

Come Visit!

Located in the remote towns of Brunswick, Ferdinand, Bloomfield and Lewis, Vermont, the Nulhegan Basin Division offers outdoor recreational opportunities for a variety of personal interests.

The Division headquarters and visitor contact station are located in Brunswick, VT and open daily from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm. Admission to the visitor contact station is free, and scenic overlooks provide panoramic views of the Nulhegan Basin.

Refuge lands consists of more than 26,000 acres of conifer and deciduous forest, interspersed with forested wetlands, peatlands and shrub swamps, and contain three tributaries to the Nulhegan River. Forty miles of gravel roads accommodate passenger vehicles and are generally open between Memorial Day and early-December (roads are not plowed during the winter).

Wildlife species seasonally seen on refuge lands include resident boreal landbirds such as boreal chickadees, gray jays, and spruce grouse, warblers, thrushes and other migratory birds, black bear, white-tailed deer, moose and Eastern brook trout.
