Position Summary: The Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) leader coordinates and leads the exciting summer-long YCC program. The leader will be responsible for directing a group of six (6) YCC enrollees on specific work projects relating to fish and wildlife habitat management, species conservation and environmental education. This is an eleven-week position from June 6 to August 19, 2016. Wages are based on the General Schedule (GS)-5, Step 1 (approx. \$16.00/hour).

Duty station is located at Tijuana Slough National Wildlife Refuge in Imperial Beach, CA

Major Duties: Coordinate eight weeks of the summer program • Instruct and lead a crew of six (6) teen enrollees engaged in a wide variety of land resource improvement projects such as habitat restoration, plant/animal surveys, property maintenance, and environmental educational field trips • Provides guidance and direction in all phases of field projects to include the environmental value of each task • Provides a safe and efficient work environment • Assist in the preparation of lesson plans

Requirements: Minimum experience requirements include cumulative of 1-year supervising youth (e.g. summer camps, teaching, scouts) and/or bachelor's degree majoring in social behavior, human behavior, health care or similar field. Other beneficial qualifications include a degree in biology, environmental science or similar field; certification in first aid/CPR; bounds of energy; and a strong desire to educate youth. Must have valid CA driver's license.
