environmental education and photography are popular activities for visitors.

The trail head is located at 69 Moody Bridge Road in Hadley, MA. Follow Route 9 East or West to S. Maple Street. Follow S. Maple Street for 1.2 miles and take a right onto Moody Bridge Road. The Fort River Division is located 0.8 miles on the right.
