



SOCIAL: Treat others how you would like to be treated.

When appropriate, inform others of your presence and purpose.

Do not interfere with other compatible activities, such as hunting, snowshoeing and cross-country skiing.

Treat others courteously.

Ask before joining others already shooting in an area.

Tactfully inform others if you observe them engaging in inappropriate or harmful behavior.

Many people unknowingly endanger themselves and animals. Don't argue with those who don't care; report them to the appropriate authorities.

Remember these rules for public use of photos:

- *Do not use/share another photographer's image(s) without their express consent.*
- *Always give credit to the photographer that owns the image.*

- *No photographs of children under 18 years of age may be posted to social media, published in magazines, newspapers, etc. without a signed release by the parent. Release forms are available at Refuge Headquarters and monthly meetings.*
- *Commercial photography is allowed. Reference refuge website for details and parameters.*

Ethical Field Practices

** Adapted from NANPA (North American Nature Photography Association)*

The Sherburne NWR Photography Club believes that following these practices promotes the well-being of the refuge, subject and photographer. Every place, plant, and animal, whether above or below water, is unique, and cumulative impacts occur over time. Therefore, one must always exercise good individual judgment.

It is our belief that these principles will encourage all who participate in the enjoyment of nature to do so in a way that best promotes good stewardship of the resource.

ENVIRONMENT: Treat the wildlife, plants and places as if you were their guest.

Members must abide by regulations of the refuge.

The Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge Public Use Regulations & Map brochure is available on the refuge website, at Refuge Headquarters, and at all trail kiosks. Please remember that being a member of the club does not entitle you to disregard any rules or regulations of the refuge.

Learn patterns of animal behavior
So as not to interfere with animal life cycles.

Do not distress or harass wildlife or their habitat.

Respect the routine needs of animals.

Use appropriate lenses to photograph wild animals.

If an animal shows stress, move back and use a longer lens.

Acquaint yourself with the fragility of the ecosystem.

Stay on trails or within 100 feet of a road or designated hiking trail to help minimize cumulative impacts and maintain safety.
